

BOARD OF EDUCATION BOARD 1808.

Minutes of Meetings of October 1907

REC-16 MAY 07

The Board considered the report of the Educational Officer with regard to:-

- (1) Europeans.
- (2) Eurasians and Europeans.
- (3) Indians and Arabs.
- (4) Natives.

With regard to (1), Europeans, three alternatives were proposed and discussed (a) the establishment of a boarding school at a convenient centre such as Nairobi, (b) the location of small schools in certain places in the white settlement area (c) the institution of a system of perambulating teachers. The Board is of opinion that (b) and (c) are not to be recommended owing to the small number of European children who could take advantage of such institutions.

A reasonable attendance of children could not be assured for the present, at any rate, would, however, the inhabitants of any District require a primary school and guarantee to the Government an attendance of at least 25 pupils it is expedient that such school should be established.

In Nairobi and district there is a sufficiently large number of children likely to attend a European School to warrant the Board advocating a combined day and boarding school be established with accommodation for 50 boarders.

boarders. For this purpose, it is estimated, a sum of 27800 approximately, for buildings and equipment, would be required, and the maintenance of the same would be 21500 per annum. The Board is of opinion that the existing school in Malindi meets the needs of the European element at present, but to meet the requirements of the Chinese the school accommodation would have to be doubled and the staff increased. This would entail a constant expenditure of 2650 per annum in addition to the initial cost for building etc.

In this connection - namely provision of education for Eurasians and Chinese it should be considered whether it is the duty of the State to educate aliens, and the Board does not recommend an increase in the school accommodation in order to help an alien race.

With regard to (3) Indians and Arabs

(a) In Malindi the present Indian School should be improved and two Masters, at a cost of 21000 per annum be appointed. (b) In Mombasa, the existing machinery for education is placed entirely in the hands of the Church. The Wesleyan Society who have a school at Mombasa, one at Malindi, one at Lamu, and at Pate, and one at Vilupa. The Arabs have their own schools. If education were made compulsory, the existing machinery would be quite insufficient.

With regard to (4) Natives - It appears that the general requirements of native education are at present sufficiently met.

of the missionary societies, and the question
 to be left safely in their hands; but it is
 advisable that the Societies be asked actually
 to elect a person, one of their own selection,
 to be their technical adviser. The Societies
 should be asked to submit a scheme for the
 proposed school. A grant of Rs. 5000/- should
 be voted by Government during the next year
 and expended in the training of natives in
 the use of agricultural implements such as
 shearing etc. (and that the Agricultural
 Department be asked to submit a scheme for the
 Committee's approval). Missionary Societies
 should be asked to confer and submit some scheme
 for the secular and technical training of
 natives and His Excellency be asked to
 nominate a responsible member of the Adminis-
 tration to preside at the Conference.

SCHOOL MANAGEMENT:—As to the
 management of the existing and proposed new
 schools, the Committee considers that a Central
 School Management Committee should be
 established which should have charge of all
 schools. The members of the Committee
 have never to be met and the Committee for
 schools in different parts of the Province
 that a Committee should be constituted and
 composed of:—

- (1) A member or members of the Executive
- (2) A member of the superior staff of
 the Uganda Railway.
- (3) A Minister of Religion.
- (4) Members of the public.

STANDARD OF NIGERIAN - The Board
