applications or sign any deeds of this character, as
instances have occurred in which the privilege has been
abused.

In the case, however, of officers who have erected
or are actually up to this date in course of erecting a
house upon the land of which they are in temporary
possession I shall be ready to sign the deeds, in view
of the expenses which they have incurred, on the strict
understanding that the land cannot be dealt with in any
way without my permission.

Sir,

With reference to your application for a residential plot on Kikuyu road, I have the honour to inform you that H.M. Commissioner has received a ruling that no person in Government service may occupy land and that he will sign no such document notwithstanding further applications of this character.

H.M. Commissioner, however, is in receipt of official instructions to the effect of his written instructions to me, i.e. the 25th instant, that erected or not actually in course of erecting a house on the land or vacant ground in temporary possession, is prepared to sign the deed in view of the expense which they incurred, but on the strict understanding that the house must be built within one year without his permission.

With regard therefore kindly inform me at your earliest convenience if you can obtain title (25) to the land so erected or were in the course of erecting a house on the land applied for by you for residential purposes, I shall be pleased to apply for a final plan to your application.

MINUTE.

In January 1904 Officers in the service of the Government were permitted by the regulations relating to that service to acquire and hold a limited amount of land in the Protectorate.

On January 11th, 1904 Mr. Noble applied to the Land Officer for a ten acre plot in Nairobi and was informed by a letter from the Land Officer that the land was available.

Survey fees were paid by the applicant and a draft lease prepared by the Crown Advocate on instructions from the Land Officer was submitted to Mr. Noble and approved by him.

On August 24th the late Commissioner Sir Donald Stewart being of opinion that it was undesirable that officers of the Government should hold land in the Protectorate, informed the Land Officer that in future no person in the Government service would be allowed to acquire land in the Protectorate; and that on certain exceptions, he would sign no more deeds conveying or leasing land to such persons.

On September the 1st the Land Officer wrote to Mr. Noble informing him of this new regulation and entries informing him that unless he could show that his case came

case within the exceptions his application would be cancelled.

An interview took place between Mr. Noble and the Land Officer on September 6th. On the following day the Land Officer wrote to Mr. Noble informing him that the land for which he had applied could not be transferred to his nominee but would revert to the first applicant registered at the Land Office.

For over two years, - namely: from September 6th 1904 until October 8th 1906 - Mr. Noble took no action of any kind, with regard to the matter, but on the latter date he having then left the service of the Government he made the claim now under consideration.

The question on which my opinion is invited is as to whether there would be any defence in the event of Mr. Noble bringing an action for specific performance of the contract to grant a lease of the land in question or for damages for breach of contract.

In my opinion there is a good defence to both those actions.

Mr. Noble cannot obtain an order for specific performance as while he remained quiet the land was disposed of to other persons.

With regard to an action for damages for breach of contract I am of opinion that the impossibility of the performance of the contract owing to the Regulation prohibiting any person in the service of the Government from acquiring land within the Protectorate constitutes an absolute defence to such an action.

In cannot, I think, be overlooked that His Majesty's
Commissioner had no authority to make a regulation such
as the one in question or that such a regulation is not
binding on persons in the service of Government.

The position was therefore that Mr. Mohle could not
as a Government servant acquire land in the Protectorate
and the contract could not be performed and was properly
rescinded by the Land Officer on behalf of the Commissioner.

The fact that the contract is in the way of the
performance of the contract is removed two years after
the contract has rescinded cannot have the effect of reviving
the contract.
