Dear Mr. Montgomery,

I hope you will forgive me for troubling you. I applied for an appointment in Canada for Reginald whom we are sending to Africa, he is leaving his brother Trevor Skene, and I am in the charge. He applied for a Colonial appointment last year and had hoped to get E.Africa, but he was told he was too young, that they were sending no one under 25 years of age.

After my husband's death, I called to see the Assistant Secretary to Lord Elgin and he seemed to think as Reg. was in Africa and they would not have the responsibility of sending him, that he could not be appointed before he was 26. They have sent me some papers for Reg to fill in, which are to be returned through the General Agent and sent to them.

Will kindly thank you good word for the boy, as his future career depends on it. He is a wonderful Athlete, strong, healthy, good-tempered, thoughtful, a splendid rider and a good shot, he was in

the Cadet Corps for 3 or 4 years - was educated at the United Services College, Westward Ho'. North Devon. He has excellent character from his school. These of course I'll send on to you when his case justly warrants a line from you would have more effect. He sat down for the Army Exam, and failed, as it was his last chance. We thought it was better for him to help his brother than to idle in England.

I have been wishing to go to Africa and settle there, we applied for land quite a year ago but have so far heard nothing about it. Perhaps my son Trevor has enquired about it.

Mr. Kerr-Flynn was a pupil of the U.S. College under me, from May 1889 to the end of 1904. During a large portion of the time he was Captain of Games and Captain of the School.

He commanded his school work neither too late nor successful competition for Sandhurst, but showed exceptional pluck and determination in working up for trial. I much regret that he could not join the Indian Army, as his qualities of mind and body would have made a first rate officer for Frontier work especially.
