The general question of the extent of native rights in the Coast District has lately been raised by the Secretary for the Native Affairs, and I agree with Colonel Montgomery that perhaps the Settlements should be careful not to fall into what may prove to be the error of assuming that natives have no proprietary claim to land.

His Excellency,

I venture to suggest that a modification be made in the terms of the agreement under which the ~~Kenya~~ area on the coast south of Mombasa is being offered to Uplands of East Africa Syndicate.

The conditions are stated in the Colonial Office letter No. 8/1928 dated 11th June, a copy of which has been received with despatch No. 543 dated 19th June.

It is stated in clause(s) that the land to be given will be subject to the deduction of all land within the area already granted to others or cultivated by natives."

I suggest that for the words "cultivated by natives" should be substituted the words "in which natives have rights."

Recent enquiries on the coast have shown that natives claim, and very likely have a right to, lands which are not at present occupied by them.

There are undoubtedly large areas which have been allowed to fall out of cultivation, but on which good claims may be made to proprietary rights. It is necessary to guard ourselves in this matter. The question has been raised lately in connection with grants on the coast generally, and I have asked the Crown Advocate to specify clearly in the permit to occupy

occupy temporarily that the native rights (not
only land occupied by natives) are reserved.
