Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that, in connection with the transfer of the management of the Native schools from the Railway Department, the question of the Provident Fund allowances payable to the Staff comes up for consideration.

It is presumably true that the Schools have been established by the railway the Staff will come under the ordinary Protectorate Regulations as to their pay and other gratuities in which case the allowances will naturally cease.

Pending a decision on this point the allowances are being continued but I would suggest that the matter be referred to the Colonial Office and authority obtained for making permanent

as far as possible the Ag. Senior Commissioners.

permanent appointments, on Rs.100 and over, permanent and other permanent appointments subject to the "Gratuities Regulations" as from 1st April last. If this is sanctioned recovery to be made of the Provident Fund Allowances paid since the date.

2. I find that the Chief Accountant has been paying Provident Fund Allowance to Miss Adamson the Kindergarten mistress. As Miss Adamson is on a special Protectorate Agreement for 7 years in which conditions of service are clearly defined I do not think that this allowance should have been paid and I would recommend that all payments made to her on this account be recovered from her.
