2049 766 The most prosperous year hitherto recorded since Great Britain took over the administration of the country was 1800 1980, and in comparison with that year the trade of Mombasa, the principal port in the territory has fallen 4 per cent, and of Lamu has saided a per cent. and of Lamit, the second largest port, 30 per cent. Trade to day at Mombasa is, how-ever, in a sounder condition than it has been for some years past, as a number of the smaller increhants, who were trading on very narrow margins and long credits, have, owing to the contraction of business, been compelled to take the benefit of the Bankruptcy Act.

India still heads the list by ports, and is followed by the United Kingdom with 27 per cent. and by Germany with 11 per cent. America, which supplied piece-goods and kero-sene oil, contributes 6 per cent., and would no doubt have contributed more largely had it not been for the introduction of kerosene oil from Russia, which being brought here in bulk and stored in tanks, undersells the American oil imported in cases. GREAT DEPTAINS ARMY. THE "GIGANTIC CONSPIRACY IN IDELAND"

LONDON, Nov. 17 .- Mr. Brodrick, eaking at Dewsbury, stated that a gigantic conspiracy was on foot in Ireland, but that the forces on the side of law and order are too str for the conspirators.

Mr. Brodrick criticised Lord Rosebery's suggestion that Lord Kitchener should be made Secretary for War, and said that in his opinion there were the strongest objections against such an appointment, that it was most undestrable that this General, whose future was so important to the nation should be m the central figure on political plat-forms, and the target for pressoriticisms

Alluding to the Army he stated that Great Britain might be easy on this point, that she would have Army similar to the Continen Powers, but that the cost, and the terms of service, must be left in the hands of Government, and it was their business to obtain if possible the necessary forces without proceeding to extreme measure

THE DISEASE ON THE LAKE.

As we said in a recent issue we bad the opportunity to accompany Dr. C. Christy in one of his expeditions to a sleeping sickness village. The natives and their huts were in a state of indescribable filth. While Dr. Christy was proceeding with his unenviable work of taking microscopi-cal blood slides, and hunting for bugs and other vermin, he told us that in a large percentage of cases be had detected a small blood worm which might possibly be the cause of the disease. But on this point, and the question as to whether the bites he preferred not to express an opinion until he had completed him ations. Now, Dr. Low, one the three specialists sent out by the Tropical School of Medicine to study sleeping sickness on the spot, wn on his way home from Uganda with reports about this strange disease. The other two

have quite realized this fact and outside the shambas leaving them there, where many are eaten by hvenas. Dr. Low went on to describe some of the most distinctive symptoms and said that, so far, practically all cases under observation terminate fatally, the sickness running on from one to three or four months. SHIPPING CASUALTIES.

THE "GREAT NORTHERN" A TOTAL WRECK.

SEVENTY-FIVE DHOWS SUNK: 175 LIVES LOST.
