DETAILS OF DRIVING.
Little Things That Makes a Pleasant Run.
COMFORT AT THE WHEEL.

Many people would enjoy their motoring far more if they could only realize that it need not impose too great a strain upon their nerves or muscles. In fact, the average driver needlessly sets aside a long time every day for driving, with a little rest and trouble, and possibly a few minor discomforts, he can drive his car without realizing that the long journey did not make him uncomfortable.

It is of prime importance that the driver should be comfortably seated. If he has to sit under the steering wheel, he must have a good seat, one that covers the top of his head, he cannot proceed fast as he will be unable to grip the rim of the steering wheel correctly in this position. If the seat can be adjusted, an inch or two; it will be a great improvement. It is most important to have as free a view as possible of the road ahead, as well as a good view of the side roads on the arctic route. By getting a little trouble with the angle of the seat and the backrest, you can get into the position in which they will be most comfortable.

It is also necessary that the left foot should have somewhere to rest when the car is moving. If the footrest is not placed at the right height, the knee will be under strain as to affect the necessary support.

DRIVING GENTLY ALWAY.

Further Evidence.



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


