A HISTORY OF COFFEE GROWING.

Empire Sources of Supply.

KENYA'S POSITION

The following article extracted from the Times Trade Supplement written by Mr. Alfred Booth is of interest to coffee planters in this country.

In Great Britain comparatively few, apart from those interested in the production and marketing, realize the importance of coffee as an article of commerce. The great majority of the inhabitants of Great Britain and Ireland if asked whether tea or coffee is the more important, would at once answer, "Tea," while if a similar question were put to citizens of the United States they would at once unhesitatingly reply, "Coffee." The reason for this difference of opinion is not far to seek in this country the consumption of coffee is only equivalent to 140 per pound per annum, while in the United States it is no less than 12½.

Although the consumption of coffee per head in this country is so small, it is worth noting that the proportion of the three staple lines used is greater than in any other country. During the last 35 to 40 years much greater care has been taken to ensure that coffee should be delivered to the consumer freshly roasted and freshly ground and since the mid of the war it is gratifying to be able to record a substantial advance in home consumption. Before the war Great Britain's annual consumption as judged by duty paid deliveries, was 10,000 tons, today these duty-paid deliveries are 11,000 tons, and the tendency is still upward.

On the other hand, the consumption of tea in Great Britain and Ireland is equivalent to 500 per pound per annum, while in the United States it is less than this.

Further, the annual production of coffee reaches the astounding total of 20,000,000 cwt., whereas that of tea is 900,000,725 lb. (say 71,600,000 cwt.).

Of this enormous quantity of coffee about 70 per cent. comes from Brazil and the remaining 30 per cent. from Central America, Colombia, Venezuela, Java, and Sumatra, the West Indian Islands, other than British, the East and West Africa, Jamaica, etc.

Of these countries, India, East

Africa and Jamaica are the only British Empire sources of supply of any importance. At one time Ceylon was an important coffee-growing country, in 1800 and 1820 over 1,000,000 cwt. were shipped from this Colony each year, and the coffee was usually of good quality. Then in the early years of the last century the East India Company attached the coffee industry of Ceylon was a thing of the past. At the present time no coffee whatever is produced in the island.

BLOSSOM TIME.

In India, happily, the industry has escaped such wholesale destruction, but, as in the coffee-growing countries, the latter has always to be on the watch for a pest which may destroy it by means of constant vigilance. The quantity of coffee exported from Ceylon varies year by year, and is dependent on the weather conditions during the blossoming and setting seasons, and the following six months or more that elapse before the berry is ready for picking—a time in which many things may happen. The blossoming takes place immediately after the heavy rains, which in India come about the end of March, but the "same" varies in different countries.

A coffee tree in blossom is one of the most beautiful sights in Nature. The blossom falls off after two or three days, leaving the green of the fruit, which is called the cherry. This passes through various stages until it arrives at maturity, when it is of a purple colour, and has a rich pulp resembling an English cherry. This pulp covers two parchment coats, the first, fine and bitter, and each contains a seed, berry. Before the berry is ready for the market the ripe cherry has to pass through many processes. First, the ripening process, whereby the parchment coats are separated from the outer pulp. Then the fermenting process, and then the washing process, during which the pulp that still adheres to the parchment is made easily removable. After washing comes drying, the washed parchment being spread out in rows on the drying grounds (patios or baidags) as they are called. Here the parchment is dried by the rays of the sun, the rays being turned over and over periodically, so as to ensure the thorough drying of the whole mass. The sun-drying may take any time from one to three weeks. Sometimes artificial heat is used, which, though it is on a greater expense, certainly expedites the drying process. The dried parchment coffee is then collected and put in bags to be conveyed to the factory, where the best specimen takes place. This is called hunking or holling the coffee. By means of the holling

machine the parchment wing is removed, leaving the seed "herry" free.

SHAG.

Before it is sold on the market the herry coffee is generally passed through a sifting machine, whereby the herry are sorted into first, second and third—Factory, and Traga (broken). They are then bound to be sold in public sale or by private treaty. The above operations, from the hunking to the sifting, are generally carried out in the country of production, but sometimes the coffee is shipped to the country of consumption, and the operations mentioned above are done there. By shipping in the parchment a certain amount of coffee in the herry is preserved and in certain conditions of the market this extra coffee ensures higher prices.

The characteristic description of coffee are sometimes treated by what is called the unroasted product. By this method, which is used to a great extent in Brazil, the ripe pulp is allowed to dry on the inner parchment casing, so that it resembles a pod rather than a cherry and the berry is then extracted by one process. Coffee so prepared has naturally a weaker flavour.

The chief coffee growing countries of the British Empire are—India, Jamaica, Kenya Colony, Uganda and Tanganyika Territory, Kismayu, Arabia, Sumatra, and Bunka coffee, come from the British East African territories.

Coffee has been seriously cultivated in India since 1880, when Mr. Canning opened an estate in Mysore and during the next decade many others followed in example. The growth was at first slow, but in 1921 there were 14,000 acres, in 1922 there were 18,000, and in 1923 there were 21,000 acres. In India under European or Indian cultivation there are several small lots of 20 to 50 acres apiece, mainly in Mysore and Coorg, owned by natives, amounting in all to about 50,000 acres. Production varies according to the season in 1924 and 1923 the regular coffee shipping ports exported 218,200 cwt. and 208,200 cwt., respectively, of these quantities the following countries were the principal recipients—

Union Trade with East Africa.

COMMISSIONER'S HINTS FOR DEVELOPMENT

In the Commercial and Industrial Gazette for June, which is a monthly pamphlet issued by the Government, the South African Trade Commissioner, Kenne (Lt. Col. H. Brevint) has written an interesting article on "Trade with East Africa."

After dealing with the opening up of communications and the possibilities in East African Ports, which will lead to the continuous increase of imports and exports, he says that the Union of South Africa should take a considerable share, but that it is very strongly advised to use its more public spirit, not only in Trade matters, but in every direction which will raise interest and make people think.

He goes on to enumerate what he terms elementary outlines of trade as follows:—(1) Manufacturers should not forget people of a minimum. (2) Keep their goods continually supplied with up-to-date information regarding any contemplated change in prices. (3) Provide their agents with all necessary material. (4) Advertisers should make their advertisements supply their agents with reasonable quantities of goods, and encourage and so enable agents to make immediate deliveries. (5) Supply the bulk and small quantities of the goods required at the time the order is placed.

Although these are elementary outlines, it is true that the Union of South Africa does not adhere to them.

The Trade Commissioner is greatly in favour of general advertising, that is, keeping a general class of articles before the public in a regular manner, and the local press. He says that although it is the business of the manufacturer to push his own products, he has not seen a single advertisement in East Africa emanating from a South African manufacturer, and that he has not seen one advertisement with products from other parts of the world.

The Commissioner studies the article with statistical data for 1925 and says: "Although there have been during the past year distinct indications that South African manufacturers are taking more interest in the possibilities of trade in these territories, and they have on consequence been able to gain a little ground, a great deal more exertion and enterprise is necessary, and South African Manufacturers must be prepared to cut down their profits to a minimum and do some advertising, if they want to claim their share of the business that is going in an open market such as these territories provide."

THE FINANCIAL POSITION OF UGANDA.

"Necessity for the Most Rigid Economy."

1926 PROSPECTS.

Following the conclusion of the review of Uganda's finances by the Governor shortly before the first week of this month, we may look forward to the financial position of the Territory in a more definite amount of confidence, we have no means for a moment any degree of optimism, and the prospects may be affected to a degree which it is at the present moment impossible to calculate, by the industrial troubles, which have been over-shadowing England, and the decline of which can hardly be said to have lifted entirely.

The necessity for the most rigid economy both at present and in the preparation of next year's estimate, therefore, more apparent than ever and it is to be expected that it will be impossible to entertain any prospect of increase of revenues, and that which cannot be met by corresponding economies.

EXPENDITURE

As regards expenditure, I have no means to suppose that the 1926 expenditure of £1,200,000 will be exceeded. At the next Session of the Honourable Council, supplementary estimates will be submitted, and it will then be possible to forecast the estimated position at the end of 1926 with a greater degree of accuracy. Finally, in addition with financial position of the Protectorate, I should like to refer again to the surplus balance to which I have alluded as £133,845. It is unnecessary to suppose that the whole amount of these balances, or even the greater part of them, is available for expenditure. The funds of the country depend on you are all aware, and as I have already explained, the only link on the African Continent. The Cotton Crop, in turn, is, as regards its financial results, at the mercy of two factors, which cannot be calculated beforehand, that is to say, climatic conditions, and world prices, which latter, in their turn, depend principally upon the mood of the American crop.

Another factor in this, it has been impossible to bring up to date, our programme of Public Works, and the present mood of the market, the balance is not so widely in our favour as it was in the case of the review of the year of 1925, and the possibility of our being unable to carry out works which we have already planned, and which we should have wished to carry out, is a considerable one. It is to be expected that we shall have to be particularly careful in our selection of public works, which have already been sanctioned, and which will be impossible to carry out, or at least to carry out in a satisfactory manner.

WAR DEBENTURE

We must also remember the fact that the Protectorate has not yet liquidated its liability to the War Office in respect of the contribution towards the cost of the East African Campaign. It has already paid £15,000 and the Committee recently appointed by the Imperial Treasury recommended that Uganda should pay a further sum of £20,000 to discharge the liability fully. It is proposed that this matter should be left to the decision of the Council, but it is to be expected that it will be necessary to remember that the liability is hanging over our heads.

Poultry Notes.

THE EGG.

Although we are all familiar with the hen's egg, we are possibly not formed "the real article," that is the "fertilized" egg. It is not a half round, but the same "round" and minute absorption egg still finds its way to the break.

Day after day in a somewhat peculiar mood we crack the shell of our breakfast egg possibly hoping for the best but certainly expecting the worst. Although we may think about the quality of the egg we eat, we seldom think of what the egg passes before it is placed before us.

In these notes I wish to give some idea of the formation of the egg. The shape of the normal (hen) egg is familiar to us all, it is longer than it is broad, and has one end being rounded off. The average weight of an egg should be about two ounces, but about half an ounce either way. The outer covering, or shell, varies from pure white to deep brown, the colour depending largely on the breed of fowl, although with in the same breed of the same breed and strain the shade of colour will vary considerably, and the farmer who knows his birds well, will often be able to point out the best breeding stock.

In artificial incubation, if the temperature is too rapid it causes in one of the causes of that quality factors dried up and the embryo dies. Incubation should appear to be more rapid in artificial than in natural incubation, especially in this country, that when incubating by natural means the poultry farmer should be sure that the eggs used are not laid by a hen to correspond.
