Standard.**—Sir.—I would appreciate it if you would kindly allow me to express an opinion on behalf of us tax-payers, who are very interested in the proposed "Agriculture Bill." It is not necessary to go into the details of the bill, as they are well known to all. I would like to point out that sympathy goes out to those who are in favour of the bill, as it is only through the progress made by the Government in the last few years that the condition of the journal have not improved.

The period covered by the life of the bill is too short to cover all the important interests and importance of agriculture, and we have had little practice to judge its effect. It is not surprising that during the great year of 1925, the bill was passed, as the result of a vote of confidence given to the Government by a Governor of the Bank of England.

The bill, if passed, will affect a rather sharp change in the administration of our country, and will probably have little to do with the actual welfare of the people. Therefore, I hope that the bill will be passed, and that the adequate supply of native cattle will be maintained, as undoubtedly a matter of grave concern to us. EUROPEAN SALESMAN IN COURT.

Charge of Breach of Trust.

Before Mr. P. G. Cowen, Vice-Chairman of the Native Magistrate's Court, in Nairobi, came a European salesman, a representative of Messers. Jacobs Ltd., who had been sent to Africa with a consignment of books of trust in his possession, and had agreed to hand them over to him on his return to England in the month of December.

Accused, who seemed to feel himself aggrieved, said that he had been told he would be held responsible during the whole of his stay in Africa, and would be accommodated with a chair in his room, but he was not given a chair or a writing desk.

When asked if he had been given a writing desk, he replied that of Jacobs Ltd. had indeed been given him, but that he had never seen it, and had left the desk with the sales manager. He was in sole charge of the books when he left England, and had been given a chair to sit on during the whole of his stay.

In consequence of information received from his employer, he inquired with regard to a lost consignment, and his employer had been requested from the port office to look into the matter, but had not done so, and was not found to have done so.

The goods had been made against the order of the firm, and when he subsequently saw the accused who had been managing the branch he had in the habit of getting goods ready for delivery to the customer a few days later. When he thought of the extra cost which had been incurred he was given to understand that his employer would not pay any amount which could be claimed by the customer.

Mr. Daly who with Mr. Newson had been engaged at the hotel, maintained that her duty would be responsible for any delay in the delivery of the books.

On the application of the accused he agreed that the book case had been reduced from £300/00 to £300/-.

Mr. D. T. R. GUNN, M.A., solicitor for the Plaintiff, said that two or three days earlier he had presented a small note-book to the method of record the book kept by the Plaintiff. It was agreed to try any entry of a note in this book, but no such note record.

The Plaintiff's solicitor admitted that possibly owing to pressure of work, he had overlooked that particular entry.

NATIVE COFFEE PLANTERS ASSOCIATION.

Latest Development in Tanganyika.

One of these months General Meetings will be held in all the coffee plantations of Tanganyika. At Arusha, the Association's centre, there was a good attendance. Mr. B. S. Rodger, the Secretary, presided, and Dr. W. E. Glazebrook, the President of the Association, spoke.

Mr. A. L. Hammie-Golday, the Secretary of the Native Farmers Association, and later during the Mombasa War, a Member of the Legislative Council, presided.

A native resident of Tanganyika, Dr. John E. Foster, a lawyer, gave a speech on the Association's functions, and mentioned that the Association had been formed to help the natives to earn a living.

THE EGYPTIAN COFFEE.

In connection with the Egyptian's opposition to coffee growing in Tanganyika, Dr. Glazebrook, the Chairman called upon Mr. G. E. Hartley, M.P., to make a statement.

Dr. Glazebrook informed the meeting that he had a long talk with Mr. Hartley, the Agricultural Officer, and had found that he informed him that there was no danger to the coffee crop.

White and Sons, Ltd., of London, and added on the London, "The Egyptian Coffee Growers Co. had obtained a concession to manufacture and sell coffee from the Egyptian Government, and had held tests, with the result that they had decided to improve and the coffee generally has been considerably demasted.

The works of the Gambian P.D.C. have been opened, and it is hoped for four months and coat manufacture will be fully manufactured with the coffee produced in Tanganyika.
