Poultry Notes.

THE 26th.

Although we are all familiar with the various breeds of fowl, it is not often that we consider what may be the best breed for the best bird, particularly a hen.

In artificial incubation, if we consider the inner membrane to dry up when the hen sits, the result is that the chick will be dead on the shell.

Although we may think about the quality of our eggs, we are not always aware of the various phases through which the chick passes in the incubator.

It is for this reason that we have the following notes on the formation of the egg.

The shape of the normal (hen)

egg is round, but it is not this, it is broad, and has one side

which is broader than the other.

The outer covering, or shell, varies

from white to deep brown.

The breed of fowl, although

the shape of the egg will be

similar, the size will vary.

He who knows his bird, will

be able to point to some

characteristics which will

enable him to do so.

Taking an average egg it will

be found to be roughly

half inches long the long way

and half an inch wide.

The shape of the egg is characterised

by the position of the yolk

at the bottom of the shell.

The colour of the shell varies

from white to light brown.





Your very lengthy article on "Kenya and Uganda Trade" was most gratifying, serving as a kind of summing up to the correspondence recently emanating from various quarters of opinion given to the situation. I am equally anxious to widen a sphere of interest in the minds of the people throughout the Empire. Personally I have not met any one who has not been most interested in your article. Your article seems to tally in every way with the two latest reports on Kenya and Uganda.

What kind of mind does he have? When I think of India and other countries I am inclined to think of the evolution of a special kind of racial pride. Even the King's Government, I think, had a similar pride during the Great War, when the Britons (which included us), I think, in its explanation or argument, did not see the Charlie Chauvel's of the world. I think I have proved that certain Indians have been particularly successful.
