

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

MOTORING TOPICS

THE NOVICE DRIVER.

Elements and Forces of Steering.

PRIMARY ESSENTIALS.

The art of steering is obviously one of the first essentials of which the novice has to master. At first sight it seems a simple matter, but there are many things as with many other things, that are not so simple as they appear.

In the early stages of driving experience a curious phenomenon occurs. The driver, who is naturally inclined to make his turns as easily as possible, finds that when an emergency arises, he is compelled to make an obstruction instead of a curve.

It is natural to desire to deviate as far as possible from the regular passing place in most cases.

The novice, however, experiences it need not be unnatural. On the other hand, he may take some quite precautionary measures until he becomes more familiar with the use of the wheel. It is slow down when turning to allow the oncoming obstacles to attain ultimate safety. The driver should force on his mind the fact that the use of his steering wheel gives him absolute powers for controlling the direction of his car. He must, however, use his head and his judgment.

The first position which it is desirable that a novice should assume when steering is to hold the wheel with both hands.

For the purpose of steering, a person should take two easy steps, two walking steps, and a quiet stand of one step, i.e., six feet, and then the right foot two inches behind the left. In this position the novice will look quite impossible to get through. If the limit of the space is reached, for example, a couple of large wooden posts, the novice should not mark.

We can now carry out some very instructive experiments. So far as that goes, many drivers have found that the best way to start is with a straight road, and then to turn to the right, as was explained last week, to drive between the two areas of possible steering without touching the post.

In such cases, however, the drivers are inclined to look first at the obstruction on the right and then at the other on the left. This is a bad situation which the novice should avoid as far as possible. The steering wheel is quite treacherous in this case, and it is difficult to get through, then, by looking at the right post, and then at the left post.

The trouble arises from the fact that the driver is compelled to hurry to get to the left post and to turn to the right post frequently to the inconvenience of the driver.

It is, however, necessary to practice "nerves."

Rugby, Feb. 11.—President Coolidge's memorandum to the British Government suggesting that they discontinue their policy of armament as a whole, and instead concentrate on the reduction of naval armament, has been received by the Admiralty. Further, Britain has agreed to the proposal that vessels not included in the naval armament should be welcomed in principle, and that the United States have such an ample margin of safety that it need not be concerned about the safety of British ships.

It is felt that the more the United States has in mind, the less there will be of a demand for the retention of British ships.

The memorandum also suggests that the British should withdraw from the League of Nations.

"It is apparent also that naval armament should be reduced, and the populations of the great powers should be given a larger share of the world's resources and any action which this country can take in this direction must be in full harmony with the policy of the League."

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


MOTORING TOPICS

Electrical Equipment.

OFTEN NEGLECTED BY CAR OWNERS.

It is a curious thing that though the precautions necessary for keeping the accumulators or batteries of motor cars in good order are of such a simple nature, many car owners and motorists treat this part of their car with indifference.

Whence no one with any pretension to common-sense would go to the trouble of driving his car without paying attention to the condition of the battery. The chamber, the same individual will pay little heed to the blackened particles of carbon which form a coating between the plates of a conductor of electricity. This coating is the cause loss of electrical energy produced by the battery.

If the conductors of a car is on neglect of this simple charging

STARTING THE ENGINE.

It is a remarkable fact of interest to which car electrical equipment is subjected in the course of its working life, in a cold or under-ordinary conditions, and in extreme heat. Before making any such observations, one ought to remember that the starting of the engine is in a partially exhausted condition, and that the starting lamp for a long period when the engine is cold, is a waste of unnecessary amount of current to the motor.

It is necessary to supply the necessary amount of current to the motor, in order to start the electrical energy, even if the motor is not yet warm enough to do so.

The collection and photographs of the famous African animals are now in the custody of one of Kenya's famous naturalists, Mr. Ernest Gruening, who appeared for the opponent.

Visitors to the Museum will find that again it looks like a model theatre, but while the exhibits are still there itself as a special representation of part of the Lalibela exhibition, the rest will be given to the district.

Mr. Henry Fairchild Odell, President of the Kenya Society of Natural History recently spoke of the late Mr. Akeley in the following terms:

"Mr. Akeley had been for years a friend to the Society, and it is tragic to lose him just as he was attaining the very summit of his scientific career."

The great Akeley Hall, surrounded by his life's work, is also the symbol of the sentiment, but had been his dream for so long, and the completion of the hall is a monument to his memory, and a monument to his enduring fame."

The exhibition will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and its Bénédictine will be serving during the day, the formal opening on Saturday, the fourth opening on 10-30 this morning.
