### First New Destroyer and Battleship.

### THE MIGHTY NELSON.

Rugby, April 20.  
The Government's Nelson, which has been under construction for four years, has been completed at the John Brown's shipyards and leaves the Tyne on Friday for Foochow.

The Nelson, and her sister-ship the Rodney, which is building at Birkenhead, are the largest battleships which Great Britain has ever built. The Tyne treaty of naval limitation, which was signed in 1906, has been the basis of the new designs, and most probably the fighting strength in the world.

The Nelson is 500 feet long, and carries 12 guns of 16 inches calibre, and five guns, including one of 6 inches, which have a diameter of 30,000 tons—British Official Wireless Service.



For the last three months I have been serving with the Royal Engineers, and I have seen many

of the difficulties which you

mention have a chance to arise for the safety of their country.

The married man will be a more useful fighter if he knows his duty and has a sense of responsibility. He probably has more time than the single man. Some of the men I know in France were old bachelors, but in war because I had no family to consider, but unless I knew my wife would be safe, I would be a conscientious objector.

For those who are prepared to go to war, I would like to say that there should be a maximum age limit of 30 years. I would like to leave this family in the last place, should it become necessary, so that they could be given a chance to serve 100 hours per annum.

If he does that service he would make a week's service in the Royal Engineers.

In a few days of daily drill, we would be fit for combat. The first 10 days might well be spent in training, the remaining 200 hours amounting to say, 200 hours of four hours each, 10 hours in the evenings and two hours in the evenings.

### CHINESE SITUATION.

#### Its Effect upon British Trade.

#### IN THE CHITUNG POT.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)  
London, March 24.

It is a well-known fact that the Chinese situation is a state of affairs in China which has been created by the Japanese. The moment now has brought us to a new low in the steadily increasing tension between the two countries. The places of touch and silent contact between the two countries have suffered as well.

Earlier in the year there had been a period of comparative quietude. Chinese commentaries, especially those seconded upon the Chinese side, had been submitted by the Japanese as good evidence of their peaceful intentions. Last year, in spite of all the peace overtures, the Japanese war was on the whole, if not necessarily a continuation, or even a continuation, of the Japanese policy of蚕食 (cannibalism) and encirclement.



## Nyasaland Natives Employed by Government.

### Payment of Hut Tax in Nyasaland

Under a recent enactment in Nyasaland entitled "The Native Hut and Poll Tax Ordinance 1920," it is provided (Section 6(a)) that—

"Where the Hut Tax is not paid by the thirtieth day of September in any year in which it is due and payable, the tax shall be at the rate of nine shillings."

2. Prior to this enactment Hut Tax was levied at all times of the year at the rate of Shgs. 6/- but now the law provides that it must be paid in time to reach the collecting authorities not later than the 30th of September their relatives in Nyasaland will be called on to pay the increased tax and much hardship may thereby ensue.

3. In view of the foregoing the Treasurer of Nyasaland is anxious that steps shall be taken to inform the native population of the new Ordinance, so that any misunderstanding and consequent hardship may be obviated. I am therefore publishing this notice in order that employers of Nyasaland natives may be made aware of the position and able to explain to their employees.


