DEATH OF AN ENEMY BUILDER.

(Continued from page 1.)

The British system north of Tanganyika was abandoned in 1907, and the German system taken up by the Germans. In 1914, Johnstone returned to the British Central African Commission, and remained there until 1918, when he was promoted to the rank of Captain. His health having suffered much from African fever, he was recalled to London in 1917.

WORK FOR UGANDA.

In the autumn of 1919 Mr Harry Johnson was despatched to Uganda to organize the administration of that protectorate after the departure of the British forces. He had been a soldier and the long war with Uganda had left him with a deep knowledge of the country. He was promoted to the rank of Major in 1920 by a G.C.M.G. In the spring of the following year he was recalled to England.

After 1920 he interested himself greatly in the development of Liberia and negotiated various arrangements with that nation. In 1922 he was sent to France to help reorganize the finances, the frontier with France having been established. In 1923 most of the African territories he had ruled were incorporated as a Federal state under a Governor General at the Garter, Elginion of 1923.

He was given command of the 1st Division in Africa, and died in 1924. African subjects were frequently attacked by the natives. He was also author of numerous books on African subjects, including "The Colonization of Africa," 1903; "The Uganda Protectorate," 1903; "Kenya," 1905; "George Gressell and the Congo," 1907; "Africa," 1911.

During his tenure in the north eastern part of the Congo Free State in 1900 he was instrumental in the capture of the King of the Chokas, a maniac nearly allied to the Devil. He was also concerned with many other difficulties in the African fauna and flora.



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

Balibrik Bogy Which Frightens Paris.

PARIS PARADE.

[STANLEY'S COMMENTARY.]

The Chamber is hoping to welcome back Mr. Brian at the beginning of next month to take part in the Foreign Policy debate which is to be held in the Chamber Tuesday, providing events this week will not be so bad as to keep him in the country.

Not a few members of the Government are perturbed about the situation in the frontier between the Mont Cenis region. They have followed with interest in what was said in the Foreign Office by Mr. Brian in Rome, who has now been asked to minimise the matter as far as possible.

It is a pity, considering the importance of the frontier, that the Foreign Office has existed for some time, and that events have not happened to give it a chance to do so. We write, brilliantly, too, and it certainly can do more to increase the influence of the two countries.

The reply of the Italian Government has been awaited with considerable interest by the Chamber.

The Balibrik Bogy.

Paris seems to have caught the infection that is apparently spreading among the French, Belgian, Swiss and Communists. So much so that the French Foreign Deputy has taken the lead of a large association of young men in the Foreign Ministry, and is going to fight Communism to the death.

This imminent danger seems to have caused the Government departments to act like a bunch of frightened children. There is a feeling that an attempt will be made to cover up the whole affair.

There are the pay of Roma, their supplies, getting away information, and so on, and they are pulling them into their hands for their own purposes.

The Government, although it may be true of revolution of treachery lately, is still in a panic in view of the fall of the frontiers.

It is a great pity that the existing groups are so impudent. Communistic groups do not make things easy, but only are there

to help in the Government in the various departments. But there is no need to be afraid of the Communists, and the two factors must be remembered before officials for the Government can be expected to take care of them.

It will be interesting to see how the French Foreign Office will go to fight the Balibrik bogy will go in their case.

The Dangerous Leader.

Unhappily, the ridiculous behaviour of the Chamber in regard to Mr. Marcel Cachin, the leader of the French Communists, has little to do with M. Poumès in particular. To have him present in the Chamber is a pity, and when he has been seen around, and seen him around, then only a few hours later can make him a laughing-stock.

Cachin himself is an interesting character, a bold speaker, and can run his fingers to almost anything he wants to do. He writes brilliantly, too, and it certainly can do more to increase the influence of the two countries.

His opponents in the Chamber have often been annoyed by his behaviour, and have been compelled to turn their backs on him, or sit at the other side, or at any rate, in the hope that he will not speak again.

Cachin's own tragedy is that Communists are not very good speakers, and that is why bringing about the revolution in France, which was actually in progress, was not a success. He has had to leave his colleagues and turned over to the Foreign Office, where he has helped to fight Communism to the death.

Whereas in France, last July, the exchange rate was 12 francs to the pound, now the rate of exchange is 12½ francs to the pound, which makes a considerable difference.

Last year, though, visitors spent a good deal of money on souvenirs, and the price of these things which they did not really want, but could not afford to buy, has fallen well below that level.

It is a great pity that the French Foreign Office has not been able to meet the demands of the foreign importers and dress goods and alabes which were not liable to be

taxed, and nearly every variety of perfume in her trunk.

Public Service. Harmon.

The French public services are being reorganised, and this time in the Telephone Department a new committee has been appointed, of which M. Alfredo Doudet, sent in from the Alphonse Daudet, sent in from the telephone office, a began message purporting to be from the Emperor, had been received over the phone.

The officials in the Post Office are also being reorganised, and a stamp from Comptroller of Posts.

Another problem looks like being cleared up. The air mail, from which the obnoxious stamps were put through so many hands, had been handled by a number of people, and it is possible that might have ripped off the stamps which were attached to the letters.

There is a record of over 1,000 cases of damage annually, and it is to be hoped that the opportunity of confessing stamp carried in a postcard will be given to those who have been made to pay for the damage.

The telephone business is much more important than it is in England, being proved now that a great deal of business is done by telephone, and that it has been more or less worked at to bring it into activity.

The Tourist Season.

As many English visitors as possible are expected in France this summer, and the Foreign Minister has, as a matter of fact, issued a circular to the French tourist bureaux full well that there is no need to be afraid of the weather, especially in the matter of expense as they did last year.

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



CUSTOMERS AGREEMENT IN EAST AFRICA.

Associated Chambers Seek More Complete Union.

INTER-COLONIAL ANOMALIES

At the meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce yesterday Mr. Freeman-Patten moved:

"That we support the value of the Inter-Colonial Customs Agreement; this Association is of the opinion that a fair and effective agreement is desirable as early as possible, and that it should be left to the Executive to press for the achievement of this object."

Opposition to the resolution was sweeping. By pressing for a full and complete union, the members were approaching Federation too rapidly, and were failing to take into account the fact that each of these territories had entirely its own history and its own way of life.

It was entirely in favour of ultimate Federation, but the members were travelling faster than they might have travelled if the association was taking place, and a communi-

cation was to follow.

The Commercial View.

Mr. Freeman-Patten said that the political aspect of Federation was not the main consideration to the community had always endeavoured to attain a more complete union through a commercial resolution. A similar resolution was passed in 1921 and again in 1923, but it was not until they did get a full Customs Union that the members became interested in fiscal policies. But that was a matter for inter-territorial conference, and not for the Association when it arose. He did not think that the members would be able to agree to be altered or a fiscal policy changed that this should defer their desire to achieve a more complete union.

They had always had a view of the commercial possibilities of the territories, and he spoke of that point. There was rather anomalous in the uniting of the territories, and that was that in Tanganyika certain clauses were paying duty on goods imported from Kenya which gave rise to many difficulties.

Mr. Wood said he could even argue with Mr. Aronson that there was a danger in the opening up of a dangerous wide swing between the two countries. The territories had a great deal in common that caused this. Was it not possible to cover the point relatively without the need of having to do with the whole of Africa? Would it not be better

BEARING THE COST OF RESEARCH.

Nairobi Policy Supported by Associated Chambers.

PAYMENT FOR SERVICE

The Association of E. A. Chambers has supported the Nairobi Chamber's proposal that the Nairobi Government should pay the cost of research.

The first Nairobi proposal was to increase the amount of the contribution of the Chamber of Commerce of Eastern Africa to the Association. Although the Association had never agreed to this, it had always pressed for the question to be referred to Government by Governmental services for the advertising corps and stock.

It was moved by Mr. A. C. Tamashii as follows—

"That this Association approves the agenda of the session of the Conference of the Chamber of Commerce of Eastern Africa at Nairobi, and that the Association should make a payment to the Association for the protection of the industry out of general revenue."

It was agreed that the cost of research should be borne by the general revenue of the Colony.

Mr. Freeman-Patten said he was in favour of the application of the Colony of East Africa to Government that there should be a change on the individual, and that the present position was not satisfactory.
