Balkan War.

BATTLE OF ADRIANOPLE.

THREE DAYS' FIGHT AT LULEBURGAS

TOTAL ROUT OF NAZIMS ARMY.

(Reuter's Special to "E. A. Standard.")

Balkan War. The people are anxious owing to the requisition of vehicles but it has been announced that these are only for transport experiments. The Homanian Government is sending field hospitals to Bulgaria and Turkey.

London, Oct 31. There are rumours current in Constantinople that the Turkish fleet has bombarded Burgas and that troops have been landed. The chief correspondent of an Anatolian Journal in "Istanbul," who is with the Bulgarian, reports that the arrival of the news during the battle of Adrianople released three brigades of General Franco's Army from the investment of Almafop. The battle began on both wings with an attack. Two large groups of Bulgarians on the right wing—on which wings the bulk of the cavalry—are operating in the direction of Luleburgas and Chirlik. Strong columns marched via Luleburgas and Haidar to the south of the Ergene river. The Bulgarians were driven back to the north-east of Luleburgas and the advance of the eastern group was delayed by thick woods and impassable roads which the rains had converted into a morass. The general advance of the Bulgarians was, however, not subsequently reported. The other columns marched via Mida in the direction of Sultanbaghche and Ispirahia. There are a hundred thousand Muselman refugees in Adrianople whose resources are being severely taxed.

London, Nov 1. Reuter's agent at Sofia reports that a three-day battle from Luleburgas eastward to Stran with a front of fifty kilometers has ended in the total rout of Sultan Ruka's main army. The Turks are reported to have lost very heavily and to have fled in disorder towards Chirlik.

Continuing his report Reuter's agent states that the Bulgarians in their battle of the 27th drove the Turks from their fortified positions and captured numerous guns and flags as well as other supplies. A lot of ammunition was also captured as well as many prisoners. The Bulgarians are now pursuing the fleeing and panic-stricken Turks. The Bulgarian losses are reported to be comparatively light.

TURKS CONSIDERING PEACE

Constantinople, Nov 1, 12 50 a.m. Grave news has been received from the front. The Cabinet is still sitting and it is believed that the question of peace is being considered.

Belgrade, Nov 1. The Servians have extended their grip over Macedonia as far as Prizren. Another division of Servian army is marching by rail en route for Monastir where they possibly might effect a junction with the Greek army who are last reported to have seized Grevosa and Kalla.

It is stated at Belgrade that the next session of the Skiptopia will be held at Ustah.

BATTLE OF ADRIANOPLE.

THREE DAYS' FIGHT AT LULEBURGAS.

TOTAL ROUT OF NAZIM'S ARMY.

(Heuter's Special to "E. A. Standard.")

Dubkarev, Oct. 31.

The people are anxious owing to the requisition of vehicles but it has been announced that there are only for transport experiments. The Rumanian Government is sending field hospitals to Bulgaria and Turkey.

London, Oct. 31.

There are rumours current in Constantinople that the Turkish fleet has bombarded Burgas and that troops have been landed.

The correspondent of the Australian Journal the "Hutchinson," who is with the Bulgarians, reports that the arrival of the reservists during the battle of Adrianople released the brigades of General Tzankoff's Army from the investment of Adrianople.

The battle began on both wings with an attack. Two large groups of Bulgarians on the right wing—on the right of the bulk of the cavalry—are operating in the direction of Luleburgas and Chocin. Strong columns marched via Hafsa and Haskopye to the south of the Ergene river. The Bulgarians were driven back to the northwards at Tchidjikani and the advance of the eastern group was delayed by thick woods and impassable roads which the rains had converted into a morass. The general advance of the Bulgarian army, however, was subsequently resumed. The other columns marched via Maida in the direction of Sultanbaghethe and Istantidia. There are a hundred thousand Mussulman refugees in Adrianople whose resources are being severely taxed.

London, Nov. 1.

Reuter's agent at Sofia reports that a three days' battle from Luleburgas eastward to Serris with a front of fifty kilometers has ended in the total rout of Nazim Pasha's main army. The Turks are reported to have lost very heavily and to have fled in disorder towards Chocin.

Continuing his report Reuter's agent states that the Bulgarians in their battle of the 31st drove the Turks from their fortified positions and captured numerous guns and flags as well as other trophies. A lot of ammunition was also captured as well as many prisoners. The Bulgarians are now pursuing the fleeing and panic stricken Turks. The Bulgarian losses are reported to be comparatively slight.

TURKS CONSIDERING PEACE.

Constantinople, Nov. 1, 12.30 a.m.

Grave news has been received from the front. The Cabinet is still sitting and it is believed that the question of peace is being considered.

Belgrade, Nov. 1.

The Servians have extended their grip over Macedonia so far as Pirrend. Another division of the Serbian army is nearing Prilaz on route for Monastir where they possibly might effect a junction with the Greeks who are last reported to have seized Grotova and Kalia.

It is stated at Belgrade that the next session of the Skupstina will be held at Tekak.

London, Nov. 1.

The Montenegro after the capture of Jick colorated the coasted by attending service at the Assisist Cathedral of the Patriarchs and Tu Damm was sung.

The Greek fleet has seized the island of Thasos and has ordered the islands of Thasos and Imbro, the latter being within fifteen miles of the mouth of the Dardanelles. There is still no definite word as to the Greek health in the vicinity of Bosphorus and Adrianople.

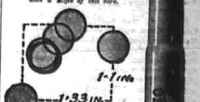

HINTS OF FEDERAL SYSTEM.

(Buster's Special to "E. A. Standard.")
London, November 8.
The House of Commons has adopted the thirteenth clause of the Home Rule Bill by 314 to 212 votes. Gladstone presiding for 42 Irish representatives at Westminster. In replying to the Under-Secretary Mr. Asquith stated that the scheme was not final but was the first instalment of a larger provision.

Both Mr. P. E. Smith and Mr. Dalrymple did not believe that the Government intended to introduce a Federal system.

American Presidency.

Latest Figures.

DEMOCRATIC MAJORITIES.

New York, Nov. 7.
The latest figures show that Professor Woodrow Wilson has 405 votes, Roosevelt 104 and Taft 11.
President Wilson has captured solidly the States of South Carolina, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Rhode Island, Virginia, West Virginia, and Wisconsin.

The voting in the New York State for Wilson was 629,000, for Taft 553,000 and for Roosevelt 419,000. The Democrats have an overwhelming majority in the House of Representatives though it is as yet impossible to forecast the position of the parties in the Senate. Both ex-president Taft and ex-president Roosevelt have sent their congratulations to President Wilson.

A later telegram states that the Democrats have secured majorities in both Houses. For the Senate the States of Colorado, Massachusetts, Montana, Nebraska, New Jersey, and Oregon who had formerly chosen Republicans have chosen Democratic Legislatures. These are sufficient to give a Democratic majority of five in the Senate. The results of several other States are as yet unknown.

NEW PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT.

Princeton, Nov. 8.
President Wilson in a statement calls upon the Progressive forces of the nation to join to save the country and the Government from corporate and private interests. No unregulated business man should need fear interference from the Administration.

BRITAIN'S TRADE.

INCREASE IN IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

London, November 8.
The increase in the imports into the United Kingdom during the month of October amounted to £10,251,792 and in the exports £4,787,073. The increase in the raw wool imports amounts to £229,244, or £142,460 more than in the corresponding month of the previous year. The increase in the coal exports amounts to £1,132,244, iron and steel to £267,310 and machinery to £300,000.

Parsee Ceremony.

INVESTURE OF SADRH AND RUSTI.

The very interesting ceremony of the investiture of the Nayab (investiture of Sadrah and Rusti) took place at Kham-baha's Hall, Mombasa, on Saturday afternoon, November 9, when the two sons of Mr. Kawaji M. Modi were inducted into the ancient faith taught by Zoroaster, prophet of Iran. The ceremony was a religious and poetical in its symbolism. A fine Persian carpet was spread in the centre of the hall over which a white cloth was suspended on the right hand corner of which the sacred emblem of fire was kept burning in a censer, the fuel used being sandal wood. The two children, dressed in white and wearing thread embroidery were seated in Asiatic fashion on a slightly raised platform in front of the Nayab, who was dressed in pure white robes, and chanted the prayers to which the children responded, each reciting those taken separately. The priest and lay standing up, the latter in fact invested with the robes and the hope of immortal life. This ceremony has also a particular hygienic virtue as no matter whether rich or poor, male or female, clean each must be put on the floor and worn next to the skin. Next, the Kuti is tied round the waist by the priest, the character a palm of blessings, tress of oil and celestial. The coal is made of 72 threads of pure lambs wool, indicating the 72 steps of the sacred book of Yama. It is tied in three knots as a daily reminder of the pledge taken by the Nayab, "only to think good, speak good and do good." Thus ends the actual Parsee religious ceremony, which bestows upon the youths all the blessing of the faith of Iran. It is followed by an Hindu invocation, mention which was added to the Nayab ceremony, after the termination of the Parsee to Hindu. The children recited their seats, and in the lap of each was placed a coconut. Honourable guests were seated into their clasped hands, with money and a "dun" laid. Their foreheads were then marked in Hindu fashions with red lines which meal is splashed. The priest then invokes peace and plenty which showering upon the latest followers of Zoroaster's finally cut-up coconuts and other fruit, ceremony completed, the priest was assisted by 12 mothers to dress themselves in the new suits of clothes bought for the occasion of the ceremony. The happy mother placed a ring on their fingers and pressed for maternal gift upon them, followed in a like manner by the friends. Next the host of assembled friends then their efforts, after which the boys shook hands and received the congratulations of all present. The priest was presented with apples with a handsome shawl—the highest honour which can be paid to such a functionary—Mr. Modi on behalf of himself and his good wife. A number of Europeans had accepted invitations to be present at the ceremony, and champagne having been unworked, Mr. G. J. Murr, assistant Chief of Customs, proposed the health of the children, combined with congratulations to the generous host and hostess. Mr. Modi replied thanking all those present for the honour they had paid in attending. Refreshments were then enjoyed and the Swahili band outside the hall played their usual lively tunes. In the evening Mr. and Mrs. Kawaji M. Modi entertained the Parsee community to dinner.

I think everyone would welcome any steps taken by Indian Merchants or any other persons to provide decent housing accommodation at low rents for the artisan classes, a want which is so conspicuously manifested in Nairobi, and if there are people prepared to step into the breach, every encouragement should be given by the provision of suitable sites, etc., and that at once. What I did say was, in respect of a suggestion that the Municipal Committee should undertake the building of suitable quarters and the granting of necessary funds for their erection, letting them out to Indian Merchants or other persons. I expressed the opinion that a large number of people in Nairobi would object to the building of houses with money, which would probably have a tendency to increase immigration into Nairobi, a matter in which they were not sympathetic; and consequently the matter should be left to private enterprise. Limoru Farmers' Meeting

QUARANTINE DISCUSSION.

C. V. O.'S STATEMENT.

A meeting of farmers in the Limoru District was held at Mr. A. G. Leakey's house on Nov. 13, to discuss a suggestion that the quarantine regulations affecting the movement of cattle into the Limoru District should be relaxed, and in respect Mr. Storey, C.V.O., and Mr. Banks, the quarantine officer. Considering the heavy rain the attendance was large. Amongst others were Messrs. Bradshaw, Caine, Campbell, Denton, Dwyer, Helms, Impey, Knight, Leakey, Macdonell, Stocker, South and Way.

Mr. W. H. Caine was elected to the chair and after introducing Mr. Storey and Mr. Banks, Mr. Storey entertained Mr. Macdonell to open the discussion. Several gentlemen spoke for and against the relaxation of cattle and Mr. Storey replied to the various arguments brought forward.

The Chief Veterinary Officer pointed out that Limoru settlers desiring to stock their farms, under the existing regulations, import cattle from the north, as far as Limuria, making them to stay stock from Boma and Johadani. The cattle could be kept in cattle from Machakos and Kitui after passing through quarantine points. He stated that the Limoru District was at present a clean area, and expressed the opinion that over the district a quarantine should be kept clean. There was the great probability of the assertion that the tick that carried East Coast Fever would not live in the District.

Quarantine regulations had recently been relaxed in the Nairobi Township—with the result that East Coast Fever had broken out on farms which were hitherto previously unknown and there had been many casualties. Regarding transport, riding, he was of opinion that the disease was introduced by transport that in any other way, and pointed out that if it were wished to take produce to Nairobi by wagon, they could have their own animals.

At the close of Mr. Storey's remarks a resolution was proposed in favour of the present quarantine regulations being retained, and carried unanimously.

The Indian Trader.

At the recent meeting of the Land Sales Association a resolution was very rightly passed asking Government to reserve the many Indian trading centres that have sprung up within the last few months of the Port Hill road on the Coast reserves bordering the road. That the Indian traders are a nuisance nobody who is in any neighbourhood of one of their "daks" will deny. They divert the main traffic from the coast reserve being to the native, and do not benefit through the change of emphasis. We heard the other day of a case in which an Indian sat on the road at the entrance to the reserve, and the latter having already paid heavily for the use of the road, the Indian, in the name of the settler, was himself taking the Indian to move his sphere of activity elsewhere. We consider that in the Highlands, at least, the Hill has the right to only to buy his own land but also if he wishes to trade, and that, if the Highlands is a shambles, a man should not be expected to be a trader against the Indian type. We consider that no Indian should be the foreign trader (on the Indian type) in any other words the Indian (those who are not artisans) should be set to do his own trade, and under supervision in a town, fairly honestly, viz. to buy and sell. Trading by Indians—and in "daks" the remark applies to Somaliland—a woman's country seems no useful type, is in competition with the white man, and is bad for the native in every way.

Wire Worm in Sheep

We recently gave an abstract of Mr. Threlk's experiments on this subject, and in the last number of the Agricultural Journal of the Union of South Africa a further report is published, which is of interest to those against the Indian type. Mr. Threlk states: "The facts which come forcibly out of the foregoing notes (on the literary side) of the report indicate that as long as sheep graze over a pasture which is infested with wire worms, so long will they become infested, particularly when the climatic conditions—sunlight and moisture—are favorable for their exit from the eggs and development to the unsuitable stage. Accordingly it must be our endeavour to free a pasture from infestation. This can only be done by starting the young worms out, which, as stated, will occur within a year when, no proper losses (i.e. all runtimers) will be over the wire worms. The farmer must, in the first instance, make arrangements that he always has some pasture at his disposal over which no rain has been grazing for at least nine months in any one year, so that the wire worms may die with it as well as when they are worm infestation. Before doing, however, to make take the second important step, viz. to clean his sheep from worms by collecting the sheep into a lair to dose them; this has been properly discredited by burning."
