PRAYER BOOK MEASURE REJECTED BY COMMONS

Disestablishment Being Discussed.

CONSCIENCE TAKES PLACE OF PARTY IN VOTING.

(THESEBUTTER'S AGENCY.)

London, Dec. 23. The House of Commons today rejected the prayer book measure by a majority of 247. Thus the majority for rejection was 247 to 107.

Prayer book questions were asked by Mr. C. Brudenell Carter, who asked for adoption after its passing through the House of Commons.

Mr. C. Brudenell Carter, First Com. of the Admiralty, moved a resolution inviting the House to direct that the Book be presented to His Majesty for Royal assent.

Mr. William Joyce Hicks, the Opposition, followed him and strongly opposed the measure. The House was then divided.

The Measure.

The Prayer Book measure, debated by 247 votes to 107. The House of Commons rejected the revised Prayer Book which was presented to the King for Royal Assent at the end of the year. Mr. Brudenell Carter recommended its adoption.

The Premier pointed out that all must vote in accordance with their own conscience but it is not, if the measure was rejected, that the disestablishment would become a political issue. He said that the Church would not give the dispute which would be raised by the measure.

Mr. Brudenell Carter expressed the opinion that the measure would be a blow to the Church of the Church of their authority and that it would have more than one result.

**COMMONS DISCUSS THE E.A. COMMISSION.**

**Constitution of Legislature Must be Considered.**

A considerable amount of questioning elicited by Labour Members took place in the House of Commons on November 20th, in the presence of the E.A. Commission as under discussion. The Commission could not report without touching on the subject of the constitutional position in Kenya.

The brief debate was inaugurated by Mr. H. D. Gwynne (Leicester and Sheldons) who asked the Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies the names of the members of the Commission which is going to East Africa.

Mr. W. Fisher (Leamington Spa) asked the Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies whether the members of the proposed East African Commission have been appointed; and, if not, what was the opportunity to be given to Members of this House to discuss the proposal of this Commission before such appointments are made?

Mr. Oswald Glynne: The Commission which is to be proposed by the East African Commission has been constituted as follows: The Hon. Sir Edith Young (Chairman), Sir Reginald H. Johnston, Mr. H. D. Gwynne, Mr. H. O. Gwynne, Mr. J. H. O'Connell, Mr. J. H. O'Connell, Mr. J. H. O'Connell.

**Commission's Work.**

Colonel Wedgwood: Is the right hon. gentleman correct in saying that the subject for consideration by this Commission is purely a financial one? If so, he is not going to interfere with the representation in the various legislative assemblies in East Africa of settlers, as opposed to Indians and natives?

Mr. Oswald Glynne: That arises in the next question. In the event of a scheme of federation being devised by the East African Commission, any such federation is subject to further consideration by all concerned, including His Majesty's Government. His Majesty's Government have an open mind on the matter.

Colonel Wedgwood: Are we to understand that this Commission can report without trenching on the subject of representation, which is extremely important to the people? Mr. Oswald Glynne: No, I do think it can possibly report without reference to the subject of representation. It is not yet possible to say how long the Commission will be in existence. It is not to correspond with altered conditions in life, a changing outlook and the financial needs of the people—a revision considered necessary by the very great advances in the industrial thought and the discovery of science and machine extending over ten and a half centuries. "In an age which has witnessed an extraordinary 'revolt of the spirit' which has not only altered the 'way,' the report declares, that the "Church has had to work under conditions fitted for a different condition of things, without the power of self-adjustment which is characteristic of the conception of a living church. . . . In the 16th century. . . the ideas of religion, morality and literature were in a Church and State alike, unorganised, but in actual contact with life." "I think it is not unusual to say that the Church and State alike should have gone their way without any mutual pervasion. . . . Blackburn) asked the Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies whether Northern Rhodesia is to be included in the purview of the East African Commission on other terms?

Mr. Oswald Glynne: No change is contemplated in the Terms of Reference, although I do think, but arrangements have been made for the Commission to stay a few days at Salisbury for the purpose of consulting with the Government of Northern Rhodesia.

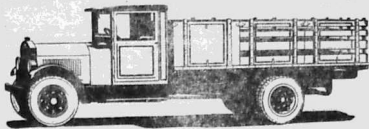

## TWO NATIVE VIEWS ON THE CONSTITUTIONAL PROBLEMS.

### Young Kikuyu Object to Representation by Europeans.

#### PREFER COLONIAL OFFICE CONTROL.

Not the least remarkable and significant evidence of the difficulties which beset those who would frame new constitutions in Kenya or for a greater Eastern Africa, is forthcoming today from two African sources—the Kikuyu and the Baganda.

The young Kikuyu movement frankly opposes representation of native interests by Europeans, and the principle of an Elected Majesty, and asks for a continuance of Office control.

The Kabaka of Buganda fears that his kingdom will be swallowed up if many other native tribes come in, and he suggests special protection in the form given to Basutoiland.

#### BASUTOILAND PROTECTION PRINCIPLES.

While the European and African communities in East Africa are discussing the political problems, it is not generally realised that the same questions are being considered by the native people.

The East African Standard has for instance received for publication the following letter which has been addressed to Government by an Association representing a considerable section of the Kikuyu in the Port Hill area.

Sir,—I have the honor to advise your Executive Committee in the various needs by the Kikuyu Central Association, the representative of the Kikuyu in the Port Hill area.

This Committee views that it is a wrong principle to place the native representation of this Colony under European hands who look after his own interests, to the central legislation. The Committee of this Association feels that as long as the natives of this Colony must be governed by non-Indians, they should be elected by their own members for the native affairs. They have these needs, requirements, business, customs, and traditions which are quite different from performing their duty properly. Again, the native members get nobody can change in European hands in Africa, in order to have a true sympathy between the native and the European, the Government has to through contact with the natives, as you know.

2. This representative body of the African colonies being with the great power to have that this Colony is going to be in the hands of the majority who enjoy privileged privileges as to extend the interests of the East African Natives.

3. The feared element that desires to be predominant under the control of one nation, is the one establishing native presence in respect of the rights of independence, body, and mind.

4. We natives will accept European native minds than this suggested East African Federation and responsible bodies. Self-Government, which will provide us with more and more the African people living in the Colonial Office.

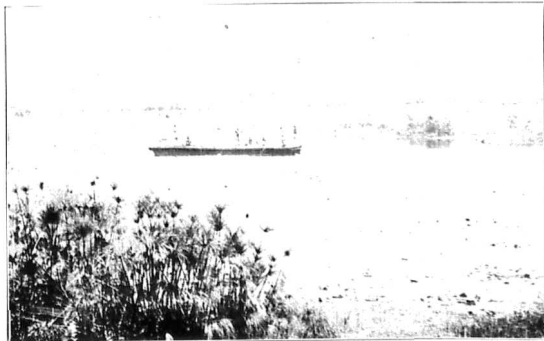

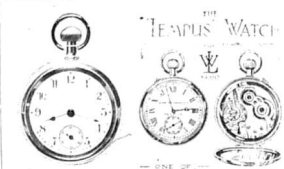

### OBITUARY

Miss M. Milligan, a Devoted Mission Matron.

FROM A CORRESPONDENT.  
The death took place on the evening of the 12th instant, at the Church of Scotland Mission, The Antonine, Ipswich, after a short illness, Mrs. Mary Milligan, A.R.N.C. M.H.O.S.

Mrs. Milligan was born in 1829 at Helston, Scotland. She received three years' training in the nursing of infirmities at the City Hospital and Edinburgh, on the completion of which she took a course of general nursing in the Edinburgh Royal Infirmary. She was also recognized by the late Sir Thomas Pearson, IV, Glasgow as her tutor, and also was a nurse of quite exceptional ability with a gentle, quiet, and reassuring manner that was helpful to patients, and with an enthusiasm for her work that constituted her as all such those who worked. On completion of her training she became for two years a Sister in the City Hospital, Edinburgh, after which she was attached to the staff of the Royal London Private Hospital, London, for another two years. On the outbreak of War she joined the Royal Red Cross and was actively engaged in nursing in a Hospital Ship plying between London and Malta. She was next appointed to the staff of the Royal Red Cross, and worked in the Country of Middlesex War Hospital.

At the close of the War she became district nurse in Marchant parish, Fife, where she gained in a high degree the esteem of all sections of the community.

Work in Kenya.

In 1920 she was appointed by the Foreign Missions Committee of the Church of Scotland to Dundee, where she worked in the Dundee Hospital. In the hospital she found scope, in the training of Kikuyu boys and girls, for her natural gifts of organizing and teaching. During her term of service she worked under five different doctors all of whom recognized her as a strenuous and successful fellow worker. One of them on hearing of her illness wrote: "I am very sorry for you and very very sorry for Funn Hospital. Only you who has worked in the Hospital know what she did for it and especially for the Maternity work. It is she who has made that."

She was remarkably gifted in the nursing of sick children and was a pioneer worker in Child Welfare among the Native children of Kenya. Early in 1925, on her return from Fushage, she was asked to develop this side of the work which was ever near her heart. Several of the children actually sought her practical advice in the rearing of their young Natives. Children, often war. Many young African lives were saved by her skill as a nurse. She was a sunny, happy disposition though somewhat retiring, never more happy than when immersed in her work among sick and especially among the children she loved.

She was actively engaged in her nursing duties till the 11th of November when in the completion of a week's absence she was immediately recognized by the doctor in charge that her condition was serious and although she was not at all confined to her bed, she was forbidden to continue working. A few days later she managed to walk to the hospital. When reported for her starting hospital, she protested that she simply had to see how an infant, that she had had under her care in hospital, was thriving. It was not until she had been discharged it was to be brought to her home for her attention.

Her illness continued to cause anxiety to the two doctors and Sister McArthur, from Kilbury. (Continued on page 31.)

was telegraphed for and was with her during the last twelve days of her illness. Dr. De Silva was brought out to see her and for some days it was hoped that she might recover sufficiently to enable her to return home to Scotland. In addition to the members of the Turin congregation about 400 natives attended the interment among whom were many members of the Kikuyu women, many of them members of her old welfare club, and others whom she had attended in the course of her life.
