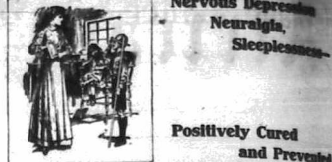
BOXES OF LETTERS ON FIRE.

Nairobi "Sanitation" Again.

ABORTIVE EFFORTS AT IMPROVEMENT.

For introducing again, almost "ad nauseam" to the public notice the subject of Nairobi drainage and sanitation, we consider it unnecessary to offer any apology; and content ourselves by quoting the words of our "strike" while the iron is hot. Therefore, we proceed to strike, and in the interim of that hot "green" we turn, with the health of the many inhabitants as much at stake, to strike hard.

While acknowledging these efforts in the right direction, we feel compelled to express the opinion that the authorities are only applying a sop to public indignation—so to speak—and that the efforts made so far, so utterly ineffectual and futile the efforts made to cope with the problems that face them.

For example, the ration d'ordre of this particular article is to be traced to the abortive drainage scheme proposed by 49 granted—Victoria estate, which followed in the wake of the scheme by the residents there and our article on the subject.

Behind the houses at the part in question, a narrow alleyway has been constructed to carry off the domestic and other liquid effluents. We do not complain of this, but what we do complain of is the lack of gravitation caused "either" in charge of the operations to ensure that water and similar liquid should be "run" down upon the ground? Whatever side-prod the moving spirit in this draining operation, the fact remains that the water, which is ultimately led to the large open ditch in Victoria street and there discharged its impure contents into a pipe which is practically a heavy shower of rain may chance to assist it to flow above its own level in the natural flush of the ditch.

It perhaps, did not occur to those responsible for the "scheme" that the heavy rainwater, entering and reentering the heavy drain would inevitably cause a muddy sludge in the stream, which would tend to destroy the continuity of free flow. A small bridge of light plank would have solved the problem and, at little expense, have completed an otherwise tolerable attempt to tackle the "difficulties" of the situation!

There is little more to be said—namely, the dirty, evil-smelling water, now removed from the gutter and carried to another—and there, too, citizens, if they choose to look, will find one more monument to the "scheme" which is not intended to attend to the welfare of the town. It might be an advisable plan to commence a series of lectures on our municipal and governmental employees, may be taught to efficiently execute their own duties. And there, our interim, we leave the matter.

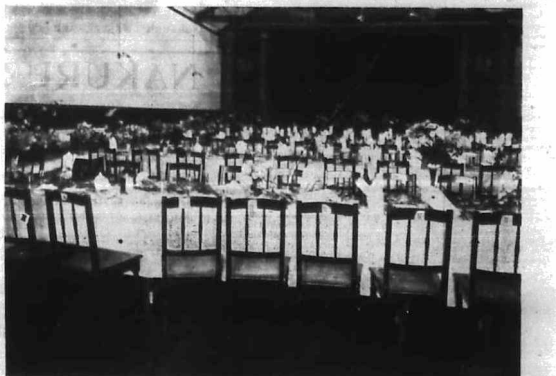




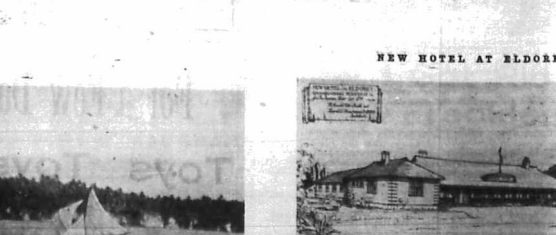

WORLD'S NEWS BY CABLE.

Defence of the Empire.

Canada's Offer of Three Dreadnoughts.

THE LARGEST AND STRONGEST WARSHIPS SCIENCE CAN BUILD.

Britain's Special "A" Standard Premier. British rose and treacherous Parliament for increasing the effective navy. He emphasized the great outlaying fact in the present position of naval power was that twelve years ago in every ocean of the world. It was to be a pre-emptive move, except in the North Sea. He considered the situation sufficiently important for Canada to give the Mother country that Canada should give the King 17,000 tons for three dreadnoughts which were to be built in Great Britain and placed at the disposal of the British Navy for the common defence of the Empire.

THE GREAT NAVAL SPATIAL.

Thursday, December 5, will be handed down to the world as one of the most important days in the ship life of this great Empire. The announcement that for the first time a world would take a whole and lively part in the defence of the Empire proved the enthusiasm and interest of the whole country. It was the first step in the winter of the northern parts of the continent people from the other end of the vast tract comprising Canada engaged in the Government's capital. An unending procession of ships sailing over the frozen seas to the merry tunes of bells carried their far-distant people to the House of Parliament before the eyes of the world. The very atmosphere in the House recalled to the sense of the history.

The Commons Chamber was crowded to its utmost capacity. Every all the British were present and also, readily, represented the H. H. the Duke of Cornwall and Prince Patrick who were given seats on the floor of the House. The Government and those who had gathered at the seat of Government for the occasion. The presence of the Premier, Mr. Borden, and his Premier Laurier, were signals for tumultuous cheering.

The Premier made an announcement of Canada's gift to the King for the purpose of building three dreadnoughts. In addition the Premier read a long memorandum from Mr. Ulmer, still giving careful reference to the relations of the British Empire of Great Britain, Germany and other Powers. Great Britain at present possessed the largest fleet of battleships and cruisers against nineteen of the other Powers put together. While in 1910 the fleet would be that Britain would possess 27 out of all the other Powers. The Premier said his mind was impressed that any action on the part of Canada to increase the power and mobility of the Navy would thus widen the margin of comparative safety. It would be everywhere a most significant witness to the unity and strength of the Empire, and the removal of the Premier to take the Premier at his own bidding and cheering and waving of handkerchiefs which lasted for some time.

Mr. Premier Sir Wilfrid Laurier then followed the Premier and assured him that the Government stood on a par with the Conservatives in their devotion to the Empire. He was glad to know from the purely memorandum that there was no immediate danger and no emergency. He promised any further results would follow.

Progress of Peace.

Allies Diplomatic Ruse.

Forcing Better Terms From Turkey.

Greek Warships at the Dardanelles.

GREECE ORDERED TO KEEP CLEAR OF ADRIATIC.

(Reuter's Special to "E. A. Standard.")

It has been arranged that the peace negotiations should be held in St. James' Palace, London.

Turkey, Bulgaria, Serbia and Montenegro have already appointed delegates for the peace negotiations in London. There was some consternation when it was realized that the first meeting of the delegates would be on Friday, December 13, consequently it may be postponed for a day or two.

Greek diplomatic circles in London announce that no misunderstanding exists between the Allies, the arrangements made in the armistice settled the general interest. This leads to the suggestion that the abstention of Greece from signing was a diplomatic ruse to make the Turks concede more advantageous terms to Bulgaria, while enabling the blockading of the Aegean Sea to be maintained.

President Danoff the Bulgarian Delegate to Chaux has returned from this town to Sofia. He appears to be most optimistic regarding the outcome of the peace negotiations. He stated that the Turkish delegates at Chaux's were most conciliatory.

INTERNATIONAL SITUATION.

Rome, Dec. 8. Marchese Giulani, Minister of Foreign Affairs, announced that Italy and Austria informed Greece that they would never attack the Bay of Vicos and that the Treaty of Sessene belonging to Greece. There are grounds for hoping that the question will be satisfactorily settled.

Virena, Dec. 8. It is sensationally declared that the international situation has not changed as despite repeated admissions from Rinnis attributed to Serbia it will intensify owing to the premissance of the military party.

It is reported that the Serbians have mounted several batteries on the Danube opposite Orsova.

LAST ASSAULT ON ADRIANOPLE

Balkan's news of Constantinople reports that a veil of Adrianople sent a telegram which is dated the 1st instant in which it is stated that all the forces of the enemy on the night of the 3rd instant annihilated the city on four sides but were repelled after a terrible battle lasting six hours.

BREAKING THE ARMISTICE.

Reuter at Cattloe reports that notwithstanding the armistice the Turks in the fort of Serris, which lies a few miles to the west of Serris, attacked the Montenegro troops on the 10th instant. The Montenegro garrison has not yet returned their fire.

GREEKS ADVANCE.

The authorities at the Dardanelles report that a Greek squadron consisting of six units was sighted off the Straits on Sunday afternoon.

French Interests in Turkey.

Reuter at Athens reports that the Greek army in Epirus has occupied Santagiarina, Dalvino and Argenteo.

Russian Honour for King of Rumania.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 8. Grand Duke Nikolai Mikhalovich has been King for Bukhara to present the flag of Rumania with the banner of a Russian Marshal.

DEATH OF SIR GEORGE DARWIN.

London, Dec. 8. The death is reported of Sir George Darwin, the second son of Charles Darwin the author of the Origin of Species, who was one time President of the British Association and was a member of the Royal Society.

TRIPLE ALLIANCE RENEWED.

The Triple Alliance agreement has been renewed without any modification.

NAY QUESTION IN SOUTH AFRICA.

London, Dec. 7. General Botha speaking at Grahamstown made a note of the "Nay" question regarding the naval question. He said the opinion in South Africa was divided as to whether they should continue to have their own navy or whether they should have their own navy.

HAILED WITH DELIGHT IN AUSTRALIA.

(Brent's Special to "E. A. Standard.")

London, Dec. 7.—Mr. Bonar Law with Mr. Angell's concurrence said on Monday when the Government will give the House an opportunity of expressing its deep appreciation to the Dominion for their part in contributing to Imperial defence.

IN AUSTRALIA

IN ENGLAND.

Mr. Macdonald speaking in Southport paid a tribute to Canada. He said: "I have seen many things in my five years service in the Admiralty which have given me great satisfaction, especially the uniting of the efforts of the British and the people of all I have seen repeatedly the evidence of national determination on the part of the Dominion to participate in the maintenance of the Empire in order that under the cover of a legitimate defence the British people may peacefully defend the institutions for the care of the needy and aid a sum to the total human happiness of the world."

Col. Neely speaking at Manor said: "We are not seeking war or power. Our entire interest will lie in maintaining peace and not in seeking new territory. We have no eye on the sea, but we have been for a long time the benefactors of the War Office who are the most qualified to judge where we can be of most service and efficient and more ready than I have ever been."

Amendment to Borden's Navy Bill.

CANADA MUST HAVE HER OWN SHIPS.

London, Dec. 7.

Brent's agent at Ottawa reports that a Liberal caucus has appointed a Committee to consider the House to formulate an amendment to Premier Borden's Navy Bill. The caucus is unanimous that the Admiralty memorandum clearly established that there was no emergency in jettisoning the contract of the Sir Wilfred Laurier's policy and they have decided to advocate the continuance of that policy. The caucus is also unanimous in declaring that the Liberals are willing to vote at least the sum suggested by the Admiralty in the memorandum as an emergency contribution but as they must give their vote should be towards a Canadian naval force which should work in co-operation with the Imperial fleet.

WHITE SENIOR IN CANADIAN WATERS.

Howell, the Liberal leader of the Ontario Legislature in a non-political speech at Galt's expressed personal regret that Canada was not maintaining as well as giving credit Howell. He would like to have seen the water, preventing the trade routes and Canada flying a white ensign in her own waters, and the integrity of the Empire and the Commonwealth was being in Australian waters.

IN NEW ZEALAND.

Tobacco.

Discription. Tobacco is a member of the Solanaceae family. It is a biennial plant, but is raised as an annual. The leaves are alternate, ovate, and have a serrated margin.

Distribution of Tobacco. Tobacco is grown in many parts of the world, but the principal sources are the United States, the West Indies, and the East Indies.

Types and varieties of tobacco. There are many varieties of tobacco, but the principal ones are the Virginia, the Maryland, and the Burley types.

CULTURAL METHODS. Seed-bed. The seed of tobacco is a minute, requiring about 2000 seeds to make one pound that it is necessary to plant the seed in a specially prepared seed-bed.

There are many other special kinds of soil, and it is important to know the nature of the soil in which the tobacco is to be raised.

For further information on the cultivation of tobacco, the reader is referred to the 'Tobacco' article in the 'Agriculture' section of this issue.

Where suggestions or protests have been received from individuals these have invariably received full consideration and I hope courteous reply. Lastly when the Government has been unable to agree with suggestions forwarded, circumstances dealing with the points at issue have been forwarded to the Secretary of State for consideration in order that all aspects of the case might be fully represented. There must be times when opinions differ and it is provided that all sides of the case shall be on an equal footing on the legal advisers of the Colonial Office dealing with the questions submitted on their merits. I now propose to deal briefly with the various points at issue raised by Mr. Struthers in his last the "Land we live in."

## THE HOME GOVERNMENT'S SANCTION FOR A LOAN

For the purpose stated is correct, also you are aware that a loan of £17,000 was made for the Uganda Railway now practically completed. One thing I am sure you are not aware of is that we shall have to pay 2½ interest and I am sinking fund on a total charge of £17,000 on all money supplied for this purpose. Next year our instructions are that the sum of £7,000 interest on the sinking fund to be paid out of our Revenue for the £17,000 applied for the construction of the Uganda Railway in 1910 or thereabouts after we shall have to pay an additional sum at the same rate, viz. 2½, on the loans for the Eastern Province and the Kampala Railway, and taking this into consideration I can see altogether that we want a larger share of the recent grant of half a million to the East Africa and Uganda Protectorates for the simple reason that we shall still require a Grant-in-Aid and for some time to come and the provision for this interest and sinking fund will be a serious call on our Revenue. You will understand therefore that, much as we should like money for development, we don't want to increase our liabilities for Public Debt more than the country will stand. However, we are getting nearer to the self-supporting stage and here it may be stated that we are only asking for £7,000 for next year in place of £4,000, or a reduction of £3,000, thanks to the able tenure of our Treasurer and his Deputy.

## THE CONGESTION ON THE UGANDA RAILWAY.

The storage of cargo on Lake Steamers, the additional railway, get down all the points to questions somewhat outside my province. I know however that the Uganda Railway Authorities are striving every nerve to meet the many demands made on them, not only in respect of cargo, but also in respect of the many difficulties they are called upon to face. I discussed all these points with Mr. Curtis and at the end of the conversation he said "Remember that the property of the Uganda Railway is bound up in the property of Uganda. The greater the output from Uganda the better it is for this colony and we will do all we can to meet it. It is to our interest to supply facilities for rapid transport and you may rest assured we will endeavor to do so." I am sure that the late Manager's policy is being carried out by the Railway Authorities and that the disabilities complained of will disappear ere long. We come nearer home to the

the latter soon to be known as the Kioga Marine, and it may interest you to know that it is intended that the Lake Kioga steamers shall form part of the Bugaga Railway Service after the 1st April next, which will allow of through bookings with the Uganda Railway system and I hope improved facilities for trade. This service when completed should be sufficient to cope with the increasing traffic for some time to come. In respect to Lake Kioga rates we are in communication with the General Manager of the Uganda Railway with a view to substantial reduction from the 1st April next and hope to arrive at a reasonable terms which will benefit all the industries concerned. Sanction has been obtained for the establishment of a

## SEPARATE CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT

to come into force on the 1st April next and I have no doubt but that Mr. Tennant, who has been selected for the post of Director of Customs will do all in his power to facilitate business. The proposal for the division of the East Africa and Uganda Customs is a thorny question which I cannot discuss here as it involves many other points besides Customs. I may state however, that the East African Government has agreed to a substantial increase in Uganda's share of the Customs revenue for next year, which is more in proportion with the actual imports into this Protectorate, and thereby one of our main grievances has been to some extent removed. Another proposal put forward by Mr. Struthers is for a

held by natives in the Buganda Kingdom. The question of undeveloped land held in native lands by other Europeans or Arabs is a thorny one in all Colonies and Protectorates and will no doubt have to be faced some day in Uganda. It cannot be applied

to the Buganda Kingdom only, however, as this would imply differential legislation which is prohibited under the Royal Instructions, and must therefore be extended to apply to the whole Protectorate. In other words, any legislation in regard to land must apply to European and Native alike. There are a considerable number of European and Muslim estates being developed in the East and Western Provinces and it appears to me that to impose a land tax on estates just being opened up would be hardly fair. At a later date this could be considered, but in the survey to date, however, and time shows that the tax can be imposed without undue hardship, any further action should be held in abeyance. I recognize your objection in regard to land in the Buganda Kingdom and an endeavoring to deal with this. One of the

## INCREASING THE SUPPLY OF LABOUR

is the substitution of mechanical transport in order to raise the heavy thousands of porters now daily employed in carrying loads. As statistics in regard to human porters are increasing, these have been sent for some time on certain of the main roads on which mechanical and cart transport is reasonably possible. On the Kampala-Habanga road the average is nearly 10,000 a month, while the porters on the Kampala-Luzira Road is known to you all. These figures refer to men with loads only. The last mentioned will be replaced by the Kampala-Luzira Railway. I hope we have ordered two more motor vans for the Jinja-Iganga road, which should save some carting, and private motor cars are also taking up the question. I must however impress on you that it is of no use making roads if they are not used for wheeled transport. The more this is developed, the more labor will be released for plantation and business purposes and to this end we must all contribute. A good

is being selected and with our present able Entomologist who is also qualified to deal with this subject we should have a sufficient scientific staff to meet all emergencies. I am I understand

for Lake Victoria and I hope this will allow of an accelerated service. The Uganda General is due to return from leave shortly and the question of an improved connection with Nairobi will then be gone into. I have already dealt with our programme for telegraph extension and in respect to the Government connection can only say that the proposal has been under consideration for some time and will be put into effect. It would be a boon to be able to fly away occasionally, transact one's business and return to Nairobi, and in the days to come aviation will no doubt have to be included in a Governor's qualifications, but like every other thing the time is not yet. I have attempted somewhat sketchily an answer to deal with the many questions raised in Mr. Struthers' able speech. There are many other things I might also have referred to at length had time allowed, more especially that part of the day's work which does not come under the public eye, such as the arrangements made by the Principal Medical Officer and his staff for

often involving the removal of whole tribes from fly-infested to fly-free areas and, last, but not least, to the work done by the Provincial Commissioners and District Officers administering the Protectorate. I have not altered their charge. The year has been a strenuous one for me and I take this opportunity of expressing my thanks to the Chamber of Commerce and Planters Association for the cordial assistance and all that they have given to my colleagues who have loyally supported me and whose gallant work often has been tried, I am glad and to the President and Members of the Caledonian Society for having me to reply to this old world-wide toast to night.

when we say we all have a part to play in the development of the land we live in. Well, we can only play to the best of our ability and with such means as lie to hand. Some have gone to the other side to rest with the Master of all Good Things and shall put them to work anew, and to them we give praise for good work done. That is their best memorial, and when the time comes for us to hand over to younger and able men we shall not be surprised that there are those coming after who will say: "They did their best, those men who went before, they did their best for the Land they Loved and Lived in."
