Portuguese East Africa.
The Mozambique Convention.

A STEADY IMPROVEMENT IN TRADE.
TERMS OF SOUTH AFRICAN AGREEMENT.

In the course of an interesting memorandum on the present financial and commercial situation in Portuguese East Africa, drawn up by Mr. Joseph Dyke, B.E.C. Commissioner for Mozambique, and submitted by the Department of Overseas Trade, it is stated that during the past eighteen months there has been a steady improvement in general conditions in the province of Mozambique, though the outward signs of this improvement have not become very obvious owing chiefly to the fact that all classes of traders and merchants have of late been disappointed in their hopes, and are awaiting the settlement of important questions outstanding between the colony and the Union of South Africa.

There is reason to hope, that, subject to the policy of the present Government being continued, the colony, in entering on a period of economic development which will offer opportunities to foreign enterprise as a market for the sale of goods and the purchase of produce, and for co-operation in the development of roads, railways and public works generally.

Roads and Communications.
 The construction of roads continues apace throughout the Government-administered portion of the colony, and in many cases motor roads are being built. This development, emphasised by the continual increasing number of motor cars imported into the colony—222 motorcars and 108 lorries, of a value of 488,000, valued in 1932, as against 210 motorcars and 79 lorries, valued at £10,893, during 1931—and by the expansion of motor traffic between Lourenco Marques and the Union of South Africa, and between Harare and Salisbury via Tete, will have a beneficial effect on the general development of the colony.

The possibility of expanding the transport of passengers and mail within the colony by air services has been brought to the attention of the country by recent visits of aviators, both from the United Kingdom and the Union of South Africa, and a scheme has also been mentioned for an air service between Kimberley and Lourenco Marques, via Johannesburg, by means of which replies to Johannesburg mails could be expedited by a few days, a matter which would be of immense value to the trading community.





Under this year's annual analysis the "BP" has yielded some very striking figures, showing clearly the trends of certain chassis features such as the six-cylinder engine, coil-spring system and plastic chassis. This analysis is based upon approximately up-to-date information on 1929 models, all the individual cars which are available in the British market being taken into account—American, Continental and British.

Multi-Cylinder Engines.

This year's engine is talking of multi-cylinder engines, and here the figures show 50 per cent. of the cars available have six-cylinder engines; last year the figure was 42 per cent. The straight-eight has increased its proportion from 9 per cent. to 14 per cent. in the same period, while the four-cylinder engine has declined to a position represented by 28 per cent.

As regards the engines in which engines are being built nowadays the figures show a small change from last year, the figures being much the same, but both the large one exceeding 1000 cc. and the medium-sized cars of 750 cc. have increased in popularity at the expense of the smaller engine. This is a natural corollary to the increased popularity of size and speed.

The study of the figures relating to valves would seem to indicate that the various systems are fairly evenly distributed in the 1929 models, as the figures do not differ very widely from those of last year.

The above-mentioned figures are given in the accompanying table.

head valves retain their lead over side valves.

Nevertheless, it should be remembered that several important features have reverted from overhead valves to side valves in being out new six-cylinder cars. The only reason that this has not affected the figures to any great extent is that other makers have at the same time been producing new overhead-valve chassis.

Operating the Valves.

This analysis does not show the means of operation employed, but for overhead valves the push-rod system is probably most popular, despite the fairly large number of new overhead-camshaft power units. Another development worth mentioning is the increasing use of a timing gear placed at the rear end of the crankcase instead of at the front end. There have been no further examples of a central timing gear since the straight-eight cylinder was introduced with a drive of this type last year.

The inlet striking engine development, such a perfection of the increased number of multi-cylinder cars, as the rapid gain in popularity of coil-spring systems. Only 10 per cent. of the cars were standardized on about 90 per cent. of the chassis available in Great Britain last year the figure was 67 per cent. and this year our statistics are much the same, 67 per cent. respectively, the balance of 5 per cent. consisting of coil-spring systems.

Engaging systems although little change, although pump-gear operation has gained slightly at the expense of the simple transmission arrangement. The coil construction of engine

and gearboxes has now become universal that this year it was reported hardly worth while to obtain any figures in this connection.

Discs and Gears.

Five-cyclers are now found on 72 per cent. of current chassis, the same type having become almost obsolete, and as regards the gear box, central control has gained in popularity at the expense of the right-hand gear lever. Four forward speeds remain the most popular arrangement (90 per cent.) in spite of the influence of American cars, which account for about 15 per cent. of the chassis analysed.

It is interesting to notice that there are now nearly 50 American cars with four-forward-speed gearboxes, this being mainly due to the development of the special "twice high" type of gearbox, with a third speed provided through a sliding gear. Other new transmission devices, such as the free wheel, are not yet sufficiently used to justify their inclusion in the annual analysis, but are being offered in increasing numbers by a large number of British car manufacturers for 1930.

As regards the remainder of the transmission system, the special type shaft is slightly more popular this year, with a proportion of 48 per cent., and the type of belt retains its overwhelming popularity for the first drive (92 per cent.).

The new hybrid rear gear, in which the centre of the pinion and crown wheel are considerably offset, has as yet found only 10 per cent. of the cars, but has performed remarkably well, so that its more extensive use may be anticipated next year.

tion to lowering the line of the propeller shaft, it enabling gear beds of stronger action to be employed for various loadings reasons.

Four-wheel brakes are, of course, universally employed, there being only a negligible portion of cars without them; 75 per cent. of current chassis are equipped with a couple system, the above in some cases providing a certain amount of servo effect. On the remaining 25 per cent. an independent servo motor—usually of the suction-operated type—is provided in order to assist the driver.

The suspension system shows but little change, although a general improvement in the direction of heavier and more resilient construction is noticeable. This semi-elliptic front springs are probably universally employed, while for the rear spring the semi-elliptic type is used on 75 per cent. of the chassis analysed. Castliver springs are slightly declined in popularity (12 per cent.), the balance being made up of cars with quarter-elliptic or torsion-bar springs.


This year a large number of car makers have adopted the blind-bush and shackle type for spring ends, and the use of these parts unnecessary. Another development in the mounting attachment for the rear end of an axle from spring, which provides steady steering on rough roads.

Finally, as regards the wheels, the wire type has gained in popularity since last year (54 per cent. against 41 per cent.) almost wholly at the expense of the steel arbitrary type, the wheels and wheel steels remaining in their previous position. (The "Race.")





H.M.S. Enterprise Awaiting Him at Dar-es-salaam.

HIS MAJESTY PROGRESSING.

Temperature Drops and Outlook More Reassuring and Hopeful.

Dodoma, Tuesday.

Standard, Nairobi.

In view of serious news of King's illness, the Prince of Wales has decided to return home as soon as possible.

LASEKILLES.

HOW PLANS WERE CHANGED.

(STANDARD SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.)

Dodoma, Tuesday, 2.30 p.m.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales is due to arrive back in Dodoma this evening and to leave for Kigoma at two o'clock in the morning but I am informed that the receipt of a code cable from England, which has been sent out to him by special car, may cause a change in his plans.

The Prince Returns.

Dodoma, 9.10 p.m.

The Prince arrived at five o'clock this afternoon and joined the general train at nine o'clock to night the direction of his future movements was reported to be uncertain. He will possibly leave for Kigoma at daylight instead of two a.m.

The Departure.

Dodoma, Wednesday, 12.50 a.m.

The Royal train proceeds to Dar-es-Salaam at four o'clock this morning. H.R.H. is understood to be proceeding to England immediately.

It is understood that a wire has been despatched that the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Gloucester are returning to England at once.

The train leaves here one hour and forty five minutes after the mail but the latter will be overtaken and the Prince will arrive in Dar-es-Salaam ahead of the rail.

The Locust Campaign.

Destroying Locusts in Kenya.

Effective and Ineffective Methods.

Recently a report was issued by the Department of Agriculture on the control of Locusts and on the locusts of the East African Standard. There remains on the scene a summary of the methods used in the last campaign given below:

DRIVING INTO TRENCHES.

Suitable only where the land is open and where the day is bright and hot. Requires a number of men, 50 to 60 yards under European direction. A variable percentage of locusts escape. Laborious and not efficient.

THE USE OF GALVANISED IRON.

This was erected in front of the swarms and the swarms were driven across a trench in which were laid a number of galvanized iron rods driven into the ground and secured a danger track to be used with a number of men, however.

ROLLING.

Useful only on level land where the insects were very abundant.

TRAPPING IN LAID BUSH.

Has the advantage of concentrating a swarm in a tight massing to be destroyed.

BURNING WITH PETROL SPRAYS.

These sprays were improved out of petrol cans using an oil valve and a copper pipe drawn to a fine jet. Air was pumped in and petrol came out of the jet at a fine stream in conjunction with bursts of petrol from a pressure pump. The flames were secured in the bushes in which locusts kept. Method rather dangerous and useful only in the evening and early morning.

BUSH HARROWING.

Very effective if done by a number of harrows closely following in relation.

SPRAYING.

By hand or by motor spray. Most suitable as the effect is continuous. May be practised for a longer time than any other method, unless a greater volume of locusts is used and is more certain. Use of 100 cc. of Arsenite to 1 gallon of

water. Most important that arsenite and water be mixed in a solution to be used by hand. The spraying of vegetation which is a lot of the swarms will do it as experience shows, not very satisfactory.

We sprayed grass upon which locusts were feeding in the hope that the locusts would be poisoned. This method was not successful. We found that the spray soon dried and left a faint deposit. Swarms would nibble round such patches. We also found that where grass was sprayed in a dry or hot area, the locusts entering the sprayed area would move rapidly through it. In one day deeper through and out of a belt of sprayed ground had a more deep forming a dense mass on the opposite side. One evening depositing a dense mass on the opposite 100 per cent.

CONTACT SPRAYING.

The most satisfactory. Sprayer locusts which approached with a power jet such as a hand pump (locust pump) will give it energy itself and use a manual pump from a motor truck. Lights may be used at night if necessary. Sprays are needed where they occur so as not to be missed. In the early morning the swarms which were not destroyed may be sprayed.

CONTACT DUSTING.

Done from the conditions on the evening on swarms and again in the morning. Particularly effective if there had been a night rain. Dust applied by a machine which puffs over 20 yards was not so effective as the percentage of swarms.

BEATING.

This is very effective under proper supervision on young locusts. Old motor fly-roller before use most useful and if a young locust is not found a sweep that which sweeps will be found holding on the back after the beating is finished. They may be readily crushed and used as at once. The method is to have a circle of boys surround a swarm and drive it inward and when dense enough to beat the locusts thoroughly and systematically. Use of 100 cc. of boys in well trained

Wireless Topics.

Care of Receiving Sets.

The Component Parts.

The following is the second of a series of articles contributed by "Q.R.M." on the working and care of wireless receiving sets.

The actual production of high frequency waves or oscillatory currents which have the transmitting circuit do not interest us in these articles, but only the oscillating currents flowing in an aerial, which produce electric waves. It is the job of the receiving set to convert these electric waves into audible sounds. The first essential function of the receiver is to be in tune with the transmitter and, whereas a transmitter has no auto-tuning and a condenser, the essential for producing such currents, so must a receiver have an auto-tuning and a condenser. The receiver has a serial tuning, inductance and serial tuning condenser. Inductance was first termed a coil of wire and a condenser can be likened to a jar capable of holding a certain amount of static electricity.

The frequency of the oscillation depends upon the size of the coil of wire and the size of the jar or condenser. If you wish to keep the frequency constant and reduce the inductance or coil of wire, you have to increase the capacity of the condenser; if you reduce the capacity of the condenser, by making the jar smaller, you have to increase the inductance by adding more wire.

The Condenser.

A few words about a condenser now will save a good deal of explanation later on. The aerial brings a minute current into the coil. This current is oscillating at Radio Frequency. This oscillating current does not drop in one direction. It starts to decrease and increase until maximum. When it starts to decrease it is called a negative pulse. When it starts to increase it is called a positive pulse. The direction of the current changes and the charge on the other set of plates changes.

Charging.

maximum and falling back to zero. Oscillating current is doing this continuously. The other kind of current known as direct current does not change direction. In a valve receiving set we have direct current in one low tension and high tension batteries. A condenser consists of two sets of plates, one of metal, and usually consists of tin, mica, shellac, glass or oil. If you put the two plates of a condenser across a battery there is a momentary flow of current into the condenser when it is "charged," or filled. The plate becomes positively charged and the other negatively charged. When these are charged no further flow of current takes place. Now, on the other hand, what happens with an oscillating current? I am going to call one set of plates A and the other B. In the case of direct current or current dropping in one direction, A becomes positive and B negative. In oscillating current the direction of the current changes and the charge is reversed, B becoming positive and A negative. In oscillating current, the charge on one of the plates is continually changing and the charge on the other set of plates changes.

Detecting.


Now we will pass on to the method of "detecting" oscillating current and converting it into sound. I hope that it is realized by now by my readers that sound or sound waves are not picked up on the aerial, but those of high frequency oscillating electric currents which, if not high enough, would be impossible to the ear. Last week I explained how a crystal receiver was tuned by moving the slider up and down until the correct amount of wire, or, as it has now been mentioned, has been found. Your capacity of making up the oscillatory current is there, though there is an auto-tuning. I will not explain where it is at the moment, but the majority of sets have a variable condenser which is constantly in "parallel" with the inductance, and it is no real practice in tuning to vary the inductance, but

by the capacity by means of a variable condenser.

The Phones.

I have certainly gone into the question of detecting. I will explain now telephones used. A telephone or rather a pair of telephones as many of our wireless owners connect electric currents into audible sounds. A telephone receiver consists of an electro-magnet and a diaphragm. This diaphragm is a piece of thin metal which vibrates and that usually sends good sound into the ears of the listener. The thin metal of the diaphragm is supported by the wood of the telephone and is held just above the coil of the magnet. This magnet is permanently magnetized, but the current of wire runs each of the poles. If a current is sent through these poles so as to create a magnet that they maintain the same direction, the diaphragm will be pulled closer to the magnet. If the current, however, flows in the opposite direction the magnet will be so strong, and the diaphragm will not be attracted in doing it. If the diaphragm moves sufficiently quickly it will send out sound waves, vibrating columns of air, which are audible to the ear.

I have explained how high frequency oscillations whose rate is anywhere between 20,000 and 3,000,000 cycles a second, and so on, or more, could be converted to such high frequencies, where it is at the moment, about 10,000 cycles a second. I should like to see a list of the highest audible frequency and a big drum is an example of a low


