The composition of the new Labour Cabinet has been announced, the members of which have already been received by His Majesty. The appointments to junior posts in the Ministry have not yet been published.

The outstanding appointments include one of particular interest to East Africa—that of Mr. Sydney Webb, as Secretary of State for the Dominions and Colonies, who retired from his membership of the House of Commons at the election having vacated his seat for Seaham in favour of the Premier.

Miss Margaret Bondfield has been appointed Minister of Labour. She is the first woman ever to hold Cabinet rank.

A non-political appointment has been made to the Woolsack, Lord Justice Saukey becoming Lord High Chancellor. The post of Attorney-General has been filled from an unexpected quarter. Mr.

W. A. Joweit, the famous K.C., who was elected for Preston at the general election as a Liberal, has gone over to the Labour Party since his election, and obtained the senior legal office.

Among holders of Cabinet posts in the previous Labour administration, the following have not yet been included in the new Ministry: Lord Olivier, Lord Chelmsford, Mr. Wheatley and Col. Josiah Wedgwood.





Last month the "Standard" published a cable from London manouncing the fact that Mr. Amery, the Secretary of State for the Colonies in the late Conservative Government, speaking at a dinner of the African Society, but restated the important pledge made by Mr. Churchill 13, 1922 only at the point where the development of his own mind and of the subject needs the more highly developed medium; in administration we use the local dialect as much as possible, in government we use existing authorities and and institutions. outhorities and and institution. 
