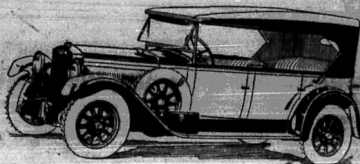

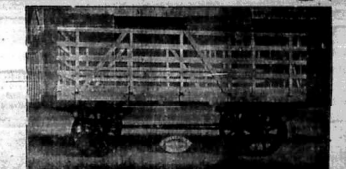

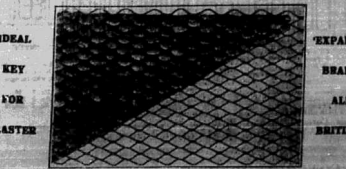

By this proposal (first used definitely by the Tanganyika Congress) the commercial community seeks to overcome the difficult question of essential powers and to be approaching the subject from a non-political standpoint, render an acceptable service to the public mind and bring it nearer solution. It proposes again its independence and intractable barrier of the political and economic aspects of the problem—especially the principle, accepted, that it be given more detailed study when the time comes to consider such a step as the transfer of control over land services and departments from a legislative to a Central Authority. That most, of course, be preceded by extensive enquiry—no doubt already partially accomplished by the various Governments—Contractors—not acceptance of the main and broad principles will make the formulation of a scheme possible. Letter Rates. ASSOCIATED CHAMBERS URGE A REDUCTION.

After hearing the views of the Postmaster General regarding a possible reduction in the cost of postage the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa passed a resolution on the subject. Mr. Bergum (Nairobi) supported Mr. Clark. He thought there would be a large increase in postal traffic if the rates were reduced. The resolution was carried.

Congo Traffic. CONFERENCE ON HOW TO RESTORE IT.

The trend of Congo traffic via Port Sudan and Beira is expected to see Mombasa as a rival with the latter by the Association of East African Chambers of Commerce. The claims of the stamp duties payable on conveyance was referred to at Thursday's sitting of the Association of Chambers of Commerce in Nairobi when the following resolution was carried:— "That this Association is of the opinion that the Stamp Duties charged by Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika are excessive and should be reduced to a rate of one per cent. This was proposed by Major John, (Mombasa) and seconded by Mr. A. D. J. Jones (Nairobi). The President explained that the duties in Tanganyika had now been revised to come into line with those in Kenya. The fact on conveyancing had now been reduced in Tanganyika to 2 per cent, which that payable on conveyance was now 1 per cent.

Immediate Transfer of Stated Essential Services.

JOINT DEPARTMENTS WITH ONE CHIEF.

First Stage Already Past; Real Closer Union Advocated from Start.

Morely White (Arusha) said that he had been in favour of the inclusion of the services of the Railway, Postal, and Legal Departments, but that he was not in favour of the inclusion of the Customs Department. He pointed out that the Customs Department was a service which was not essential to the territories, and that it should be transferred to the High Commissioner.

Private Discussions.

Mr. Tansill suggested that the simplest way of dealing with the matter would be to find out what was all on the dispute which had already been held. He proposed that a memorandum of the discussions which had taken place had been prepared and that they could discuss a copy of that which might save a great deal of time.

The President agreed with Mr. Tansill's recommendation and the discussions were entirely private and of a strictly confidential nature.
