A Famous Manuscript.

PURCHASED FOR BRITISH

(BY WIRELESS.) Rugby, July 29.
The famous Luttrell Psalter
one of the finest Buglish mediac
val manuscripts has been bough val manuscripts has been bought privately by an anonymons purchaser for the British Museum where it has been on loan for many years. It is understood the price paid was \$50,000. The manuscript dates from 1340 and contains over 300 leaves lavishly flustrated in colours and gold.
