





Native Women's Case Before Supreme Court.

Judgment was read by Their Honours the Acking Chief Justice (Mr. Justice Sheridan) and Mr. Justice Thomas in the Suprem Court on Saturday in the Crimina' was imposed by the Kyambu Magistrate on two old Kikuvu we-Magistrate on two old Kikuyu we-men who were alleged to have caused grievous hurt to a young girl of the same tribe by the inflic-tion of unnecessary hurt during a circumcision ceremony.

"In connexion with the perform ance of a circumcision operation on a Kikuyu girl aged, as we are in-formed, about 15 years the second class Magistrate at Kyambu found grievious hurt was caused with the consent of Wanjiru wa Kubai. the consent of Wanjiru wa Kubai. He then proceeded to acquit the respondents on the charge of grievous hurt being of the opinion that the consent of Wanjiru wa Kubai afforded a good defence in Rubai afforded a good defence in law.
