Imported Goods 78 per cent. Higher Than at Home.

The Cost of Living Commission issued a voluminous Report on Tuesday replete with statistical tablet.

The Commission finds that during the five years 1924— 1928, the cost of imported articles has fallen ten per cent, but remain 78 per cent, higher than in England.

Local foodstuffs have increased by 9 per cent, and the price of local produce is 42 per cent, above English prices on

Bread, however, is 147 per cent. above Home costs.

As local salaries are stated to be 80 per cent, higher than in England, the Commission thinks the increased cost of living is commensurate with that fact.

The Commission recommends consideration of provision of cheap transport between the suburbs and the town, either controlled Municipally or by the Railway. An immediate reduction in Customs and rail charges on baby foods is urged.

The chief recommendation is that a Board should be set up chief recommendation is that a board should be see to consider excessive prices at any time, to recommend when necessary the importation of efficient cheap substitutes, to enquire into causes of high prices and also into excessive rents.

The Report recommends a careful enquiry into the manufacture of bread and regulations to govern quality, price and weight. Bread and meat prices are definitely considered to be unduly high.

Encouragement of the building of flats is also suggested. The Commission upholds the principle of protection for some years but in the interval periodical review and, if necessary control of prices of local foodstuffs.
