



UGANDA.

AGRICULTURAL REPORT

In the annual report of the Department of Agriculture for the year ended 31st March, 1915, Mr. S. Simpson makes the following comments—

12. The past year has been another one of steady progress and expansion in the agricultural interests of the country. The acreage of land has risen enormously, due to the large influx of European planters anxious to take up land, so that land available for 4 per acre last year easily finds a purchaser now at the 20 per acre or even more. All the crops of the country have done well and transport facilities have not rapidly put forward. Developments are to be reported in every direction, which will in somewhat concentrated form adequate transport facilities. Attention is given to a large number of different crops to the diverse conditions prevailing in the country with a view to the expansion being guided along lines which are sound for the best agricultural development and best economic development.

COTTON.

2. This is the most important crop of the country and it is estimated that 25,000 acres are now grown. Last year the cotton crop's extensive failure was noted as a great disaster to the country. The agricultural season has already been held for making of a really good cotton crop. The demand for seed for next year's sowing has been enormous and seed is becoming very popular with the natives. This is purely a native industry, and the large export of the cotton to the thousands of small cultivators throughout the country. In the past the cotton has been largely handled after leaving the hands of the growers and before facilities for handling with the crop are in any way commensurate with the value and quality of Uganda cotton.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

3. The province grows by far the largest portion of the cotton crop and the crops should concentrate upon it at the beginning of the season so the crop is earlier than in the other provinces. Complete arrangements should be made for buying the cotton by the end of October with ample supply of money and bags available at the various centres, so that the operation of moving the crop may be started as soon as possible. In the Iteso, Bukedi and Lango districts a largely increased amount of cotton seed has been distributed, while the increased demands from Toro have been unrepresented. The estimated crop in Iteso this year is 2,000 tons, Bukedi 1,700 tons, Lango 1,000 tons, Toro 1,000 tons, and the production in Toro 874 tons. Further details will be given in this district are given below. Toro has suffered severely from lack of transport facilities, consequently the crop was sold at extremely low prices and there was therefore no incentive to grow cotton this season. However, Bukedi and Lango and Toro districts can be confidently expected to more than double the present season's crop.

TESO DISTRICT.

4. In this district the following quantities of seed cotton were sold in the various markets last season—Bukedi 600 tons, Toro 600 tons, Iteso 500 tons, Lango 500 tons, Toro 500 tons, Bukedi 125 tons, Toro 110 tons, Bukedi 10 tons, Kigezi 41 tons and Mganyo 35 tons, making a total of 2,874 tons for the district. It is estimated that 10,000 plants of cotton were sown to produce the above results and the following prices were received over £20,000 for the crop in this district alone. In the same County of the district the cotton was bought by small growers only, and the following table gives the quantities bought by each of the operating firms:

The general average production of seed cotton per acre in the district was 470 lbs., which figure is much below that which was reasonably to be expected in an average season. It is estimated that the seed was distributed last year. These countries possess a large amount of land which will be brought under the yield for more than 100,000 acres and have under some conditions of seed distribution.

UGANDA PROVINCE.

3. This season's crop will probably fall short of last year's, but the acreage figures are undeniably high. More seed has been distributed for next season than ever before, particularly in the Bukedi and Toro districts. The cotton grows really well. There is some opportunity for the crop to be raised in the north of Bukedi which will relieve a large number of parties who are engaged in carrying the crop to Kampala.

OTHER PROVINCES.

6. Very little cotton is grown in the Western Province. Improvements in the cotton are practically unrepresentative with such a crop. Progress is far more satisfactory in the Protectorate and when local growers are established, cotton growing should make rapid strides in the Northern Province.

THE COTTON SEASON.

7. This was in some respects a disappointing one. The season began well. In two the sowing was done under very favourable conditions. The rain was plentiful throughout the season, but in August a series of rainstorms and cold winds killed the crop a set-back. This was made good in September and October, and all would have been well if moderate rains had fallen in November and December, but a drought started in December and continued to the middle of February, which brought the sowing season to an abrupt end. It seriously reduced the yield from the very late planted cotton. However, the crop was harvested in good condition and prices were uniformly good throughout the country.

HANDLING OF COTTON.

8. The handling of the cotton after it leaves the hands of the growers admits of much improvement. The growers are trained to separate the clean cotton from the stems and to encourage the buyers most discriminate in price at the markets, and also to separate the cotton into different qualities distinct from each other. Unfortunately some of the natives still use fires for burning their cotton and tying the mouths of sacks. This fire must be put on in any amount of time to get into ginned cotton as it ruins the remaining portion of the cotton.

PRICE OF COTTON.

9. The first 170 bales of this season's crop have been sold at £250 per bale, which is a record for the country. It is to be seen that Uganda cotton is of good quality and that the natives will give for it care and attention in handling, ginning and baling.

NEXT SEASON.

10. Over 200,000 tons of seed have already been distributed for sowing purposes, which is well over 100,000 tons more than last season. More than two-thirds of the total seed distributed has been in the Eastern Province.

11. There are now three plantations under the control of the Department situated in various parts of the country. They are worked by District Agricultural Officers and are the means of collecting adequate data on the agriculture of the country.
