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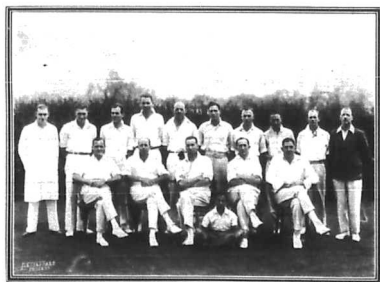

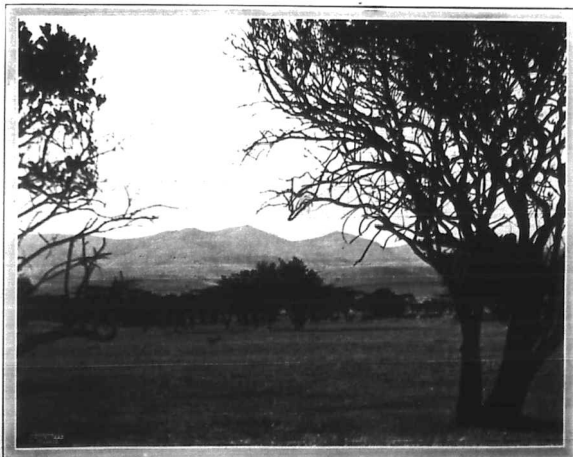

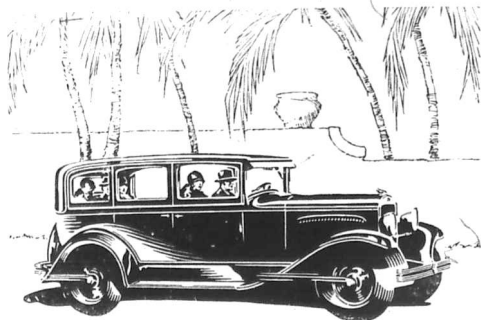

Yet, while sympathizing in their loss, we feel that to them it must be a matter of satisfaction to know that your translation to a higher office is a neighbouring Dependency.

"It is unnecessary for me to assure Your Honour that you will at all times and in every way be supported from the members of the Bar of this Territory a full measure of that loyalty, confidence and respect which is in the traditional practice of the Bar towards the Judges of His Majesty's courts the foremost hope that Your Honour's term of office in this Territory will be blessed with all happiness and success, not only to yourself but to the Territory.
