# MOTOR NEWS

From Road & Showroom.

## CHROMIUM PLATING.

A Review of the Position.

### UNFURNISHABLE FINISH.

When chromium plating was first introduced about two years ago it is generally agreed that it is a most important advance in the art of plating. It does not need cleaning with metal polish or similar preparations, as was supposed to be the case with the average owner-driver who cares for his car himself and takes a pride in its smart appearance. It was, in fact, hailed by many as the greatest boon conferred on the owner-driver since the perfecting of cellulose finish.

History, one is told, has a habit of repeating itself, and certainly the early history of chromium plating was not unlike that of cellulose finish. In both cases a new process was involved, and the natural result was that until the process was thoroughly understood and its details were mastered the results produced were not always satisfactory. Trouble was experienced, it will be remembered, with cellulose finish, and only as time and experience showed the causes of these troubles was it possible to eradicate them. In the same way some of the many enthusiastic owner-drivers who hastened to have their bright parts of their cars chromium plated found that after a few months or in some cases only a few weeks, the reputedly hard chromium was peeling off.

### A Missing Link Disclosed

The natural result was that the new finish suffered something of a setback, but actually this was all to the good, for it enabled the platers to overhaul their methods and find out where the fault lay and how it could be remedied. As better results were obtained and it was proved that chromium plating could be made as satisfactory as the demand for it naturally increased, now it is of course standardized in many cases. The fact that chromium plating has thus been standardized

is proof says A. G. D. Cline, in "The Automobile" that the car manufacturers have been convinced of its practicability, but it further must be noted that it is to be found in the fact that large accessory manufacturers, such as Willmet-Bredon, Ltd., employ it for their many products. It is used by them, for example, for bumpers, and in other cases, and it is the largest bumper manufacturer in Europe, who reports, even to the 2,000 sets per week, many of which are for export, even to the Far East, their considerable carriage weight. It is also used for door locks, over 1,000 of which are produced every week, and for body fittings generally such as door handles, body fittings in period styles, roof and window ventilators, calibrators, and mascot wings.

These productions are mentioned for the reason that in producing them various metals are employed, making it necessary to apply chromium plating to steel, brass, nickel-silver, and zinc alloy. These metals and nickel-silver are comparatively easy to chromium plate, but steel and zinc alloy offer more difficulty.

The method adopted is, briefly, first to use a coating of nickel plate, and this is put on comparatively thickly. The nickel plate is then polished, and finally the article is chromium plated, only a very thin coating being used. No further polishing is necessary, as the chromium plating is bright as it leaves the vat in which it was deposited.

### Plating a Bumper.

In the case of bumpers, the bars of which are of course of spring steel, the first process is the actual formation of the bumper bar. This is then treated to give it the required degree of springiness, and before it is plated it is sandblasted, and then polished on those parts where a bright finish is required. It is important to notice that any weakness in the nickel plating is so removed in an extraordinary way found only by the chromium plating, which seems to cause the nickel to peel off, whereas otherwise it would probably remain in place at least for some time. For this reason that steel parts are sandblasted, all over to remove every particle of scale, and then, when they have been polished,

ed, they are given a coating of nickel approximately one and a half thousandths of an inch thick. The nickel plating is then given a finishing polish on those parts which are required to be bright, and finally the article goes into the chromium-plating vat.

When articles of this size are chromium plated the finished article is rather thick, and it is not unusual to find that the weight of an inch, and it has been found essential to ensure that the nickel deposit quantity. A very high current density is used, and this is maintained, but must be used not to employ too high a current density, or parts of the article, especially any pointed parts, may be burned.

Naturally in dealing with such large quantities of articles any trouble in the plating department seriously holds up deliveries, and for that reason the very latest plating plant is used for depositing both the nickel and chromium coatings. In the nickel plating vat, the electrolyte is constantly agitated by compressed air, while the articles to be plated are moved to and fro in it.

### Three Essentials.

As regards the chromium-plating vat it has been found that good contact is essential on account of the low voltage used, and the marking of one article by another, or one part of an article by another part, must be avoided, so that considerable thought has to be exercised as regards the actual manner in which the various parts are placed in the vat. There is no doubt, however, that the principle having been established, the main consideration is attention to detail, and especially to cleanliness, good contact, and the avoidance of marking.

It only remains to be said that chromium plating must be intelligently dealt with. It is unsatisfactory, and therefore, there is no use to employ any cleaning compound on polished. It should be remembered also that the chromium plating itself is a very thin skin, and that when it is necessary to remove mud from it it should be washed off with warm water and soap. This will leave the plating quite clean, and if so desired, be dried by wiping it over with a damp leather.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY POSITION.

First Fall in Membership for Five Years.

PROPAGANDA PROPOSED.

Expenditure Nearly Double the Regular Income.

For the first time in five years there has been a decrease in the number of Full Members who have paid their subscription to the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of Kenya.

The regular income, apart from the profit on Show, is estimated to be only £2,500. The Committee are unable to cut the expenditure further.

An appeal is made for increased membership as the only solution to the position.

COMING SHOWS.

The annual general meeting of the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of Kenya was held in the New Ballroom, Hotel Victoria, Nairobi, on February 27th.

The income and expenditure account for the year 1929 shows an excess of revenue over income amounting to Sh. 8,100/0.

The Society's Show grounds amount to Sh. 4,383/7/6 as compared with Sh. 4,281/10/6 in the previous year.

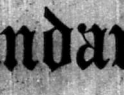

### Gold Buttons for Suffer.

White Jacket: First one quart of new milk to 80 F., but on no account boil it. Great care should be taken, however, to have it just warm, or the wine will curdle it. Strain in the milk four tablespoonful of sugar; add three tablespoonful of dairy; and finally stir in two teaspoonful of liquid rennet. Pour at once into a deep glass dish, or into separate glass tins in a warm place, away from

the fire, until firm—say, from 30 to 40 minutes—then put it where it will become ready for the table. This should be prepared about an hour before serving.

Scotch Whisky: Ingredients: One pound of caster sugar, four ounces, two ounces of gelatin, half pint of water, and a small quantity of two grains of vanillin of two grains of water. Dissolve the gelatin in the water and add the sugar and flour of almond. Beat the whites of eggs very stiffly, mix into the above ingredients, pour into a mould, and leave to set. Serve very cold.

Mascarpone: Ingredients: half pound of sweet almonds, half pound of caster sugar, two whites of egg, flavoured. Blanch the almonds and pound them with the whites of one egg; gradually add the other egg white with the sugar and flavoured and beat the whole to a smooth paste. Force this mixture through a bag on to an old paper, in rounds or oval shapes, and bake in a very slow oven till dry, like macaroni.

# MOTOR NEWS

## A MOTORING POT-PORRI.

### Soviet Russia's Motor Group.

### TRAFFIC CONTROL IN MOSCOW.

The Soviet Republic, realising that the need for good roads to open up the interior to trade and commerce has far outstripped the automobile, has formed a special automobile association known as the Automobile Society of Automobiles and Roads.

Throughout Russia's great stretch of land, housing about 150,000,000 persons, there are only 21,000 automobiles. This is attributed to the lack of good roads.

The plans of the Avtorok club and building programme of 10,000 miles of roads and 17,000 miles of modern surfaced roads within 20 years. These roads are concentrated, where they will have created a greater market for motor vehicles because the Avtorok is participating in plans for an automobile plant at Moscow. A total of 100,000 automobiles yearly has been set.

Motor cars are becoming popular. They were first used in Moscow in 1925 and by the end of 1927 there were 100 in the city. This year an appropriation was made for the purchase of 800 additional buses to form a transport in the city. Within the next three years the number of buses in operation within Moscow will be 7,000 and more than 5,000 modern taxicabs will also be in service by the end of this year.

Each piece that makes up the train is numbered and filed. Steering wheel and post, wheels, motor and body rods each are separate units.

The vehicle has three wheels, and can be assembled in a few minutes.

**Norway Bans "Trotting."**  
The Royal Automobile Club of Oslo, Norway, has issued a bulletin which is a statement of the club which has been adopted for automobile clubs in Norway. The club maintains that no driver need use his horn within the limits of a city, that speed should always be so moderate that collisions can be avoided, and that cars turning corners and curves at night give sufficient warning by their headlights.

The club also proposes that the use of horns be made a punishable offence.

France is also reported to have been experimenting with x-ray driven cars with excellent results, and the police of Madrid have been using similar devices for public bus routes are being fixed for making emergency repairs.

**Japan's Advance.**  
The Japanese government plans to spend \$20,000,000 over a period of five years for the purchase and awarding subsidies to various industries connected with automobile production. There is now an automobile factory in operation.

## INTERNATIONAL RUGBY.

### France Favorites for Championship.

### IRISH DEFEAT CHANGES OUTLOOK.

(STANDARD) CORRESPONDENT, London, (By mail.)

Another complete surprise was experienced in the Rugby world on Saturday by the win of France over Ireland by 6/0. Not only has this victory added as a complete surprise, but it has changed the whole international Rugby outlook. The French team, by successive victories over Scotland and Ireland, must now be considered favorites for championship honours.

Since France played first international match—with England in 1905—only once before have they won two games in a season. This was in 1921, when they overcame Scotland at Inverleith and Ireland in Paris, but those games were not in succession. What will now happen? With Scotland, Wales, and Ireland already defeated, if France can, at last, "hold" England at Twickenham, they should win the championship, for they have won White in the Irish.

From an Irish point of view, the game revealed a weakness in the back division. The French scored their victory by a goal in nothing for two days, but they were superior in speed and their tackling was deadly and accurate.

They gave out the impression that not only their hands, but their brains worked much more quickly than those of the Irishmen. With a strong pack playing their hardest, the Irish backs had more of the ball than their opponents, but they did not give home the undoubted advantage.

It was a most strenuous battle between the forward, who put every ounce of strength into the game. One great fault of the Irish backs, especially when they were in arrears, was "kicking to

leash. Their defence, like that of their opponents, was superb, but they were easily stopped when they opened an attack, and indeed they seldom got more than one or two free passes with the ball before being broken down.

As regards the play, the weather was good, but much rain having fallen in Dublin recently, the turf was very soft on top, but, all things considered, is reasonably good condition.

The match was on the whole disappointing and seldom reached international standard.

### The Game

Ireland looked off just after 3 o'clock, playing open with several scrums, until Tallowan found touch inside the Irish half. Hunt, bolstered by some of the French forwards, got a useful kick, and a little later an amalgam of kicks ended in France's favour. Then English broke through slightly, but his pass went astray. Skill, with France penalised twice, Ireland gained ground. The Frenchman appeared rather over-enthusiastic and took some time to settle down to their proper game, but the evening's play was very moderate. Ireland at last started a passing movement, but were soon checked.

A little later, Ireland were again penalised. George Stephenson's free kick was a good attempt to kick a goal after his first kick had been disallowed, owing to the French forwards near the ball jumping up. The ball had landed in the quarter of an hour, and there had been no signs of any really effective handling by either set of backs. Then Ireland intercepted a free Irish pass, and ran through, putting over Hunt's boot, but Stephenson kicked over the dead ball line.

This was a narrow escape for Ireland. George Stephenson's free kick averted the situation. From the ensuing scrum Ireland made ground, play soon being back in the order.

At last, after 25 minutes, there came an attack by Ireland. Drive running through and passing out to Stephenson, who sent "Gaily" away. Gaily returned at hand pass, which, however, was intercepted. Then Balliste cut away to France, but was well tackled, and from any point of view it seemed odd to kick a penalty goal for Ireland.

France attacked at the outset of the second half, but were quickly repelled by a great run—the best in the match—led by Payne. They were up his carry in 10, but France kicked over their goal-line. From the ensuing scrum France got away quickly. Balliste clearing the way for Shannon to run strongly along the wing, and score. Ambery, unopposed, and France in five minutes led by first points.

The Irish try, which Irish defence is doing very badly. The Frenchman played with rare dash. Free that, but these last were not continued to be done by their forwards, of whom Eilers and Galla were very good.

The French kicking remained very good and determined, and the Irish backs experienced much difficulty in getting away. Try as they would, Ireland could make no headway, the French forwards being too powerful for them, while the Irish three-quarters had not sufficient pace to beat their opponents' numbers. Maguire left the field just before the end, but returned.
