It makes very interesting reading to see that Baron Richert's East African safari kept in contact with wireless communication in Nairobi. This makes the third expedition of safari that has used wireless in Kenya Colony, to keep in touch with the outside world.

The first was the Chevrolet "Cape to Cairo" expedition, in which wireless communication was kept up by means of amateur transmitters down in the Union. The operator on the expedition was "Wally," a well known member of the R. A. R. N. I., working under the call sign of FK 288. Communication was maintained the whole time with South and communication was kept with local amateurs, although there were no regular schedules.

The second was the Metrofildwyns filming expedition. Communication was maintained between the expedition and Nairobi by means of On the Vines of the expedition, an American amateur, using call sign FK 228 and On Programme in Nairobi using call PK 228. Communication was maintained even from the Belgian Congo and a schedule was also kept with GM 261 at Mombasa using call FK 268. The wave in general use was 11 meters.

It must not be thought that the system set used on this expedition was cumbersome or expensive. The tall masts of Mombasa Radio or the antenna on ships must not be taken as an example of what is required. The small transmitter and receiver were not bigger than an ordinary suit case and could be carried by one man. The mast and aerial system was a very light telescopic mast some twenty to twenty-five feet high. The antenna wire was a small petrol engine, similar to a small motor engine, which was used to oscillate with a dry range of 400 to 500 miles and a night range up to 8000 miles, according to the wave in use, could be carried by two men. A small load for the average car,

**The Short Wave Receiver.**

As has already been mentioned in these articles the receiver for short waves vary little in general principle from other receivers but have to have certain modifications. The general receiver in use these days is either a two, three or four valve set. Any of these receivers can be used in the three methods to receive broadcast, but the most direct way is station.

The two valve type, which consists of a detector and one stage of low frequency amplification, needs local phones. The three valve detector and two stages of low frequency amplification can be used in general, with a loud speaker. Another type of three valve set is one with one high-frequency stage detector and one stage of low frequency amplification. The latest type of receiver uses one stage of high frequency amplification, detector and two stages of low frequency amplification.

It will be found that receivers are built to that the signals enter on the left hand side, and come out, via the loud speaker, on the right hand side. The signal will be the high frequency valve, the next the detector valve, and the last two, the low frequency valves. Between these two latter and between the detector valve will be between the low frequency transformers. These will be recognised as being in metal containers about six inches long by four inches wide by four inches high. There are four terminals, two of each end. These do not need insulating except in case of a fault when they must be replaced. There will be found on them such particulars as "51g to 11" or "5 to 1", and when replacing them transformers with

the same ratio must be used. Of this more later.

On the extreme left will be found the tuning coils which are some form of plug in coil having to be turned according to the wave in use. Between the high frequency valve and the detector will be found more coils. In some cases the first set are omitted only leaving the coils between the detector and high frequency valve. According to the number of coils in use there will be two or three tuning condensers which are used to make the actual adjustments to wave length (assuming the right coils are inserted). Before going into the question of tuning it would be as well briefly to touch on what is meant by high and low frequency stages and detectors.

The actual wave picked up by the receiving aerial is similar to the waves seen on the ocean. There is a steady series of waves of various heights and distance upon which can be noticed numerous small waves of varying height. If we assume the steady wave to be the carrier of the station, transmitting, and the smaller waves the modulation—as the music or speech is called—will have a good idea of what is picked up by the receiving aerial.

Once the carrier wave has brought the music from the broadcasting station to the receiving set it has done its work. The function of the detector valve (or crystal, in the case of crystal sets) is to filter out the carrier, leaving only music or speech vibrations. The purpose of low frequency amplification is to amplify these received signals, after being separated from the carrier, to a stage of loudness suitable for a loud speaker or a comfortable strength in telephones. The more stages of low frequency amplification—a stage consisting of a transformer and a valve and any necessary auxiliary apparatus—the stronger will be the signals. Pure general use two stages are efficient, if more be used lowering and other complications set in, which are

Mr. Mengar: Did you beat around in return for the kick—I said to him: "It is not going to beat you, but will take you to the police-station."

Mr. Mengar: How did it happen, then, that his clothes were all pulled off, that his turban was scattered, and that he was disarmed when he got to the police-station? His tunic fell off on the ground when he was struggling with me on the way to the police-station.

High frequency signals amplify the combined signal of carrier and modulation before it is filtered. "Unemployment so far as I am concerned is not a matter of life and death to me. I think that any employed here is not so bad as an idler or a loafing African. I only know about 400 who are unemployed. I was on the Council about four months ago, and there were a few jobs advertised, but there were some about 400 applicants for every one of them. But, they do not want to go. I have seen several advertisements for clerical positions in the 'register'."

"I think it is a very difficult thing that women are going to work, if there is work for them. Most people go to Home bank. Well, it is very hard to go Home unless you are in Government service. I have no more against the married women working—unless there was a big surplus of jobs unemployed."

"Always going Home, in some cases the wives do not get a free railway Home. All their things have to be sent, it is very hard for a man to save for his wife and family. As far as I know, very few men could do the job of the women employed. Mostly the men unemployed are engineers, or other craft like that, and they are not fitted for typewriting and jobs in the clerical line."

In Comment

Mr. E. M. Lay, Managing Director of Messrs. B. Jacobs, in approving of women working, pointed out rather strongly the economic side of the subject.

"As far as B. Jacobs, Ltd. are concerned," he said, "the point hardly arises, as in no case is a man kept out of a job by a girl. Those jobs that are done by women are those to which only a small salary can be attached, and the woman is a girl living with her parents or relatives."

"There are, of course, certain jobs for which only women are suitable. To replace any eight or nine of the girls employed by us, we would still be salaried by about £1,000, or more, not unreasonably, demand a salary on which they can live independently, but a woman is naturally out of the question."

"It may be that amongst applicable preferences is given to those to whom a salary is a vital necessity, but, apart from this, the

capacity and ability of the applicant is the prime consideration."

The P. M. O.

Dr. O'Brien, Director of Medical and Sanitary Services, said: "I have nothing to say against women working. It seems to be that the question is not of whether or not we have men to deal with trade street traffickers, and people like that, who don't know their work."

Mr. E. W. Ford, General Manager of Messrs. Willaway, Laidlaw & Co., Ltd. also addressed in many of the notes of the interview.

"I think a wife going to work often helps out an enterprise very difficult financially to maintain. The fact that a wife is able to work frequently enables a couple to get married so early, in many cases."

"It is rather a reflection on a man's economic capacity if he is not able to support his wife in an urban Colony that wife has to seek to do something. I think at the back of all is the lack of home-interest among the women. For there are natives to do most of the work. Thus, there is little household work left for women."

"I have had them (wives) come to me, and they have said: 'It is not a question of salary, but I simply look at it as a business proposition.' They don't work for a lower wage because they can't manage. They have not got a position that could be filled by a man, which is more being filled by a married woman. It is a simple question of economic necessity."

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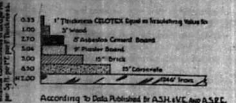

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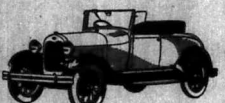
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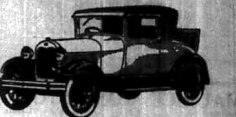

Mr. G. F. L. Burton, the Director of Plant Breeding, writes on an article entitled "As a Farmer's Opinions." This article deals with the industry generally and contains advice as the result of experiments at the Kenya Plant Breeding Station.

while entomologists in the Colonies are shown from time to time. In the Plant and Animal products Departments institutions and enquiries relating to food-stuffs of local, essential oils, rubber fibres, tobacco, timbers, gums and resins and such products are conducted. An advisory council has been appointed and a central advisory committee including representatives of the various countries interested in the work on rubber, tanned skins, vegetable fibres, animal fibres, tanning materials, essential oils, resins, oils and seeds. The Mineral Resources Department is responsible for dealing with all enquiries and investigations of a mineral nature. An advisory council on minerals has been appointed and there are several advisory technical committees, each dealing with a special group of minerals and metals.

**East Africa's Share.**

This is an Empire concern in which the East African territories all have a share. Here, these problems of a scientific nature which cannot be investigated by the means on the spot, or any of a nature which may prove helpful in their solution in other parts of the Empire, are undertaken by specialists. It may come as a surprise to the majority of East African settlers to know that the Institute is open to colonial Governments not only on behalf of Colonial Governments but also for individuals. For instance, if a settler discovers a new plant of an unusual type, or found a nut which on examination yields latex, or if the Imperial Institute which through investigation will be made and a report submitted to the individual.

**Timber Oil.**

Another example of a new striking character may be given since it is of interest to East Africa and to Tanganyika particularly. It concerns the development of the productive sources of tung oil. This essential oil which has been produced only in China, and now through the agency of the Imperial Institute, seeds have been sent on to Tanganyika and the experiments which are being conducted in the Masaka Territory reveal every possibility of successful production. In laboratory conditions experiments are conducted in conjunction with Lew Guthrie and the production of raw materials and the facilities in the Colonies is arranged in every way. East Africans now on leave will find ample reason for any time spent in visiting the Imperial Institute. One of the most interesting ways of bringing the East African colonies to the state of

perfection, which appears to be difficult to achieve in other directions in London where the territories are included in the right hand, would undoubtedly be in the hands of the Imperial Institute. It is not clear if East Africa's name in the Permanent Exhibition is securely and fully represented by the colonies.

East Africans may find room for plenty of improvement and it is only by visiting the Institute and pointing out the shortcomings that improvement can be made. They will find that the staff not only includes but is made of men and women from the Colonies and of the best available scientific experts have to make for the improvement of the colonies in which they are specially interested.

**A Tour in Africa.**

A representative of the "East African Standard" had an interesting talk recently with the Chairman of the Advisory Committee of the Imperial Institute, Mr. Norman Robson, who is making a tour of British territories in Africa with a view to making surveys of areas suitable for the production of silk. He explained in an interesting manner the manifold activities of the Institute and showed that it has completed a big part of its programme of research in the Colonial Empire. the formation of the unemployment committee. Unemployment has been very serious in this country. I know of several homes in Nairobi," he declared, "where we are faced with starvation. We will come to the time when Europeans will have to clear out of the country, when the conditions are such."

"I would appeal to the Elected Members of the Government," he said, "to open up an Unemployment Bureau; that is raise funds to send those people home if they want to go home. I can receive Mr. O'Brien's letter to the paper, he broke off. "It was a little hasty, perhaps, but I know he's with us."

"I get letters calling me 'Bolshevik,' 'Socialist,' and so on, but I don't mind. I have starved, sold papers in the streets of Glasgow and my heart's right in it. I appeal to the Elected Members, and will, in a few days to the Press."

Mr. Biddell then sat down, avowed with emotion. "I have starved, and know what it is," he said in a low voice.

Mr. O'Brien.

"The Hon. T. J. O'Brien then addressed the meeting. "Apparently," he began, "I am the Prince in the Place today; but it was never intended. I never intended a meeting like this. Mr. Jones wrote a letter to the paper which was most injudicious. Mr. O'Brien also said that the treatment of the subject by the 'East African Standard' had been most injudicious."

"And now," he continued, "because I have replied, I am regarded as having issued a challenge. I think it was only plain common-sense that I should ask

for some plain exposition of the facts. The 50 unemployed have been discovered since my letter." Mr. O'Brien said he also referred to the statement in the Press regarding "deductions from the wages."

"It is altogether wrong," he affirmed, "to suppose that I am antagonistic to the unemployed. I have worked pretty hard myself all about it—Mr. Biddell knows."

"Fifty out of employment?" Mr. O'Brien said. "Twenty per cent of those, let's say, are difficult to get employed for. We have a balance of 40 people. Surely there's no need to start a new firm for employing people for 40 people? I myself have had difficulty in finding people for a job in the last few months and I know of other employers who have had the same experience. I have had to send to South Africa to get chaps. I have had to enter into contracts with them. If Mr. Jones thinks I have employed those men in order that I could exploit them against the men here, he's wrong. I would like to point out to you gentlemen here that it's the workers in this country who make it most difficult for employers to maintain white staffs."

"When they were paid at the end of the month, Mr. O'Brien said, they would just like to go round to the shops of the Indians and Omas to buy their stuff. "If you men are going to carry on with that sort of thing," he declared, "I don't think you can blame the Government and employers if they employ Omas and Indians."

"Turning to the proposed Unemployment Bureau, Mr. O'Brien said if they wanted to keep unemployed for the next six months, they could get Government to open an Unemployment Bureau. They would take some months first to organize Government at an Unemployment Bureau was needed, and probably then they would give it up, saying there was no problem. He said that a Committee of 10 as few as six were members of agreement. Mr. O'Brien suggested a small number of men, including Mr. Jones, should go round and carry out the business portion of the town. "But," he said, "to depend on Government is the last thing you ought to do."

Among the European firms in the town, he said, non-European were being employed where Europeans would do."

A Voice: And Government? Mr. O'Brien said during the last few years, they had done every-

thing they could to lessen the European staff.

Up-country Conditions.

"I don't know if you know it," he said, "last up-country, we have a considerable number of boys and girls arriving at the age when they will be working jobs. But, we have no gaps to the extent of the country as a whole. It was a far better thing to get non-European boys and girls to get their members (the only thing to do) than to get their qualifications out so on. "I should have pointed out a number of people who won't hold down jobs," he repeated. "The country is going through a very bad time, but I have not yet heard of any firm that has taken advantage of those conditions to reduce wages. "If you have not got facts and figures to prove that employees are exploiting labour, then you may do your course much good by coming down here like this. "I've got a small working committee and apply to the gentleman of the town to get a list of unemployed men to see what he can do. Later view the business people of the town to see what they can do by making their staffs. These are the only practical suggestions I can make. "The Chairman remarked that local Nairobi people get different and less advantageous terms than those from London. "Nairobi constructive had been put forward," Mr. T. J. O'Brien had said: "I can do nothing to get help. "Mr. Biddell suggested an evening of a public meeting with a fortnight, to which Elected Members would be invited. There, there were a serious unemployment problem in Nairobi, let them try to help it. He remarked that if they had had members in a committee, they had found jobs for three or four people. "Mr. Jones again interrupted with reference to "non-European workers." He added that persons should be the last people to be considered if there was an unemployment question in Nairobi. "Mr. O'Brien, speaking against the proposal of a public meeting, described it as "more fireworks." "What would it do to get jobs?" "If you like me to come along to assist this firework," he said, "I will."
