It must be admitted that the invention and development of the valve was an event in the history of radio. It was the result of the invention of the internal combustion engine, and it was a natural development in the history of wireless telephony. Work was not done for the valve engine, transmitters and receivers, and the possibility of developing wireless power was dreamt of. Work was not done for the valve because the valves were not available. Work would also only a dream.

Today we have in the market many types of valves. All valves are not the same. Some are considerably smaller than the small ones which were popular in America to the large ones which have been handling hundreds of hours power in one at Noggy Radio.

**Valve Types.**—A glance through any valve catalogues will show the different types of receiving valves. There are three types of valves: "Valve for General Purpose." This as its name implies may be used for any purpose. The term "General Purpose" means that it is a general model explaining that it can be used for any other class of work or one which has some special feature. The glass or metal which is used to hold the glass or metal to the filament will be heavy enough so that there will be no chance of the electrodes being broken. 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

### S. A. STUDENTS' RUGBY TOUR.

#### Financial Position in Detail.

#### HONORARY TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

Yesterday extracts from the Hon. Treasurer's report, which was submitted and approved at the annual meeting of the Students' Union of Kenya and Uganda at the Stanley Hotel at Nairobi, were published. Below is appended the full report given by Mr. Worledge.

The accounts, sheet and pocket cover, the period from Jan. 1, 1929 to March 12, 1930.

It was not considered feasible to close the accounts on Dec. 31, 1929 owing to the want of the South African Students and the Committee having no knowledge of money to be received and disburse during the first two months of the year. I understand that in future the accounts will be closed at the date of the Annual General Meeting to that of the next one.

It will be observed that this statement includes one item of receipt and one item of expenditure, viz., an account of the year 1930 vis. Shs. 120/-, which is the amount of the first instalment of Shs. 200/- due.

The financial year will end on the date of the Annual General Meeting to that of the next one.

The reason for this was that over Shs. 114/45. The reason for this was that disbursements for the visit of H.M.B. King George V to the United Kingdom were not yet made up, and it was not considered feasible to close the account of Shs. 200/- due.

The result was that Shs. 18/75 was paid as due to the Royal Yacht Club, and Shs. 68/00 was received as interest on the Fixed Deposit.

The largest item of revenue during this period is profit on the South African Students' Tourist Shs. 6,160/51. This will be referred to later.

The refund from the Naval Visit was the Royal Union 450/- presented by H.M.A. officials to the 150 members who went with their concert party. This, however, was gradually re-

funded, and it was then decided by the Royal Union to contribute £100 over to start a permanent fund for Naval Entertainment. The Committee agreed to contribute £100 towards all future Naval visits.

The items of Shs. 338/- John Fund, represents sums collected at two matches in Nairobi on Dec. 12, 1929, between the Royal ex-Rugby Players and lost his crew though a most unfortunate accident. This sum was handed over to the Rugby Union. It was hoped that a further sum would be forthcoming to assist in special game receipts to approach mate £500 when a cheque was sent to the Royal Union.

The sum of £100 was received from the Royal Union for the benefit of the Nyanya Tennis Club.

The items of expenditure—

£100 for the Royal Union explanation.

Shs. 180/- paid for 9 beds used by the Royal Union.

£100 for the Royal Union, as stated in the P.W.D. and it is suggested that this is paid to the Engineering Committee, there appear to be no funds available for the Royal Union.

Shs. 16/- paid to Nakuru Athletic Club represented the difference between their gate receipts and those of the Royal Union.

Rugby Union having previously paid £100 to the Royal Union, the latter sum being carried forward up to a maximum of Shs. 180/- This payment would have been made up by the Royal Union.

£100 held up owing to a certain difference of opinion as to whether the Royal Union should be paid.

The present balance on hand of Shs. 151/93 is made up as follows—

Balance on 1929 transactions Shs. 1,827/20.

Balance on 1930 transactions Shs. 90/00.

Balance on S. A. Students' Tourist Shs. 1,667/51.

Balance on Stanley Fund Shs. 338/00.

The balance on the 1929 working account of Shs. 1,827/20 exceeded that for 1930 which was Shs. 90/00.

With regard to the S. A. Students' visit, both receipts and expenditure were recorded to each of the other pairs 4/5.

The total games for Nyanya were 88 and for the Indians 61.

The Indian team from the Inst. visited March 1, 1930.

Shs. 127/45.

The original estimate of total receipts was £800 as against £1,200, of which some £200 still outstanding.

Expenditure was estimated at £600, but it will be seen from the statement that disbursements did not exceed £1,000.

The original estimate of arriving at Nakuru was £100 per week for the kind and for which there is no precedent.

Rate receipts exceeded all hopes and expectations and reached the sum of £1,470 as against an original estimate of £100, great credit must be given to the students and districts for this achievement.

The original estimate for the sale of Hand Books and advertising space was £100, but it did not exceed. Collections at trials did not reach expectation.

With regard to the students' tour, the total amount of £1,000 was exceeded by £100. This was due to the decision made (and carried into effect) to bring the students back to South Africa on the 1st inst. and to pay the passage of M. Palmer and his wife.

The sum "Cost of Trial" and "Kenya Players Expenses" were very much underestimated, as was the Advertising, Printing and Stationery. The former included a sum of Shs. 500/- paid by Mr. Palmer and Mr. G. E. Smith, Kenya representative in South Africa, during the month of December, 1929, and was making no due arrangement for this tour.

The remaining items of expenditure were not all provided for, except an amount of Shs. 200/- for laundry of visitors.

There is an amount of £250 to be collected and which should be made up by the Royal Union in making a total profit on "The South African Students' visit of £1,000/-, and the same will be collected for the sale of the 4 second-hand balls.

The sum of £1,125/00, the profits of which will be used for the Royal Union, will be used for things, but will eventually be received from their Royal Union.

£100 will be given to the Royal Union to help them to make up the sum to the jerseys to members of "Wetherspoon" Rugby Football Club, Nairobi, and £100 to the Nairobi Lions Horn, Colonial and Town Club matches.

and his "Cabo" and special forces for the officers gave the R.C.P. a new feeling and a certain prestige. He had also a very large army in the field, comprising in Mombasa and Lamu 3,000 British troops, and 10,000 soldiers, by whom the Army force of Africa had been disbanded and the army was reorganized. He intended to move into the rift valley. The General had told the British officers who were sent into the Free State to teach the native boys gymnastics and improve village sanitation.

Growing Revolt.  
Then there came a dispute with the King, who was brought about by excessive exert of arms and it failed to reach an amicable solution. The King's Corps was well disciplined, and had been trained by the best English officers. The Rivers signed a decree, which signed his decree. The rebellion spread from the people to the soldiers and there was instant rebellion. The King was sent into exile in Kenya, and he had attempted to serve his country and the British Empire. He was granted a pension of £400 a month by King George VI. In 1930, he gave up his retirement at the King pad, tributary to the Buganda government, and began to lay claim to the Marquisate of Etalib. During his reign he never received a pension or a grant, nor was he born and a public subscription called.

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

## A REDUCTION IN THE NAVAL ESTIMATES.

### BRITAIN'S PROOF OF DESIRE FOR PEACE.

#### POLICY CRITICISED.

#### Fear That Other Powers Will Become Stronger.

In announcing a reduction in this year's Naval Estimates, the First Lord of the Admiralty said this largely the result of the growing world tendency.

Britain is the only Power voluntarily to reduce its naval strength in recent years; they were reduced by Mr. Churchill who said that there was no use in the Naval Conference leading to the division of the world among other Powers actually becoming stronger.

The First Lord of the Admiralty expressed the hope that the feelings of pessimism with regard to the Conference would prove to be unfounded, but it appeared stated candidly that they do not expect confidence to succeed.

#### IS CONFERENCE DOOMED?

(BY WIRELESS.)

Rugby March 17.—The House of Commons, Mr. J. R. Robinson, the First Lord of the Admiralty, introduced a Bill to reduce the Naval Estimates by £6,000,000 against the original estimate of £44,150,000. 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## GAME CHARGES AGAINST FIVE EUROPEANS.

### Tanganyika Rangers' Work in Trackless Country.

#### DEPARTMENT'S DIFFICULTIES.

#### NINE DAYS' TRIAL IN ISOLATED PART OF MASSAI RESERVE.

Although the Game Department of Tanganyika Territory has been subjected to considerable criticism recently both in East Africa and in Britain in connection with the way in which the rangers have been treated, the critics seem to have overlooked the fact that the rangers have been successful in their work of preservation of wild animals and destruction by organized poachers and other forms of slaughter. The Massai case suggests that the difficulties are not always those facing the Department.

The "East African Standard," in common with "The Times" of London and other newspapers, which have taken a decided interest in the problems of the Mandated Territory, has received a press release from the Attorney-General's office of the case.

Seven Europeans (unnamed) were involved in the chase of a lion in the Game Reserve, which investigations led to a long journey by car and on foot through areas of the Territory very rarely traversed. The rangers, in order to get the lions to stop, had to shoot them, and the skins were sent off to the Massai.

The trial was held at Arusha, where the accused were found guilty of wilfully killing wild animals and were sentenced to 12 months' imprisonment each.

The lions were shot in self defence, and the rangers' action was justified, as they were acting under orders of the Commissioner.

Mr. Gerald Gandy, the Commissioner, said that the lions had been threatening the lives of natives, and that the rangers had been compelled to act in self defence.

one month became a process not a general policy. We must bear in mind, however, that in view of the fact of disengaging Great Britain while other Powers were becoming actually involved in the war, it was natural to end that before the War, we had a War Fleet of over 500,000 men and after the War 50,000 men would have been sufficient to reduce the number to 50,000.

During the year under review a number of men per ship has been made to increase from 120 per ship to 140 per ship, and it is natural to draw to the fact that the Admiralty had effected a reduction in the number of men per ship during the last three years. It is only recently, however, that a reduction of the same size has been affected.

Admiralty's efforts to reduce the naval force have been moderately successful. It has been agreed that a reduction in the number of men per ship would be undertaken, provided that the cost of maintaining the fleet would be unaltered. The Government has also agreed to increase the policy of His Majesty's Government to the effect that a reduction will bring great satisfaction to the public.

It is, however, a matter of interest for the further reduction of the naval force.

Expeditors and Needs.

He stated that our expenditure must relate to future needs which will arise when the date of delivery of the Naval Conference comes. He deprecates any depreciation of public disengagement. He deplored the fact that the Conference has been delayed so long and hoped that the date of delivery will be soon in connection with "world peace in unison."

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

general protection, and a recent case before the Court of Appeals of the Subordinate Court of Nairobi, Mombasa, and Lamu, decided on 13th October and October of last year that the Commissioner had the power to prohibit or restrict the importation or sale of any article, whether general or specific, which, in his opinion, would be prejudicial to the public welfare, health, safety, convenience, or interest of the people. In this case five Europeans were prohibited from bringing in to Kenya a quantity of skins of wild animals, including two rhinoceroses, for which they had paid £140/- and £120/- each, to be sold in Nairobi.

The skins of the two rhinoceroses were seized at the port of Mombasa, and the skins of the remaining three were confiscated at the port of Nairobi. The first accused, a native of Uganda, was charged with having killed a rhinoceros in excess of the number allowed under the Game Protection Ordinance.

The evidence showed that the accused were responsible for the killing of at least two tigers, one tiger and another in Kenya. All members of the party were in possession of permits issued by the Game Department to shoot two male tigers, but it was proved that only three tigers were shot, and participated in the shooting, the other two being killed by his party.

Game Ranger's Story.

The Game Ranger of the Northern Province, who appeared on the prosecution, stated in regard to the shooting of the tigers he left his station at 7 a.m. on May 20th, 1928, at the Scarp area (note) 130 miles distant, to investigate a report that two tigers had been sighted. At 12 noon he was despatched to shoot two male tigers, but he was shot by a tiger which he had fired at him. He then returned to his station.

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### Principles of the Law.

The magistrate also said:

"That he would like to see the Game Protection Ordinance amended to give more lenient laws."


