**PLAGUE ONCE AGAIN.**

The irresponsible manner in which vital  
necessaries are disregarded by those in au-  
thority in this Protectorate has brought  
Mombasa again in the throes of a serious  
outbreak of Indian plague. As our Mombasa  
Correspondent points out, if the statements  
accepted as truthful, then the Medical  
Department deserves to be indicted for  
criminal neglect, especially in face of pre-  
vious warnings. On the evening of Friday,  
April 11th, a certain Indian living in the  
Mombasa Bazaar lost his wife, his mother  
and his son through an outbreak of plague,  
and next door a Banyan girl also died the  
same evening. The bodies of the plague  
victims were allowed to lie for hours await-  
ing interment and our Correspondent, who  
undertook the necessary and possibly dan-  
gerous task of making a personal investiga-  
tion for the public benefit, found that this  
dilatatoriness was due to the unfortunate  
Indian not having complied with some let-  
ter of the law whereby he was refused a per-  
mit to bury his dead. Upon inspection, the  
method of quarantine was found to be  
very perfunctory and the arrangements  
were evidently in the hands of ignorant  
native police. A boy of about twelve years  
of age was seen sleeping on some packing  
cases in front of the house where the bodies  
of the plague victims lay and in the doory-  
way of a shop on the opposite side of the  
narrow street was observed an Indian  
nursing his child with that Eastern  
sterilism, born of fatalism, which remains  
unaffected by our boasted civilisation. No  
white officer, either police, medical or con-  
servancy, was at the time in evidence.  
Four corpses had been allowed to lie within  
the contiguous area in question from four-  
teen to sixteen hours awaiting burial and  
there was every reason to suppose that all  
had died of plague in its most virulent  
form. Later in the afternoon burial per-  
mits were issued by the Medical Officer,  
and the people who took part in the cere-  
monies were allowed to return from the  
cemetery after each had been inoculated  
with anti-plague serum.  
Thus seems that there was great  
neglect in the way in which initial steps

were taken to prevent the disease from  
spreading, and an incomprehensible delay  
in the burials of the plague victims was  
evident. These matters must, in the in-  
terests of the public welfare, be satis-  
factorily explained without loss of time, and  
if any particular individual is in fault  
we sincerely trust that steps will be taken  
to avoid a repetition of what appears to be  
a most serious and gross incompetence. In  
such cases we feel inclined to blame the  
system more than the official immediately  
concerned, for upon reflection we recollect  
that officers have frequently been censured  
for displaying too much common sense in  
taking prompt action and in showing their  
discretion when opposed to more red-tape  
officials. Their perspicacity and personality are  
in course of time submerged by the severities  
of inflexible duty and dry-dog, as the result  
of official indolence, and circumlocution  
and delay supervene, to the general confu-  
sion of those who have the misfortune of  
being subject to such venacious vacilla-  
tions.

No language seems too strong for the  
muddling methods which characterise the  
municipal system of Mombasa, and but  
for the fact that the town stands upon a  
limited natural rock, the immense  
concourse of plague and other pestilence  
surely have wiped out the whole  
population long ere this. The Coast town  
is ten times worse in its insanitary con-  
dition than Nairobi, where the suggestion of  
plague or disease sends the medical officers  
at once to the scene of the outbreak, and  
where European police are promptly dis-  
patched to enforce the quarantine restrictions.  
The difference, of course, is due largely to  
the fact that Nairobi is under the central  
supervision of the governing bodies, which  
system displays a weakness in the organi-  
sation of the Medical Department in dis-  
tant centres of administration. The Nai-  
robi European townspeople have somewhat  
tardily faced the position and taken up the  
confidentially on behalf of health and of the  
general well-being of their fellow inhabi-  
tants, and steps should be taken without  
further loss of time, and possibly further  
loss of lives, to establish a Vigilance Com-  
mittee of townpeople in Mombasa. It may be  
of advantage for them to extend the idea, and  
we do not see why such action should be  
confined strictly to the Europeans for surely  
the Indians of the better classes have it in  
their power to remedy the overcrowding  
and insanitary methods appertaining to  
their own community and to the danger  
zone of the residential outskirts of plague.

Municipal reformers of all classes are  
needed and each and every resident can do  
his or her share in the healthful campaign.  
We include the feminine gender advisably,  
for Eastern ideas which hold sway in the  
Bazaars of our towns rigidly exclude male  
supervision from the interiors of their  
domestic world, and this is where capable  
women may come to the rescue. We would  
strongly suggest the establishment of a  
corps of experienced women inspectors at  
Mombasa, Nairobi and Kisumu, for work  
in the Indian Bazaars, who will be em-  
powered to use their discretion in house  
visitation and hygienic instruction, as is  
done in the various towns of India and  
elsewhere. The prejudices and religious  
beliefs of the various communities must be  
respected and it is only by doing so that  
any reform in dirty habits and filthy custom-  
s can be permanently achieved. In the  
question of overcrowding of the inner  
living rooms of the Asiatics and make in-  
vestigations which are denied male officers  
of any rank or distinction. They would,  
especially after gaining the confidence of  
the women living in the insanitary areas,  
be enabled to show how general cleanliness  
and careful attention to the preparation of  
food would tend to repel the ravages of  
disease, while they could give an eye to  
the proper treatment of children and en-  
courage improvements in carrying out  
domestic drudgery. By daily duties such  
as these, noble work could be done and a  
few painstaking and tactful women in-  
spectors able to speak Hindustani could in-  
stitute wonderful reforms, leading to the im-  
proved health and happiness of the whole  
population of the town.—Much excellent  
work in this direction has been done by  
women workers in other places, notably in  
Tawa and Chikwa, where yellow fever out-  
breaks have been suppressed by their  
agency after a house to house visitation.

By attention also to the hygiene needed in  
the home lives in normal times, there would  
result less overcrowding, less sickness,  
greater cleanliness and greater robustness,  
and the improvement would permeate the  
whole community.

In respect to general municipal matters  
at Mombasa, we would advocate a body  
there similar to that just formed in Nairobi,  
with possibly slight alterations in methods  
to agree with local peculiarities, having the  
idea of instituting a vigorous municipal  
reform and urging the Governor to enforce  
the Municipal Councils Ordinance of 1909  
to apply to the two towns.

Latest Cables

Allegations Against Krupp. Inciting French Press Agitation. SEVERAL ARRESTS MADE.

(Reuter's Special to "E. A. Standard.") Berlin, April 19. The debate on the Army bill, the Socialist Liebknecht alleged that Krupp and other military officials had resorted to illicit methods of inducing the French press to create an anti German agitation.

The Minister Herrmann admitted that a judicial inquiry into the matter was proceeding into the allegations against Krupp and that they had obtained information from military officials had been made. Several arrests have been made.

The Reichstag have continued the discussion of the Army estimates and the same question came up. In replying to criticisms on the Krupp firm, Minister Herrmann said that the Army authorities had severely condemned what had happened, but it was not a case of betrayal of the country on the disclosure of military secrets. It was advisable to await the result of the judicial inquiry.

The Krupp firm has issued a statement denying that an employee of the firm in Berlin, who is accused of bribing non-commissioned officers of the War Office, had any funds from the firm beyond a modest salary.

Colonel Seely Indicted. Territorial Force's Downfall.

THE 10,000 INVASION BASIS AN IMPOSSIBILITY.

London, April 20. The "Times" gives great prominence to their article on their Military Correspondent. The article severely attacks Colonel Seely. It quotes Mr. Asquith as saying in 1902 that the "business of the War Office was to see we had under all circumstances a properly organized force capable of meeting any emergency effectively within the possible invasion of seventy thousand men." The article then goes on to contrast this statement with Colonel Seely's recent utterances, especially that it was impossible to assert confidently that the Territorials—only a few days after mobilization could be sent to the front. The Government contended that such a situation could not arise if the present naval superiority was maintained. The Correspondent affirms that it is an outrage that Colonel Seely would state the Army problem in terms utterly different from those of the Premier.

The indictment concludes that Colonel Seely "well realizes that his position is seriously shaken. Our courteous and agreeable War Secretary cannot afford to go on making these gaffe—breaking war as a game. War is a most serious business in which we cannot afford to make mistakes."

Priests Sue Socialistic Organ.

Paris, April 20. Reuter's agent at Fimisterre reports that 400 priests from Fimisterre have sued the Socialistic paper for libel and damages. Each priest obtained judgment for thirty-five francs damages.

The Position in the Near East

Port Said, April 21. The Greek squadron is cruising off Port Said apparently with the object of preventing the Mediterranean raid by the S.S. "Hamathil" which is at present in the Red Sea.

Reuter's agent at Corfu states that the blockading ship arrived at Valona just in time to avert a famine. The plight of the inhabitants had been increased by the fear of an attack of 30,000 famished Turkish troops which are camped near the town.

U. S. A. Atlantic Fleet to tour the Mediterranean.

Washington, April 21. The entire U. S. A. Atlantic fleet of 21 battleships, including destroyers, will make a three month cruise in the Mediterranean, beginning in January of next year.

London, April 20. The death is announced at St. Bartholomew's Hospital of their popular surgeon and famous Cambridge organ, Mr. Edward Smith. It is believed that Mr. Eborac, South became infirmed in the course of an operation that he performed. The death is also announced of the well-known General Evans of the Antarctic expedition. Mrs. Evans was operated on by the Mediterranean while on board a liner bound westward with her husband.

Cup-Tie Result.

ASTON VILLA WINS THE CUP.

(Special to the "East African Standard.") Aston Villa defeated Sunderland by a goal to nil on Saturday in the English Cup final.

Reuter's Agency confirms our special news. There was a crowd of 121,919 spectators which constitutes a cup final record. The results obtained were perfect. The match throughout was a strenuous game, the lead often being on the aggressive. The losing team, however, failed before that moment when Aston Villa put up a magnificent defence and their forwards were clever.

During the play, the roof of a temporary refreshment building collapsed and numbers of spectators were precipitated to the ground, some being injured. Fortunately only one was injured seriously.

Askari Inefficiency.

A BRUTAL EXHIBITION AT MOMBASA.

The other evening three sturdy askaris who were engaged in taking a refractory drunken Indian to Mombasa Police Station, gave a brutal exhibition of force which was what mitigated by the Europeans who led themselves called upon to interfere in the interests of humanity. The askaris simply did not know how to handle their prisoner who was dragged up Macdonald Terrace at his back with a man on each leg, while the other struggled to keep a grip on his arms and head. When the prisoner succeeded in kicking off his captors he was treated to a lashing about the face with a canvas rope, followed by a series of rough and tumble wrestling matches, punctuated by ejaculations from the Indian in broken but luridly abusive language.

The disgraceful incident emphasized that the unfortunate residents of Macdonald Terrace are, consequent upon the erection of the new police station, to suffer additional indignities to their twenty-four hours' round of trouble and incessant noise. Also it is pointed out that the askaris require someone more than mere military drill to turn them out as effective policemen, and that some instruction should be given them as to the scientific method of checking and handling refractory prisoners. Under no circumstances should even a coloured "curfew" be retained to a full subject for the hospital.

## St. Austin's Catholic Mission.

### THE NEW CHURCH

#### AN INTERESTING CEREMONY.

On Sunday the "French Mission" was the volume of many interested people, the occasion being the laying of the foundation stone of the new mission church. The ceremony, which was according to Roman Catholic ritual and was in three parts, i.e., the Benediction of the place of the main altar, the Benediction of the stone, and the Benediction of the foundation, was conducted by the Rev. Father T. Bernhard, Superior of St. Austin's Catholic Mission.

The additional ceremony of the benediction of the machinery connected with the Mission and recently installed, was also performed.

Among those present were the Rev. Fathers F. Bagan, E. Pottier, J. Sol, the Brothers, Fr. Spangler, Mr. and Mrs. G. Hitchcock, Misses Don and Nugent, and Messrs. Felix, Currow, and Mayer. The Sisters of St. Joseph's Convent and the children of the school also witnessed the ceremony.

The day was ideally suited to the auspicious occasion. A gentle sun beamed down on the proceedings. The fresh green foliage which is such a beautiful and prominent feature of the mission and its environs, shone resplendent in the warm glow of the day, and the quiet, decorous assemblage of the guests, made a fitting setting for the reverent yet picturesque sequence of ceremonials in progress.

Father Bernhard, in the course of his inspiring remarks, explained to the natives in Swahili the nature of the building operations about to be commenced, pointing out the desirability of foundations necessary to ensure durability and stability for the new edifice, and his remarks were followed with close attention by his audience, both Native and European.

It transpired that the foundation stone alone weighed over 2,000 lbs.

One side of the religious devotion and enthusiasm of the Fathers for the cause which they so ardently regard, may be judged in the fact that they are erecting the new church themselves with all course.

At the conclusion of the ceremony lunch was partaken of, 18 guests being down to table and it was announced thereafter that a second stone will be laid for the new church by the Rev. Father Spangler, Messrs. G. Hitchcock, E. Felix, J. D. Currow and R. F. Mayer.

The following description of the new church may prove of interest—

As the building is being erected on a site which slopes very much, great difficulty was experienced in getting down to rock level on parts of the site had to be dug 10 feet deep. However, it has been overcome and now assures the building of having a really good and solid foundation.

As it is customary for the lay brothers of the order to work in metres, the drawing of the mission to work in metres, the drawing has been prepared accordingly, but it might be interesting to note that the approximate area of the East End is in Imperial length of church is 130 ft. by 45 ft. with and 26 ft. high from floor to springing of curved ceiling. The tower at the West End has a measurement of 16 feet square overall. At the East End is the Sanctuary, having on either side a sacristy connected by a short passage. As a considerable proportion of the congregation will be composed of Europeans, a door has been put on either side of the nave, thus preventing the attendants having to enter at the West End and walking the whole length of the building to their seats in front.

As funds are limited, several of the suggested external features have had to be omitted, the main glass windows are to be put in temporarily, instead of fixed lights, which were shown in the original sketches by the Architect, but undoubtedly before being stained glass windows will replace the present ones as far have been already promised.

The internal treatment promises to be very beautiful, having pianolas at intervals along the walls supporting a cornice and richly paneled ceiling. The admirable work the Mission Brothers are doing in carrying out all the building operations for their respective missions and the successful way they train the native labourers is most praiseworthy, whilst the sound quality of their workmanship is a great credit to

themselves. As the brothers get no payment, their labours are indeed "labours of love." The drawings for this church have been prepared by Mr. Stanley J. D. Currow, who is acting as Honorary Architect. It may be mentioned in connection that in a hollow in the foundation stone there were placed a local coin of value current in B. E. A. at the present day, a parchment with an inscription in Latin text given in Standard, and a copy of the "E. A."

The following is the inscription on the parchment roll:—

AD PERPETUUM REI MEMORIAM.  
Anno Domini millesimo nongentesimo decimo tertio, die vero vigesima mensis Aprilis, Pontificatus Beatorum Petri et Pauli N. X. anno undecimo, Reverendissimo Theologo, hunc Vicarissimum Zambiariorum adificandae in honorem Sancti Augustini, Episcopi Cantuarum, solenniter benedixit, cum esset a Reverendo Patre Ludovico Bernabini, Praetore Congregationis Sancti Spiritus, Administratore, vicario hujus Vicarissatus Zambiariorum, vicario hujus Missionis Sancti Augustini, vicario hujus Missionis Sancti Josephi, vicario hujus Missionis vicarii et amicis, in quo populo christiano in hac Missione degente; in cuius roll folio subscritum.

We hope to publish a photograph of the proceedings in our weekly issue.

At present the Fathers have only a small sum of money in hand to complete the church and we understand that any donations, whether large or small, will be thankfully received.

All The World's a Stage.

"Each simple scene shall serve to show... From the moment I had left the Assembly... my vision, shattered temporarily... my eyes, recalled the "extremes of emotion" those familiar objects, so much like a snail at the solemnity of the momentous proceedings.

This very night will be romping to the rattle of the busy skates; to-morrow, that silent symphony will sound forth its melody in accompaniment to pictures of lively incident and varied sentiment. There is something incongruous in the comparison of thoughts, and yet something awfully real and sternly reminiscent of life as it really is in this atheistical contiguity of the things of life and death. There is a sudden hush. It is as if a vacuum had suddenly been created in the solidified medley of quiet couple, feet shuffling and furtive comings and goings. The silent, crouched-up, painful figure, pent in between these three sides of wooden railings, moves, then hurries to his feet. He has sat, mostly, head bowed, long arms sprawled over his extended knees, head thrust slightly forward, eyes staring straight ahead. Rather vacant eyes they are, despite their dark impenetrable depths of colour. They are eyes which, up till now, appeared to be contemplating some far-away scene. Perhaps they have been seeing deep, deep into the tragic past—piercing through the momentous matters of the moment to the awful happenings of a day long gone by. Or, perhaps, who

knows? the veil of the future had been lifted, and the weary pain-oddien brain had been granted a glimpse of the great unknown. Like a great ungainly animal, as boy, he stands before his judges. With those nine men; men so different of countenance, so varied in temperament, so extreme, so varied in opinion, so different perhaps in their philosophy of life; rests the issue of his fate. Towards them he turns for a moment resting his long powerful arms upon the railing in front of him. There does not appear to be any appeal in his eyes. He has sinned. He must suffer. But how greatly? What will be the penalty? Who knows? Slowly he speaks. In a hoarse, guttural monotone, broken neither by the smallest flights of oratory nor a trace of emotion, he tells his story. It is a somewhat sordid tale—a tale of life, far much too familiar to those who have known the fate of their fellow men—a tale a little sordid, yet ringing true with an affection for a dead woman—a tale deeply charged with a variety of those human passions to which all humanity, of all degrees and all ages, is and has been subject. It is a story of two souls united in wedlock, mated in the holy bonds of matrimony, and in every character and every change of deep affection and cruel, raging jealousy. And when it culminates in a dreadful deed, a shudder strikes us to pass through the silent listeners, commencingating itself in some mysterious fashion from man to man, until the whole hall is tense with restrained emotion. Unmoved at first, the speaker has gradually lost his self-possession as his story progresses. The sensitised plate of his soul, that mysterious photographic apparatus implanted within every human frame—has become more and more receptive to the emotions conveyed by the words which fall from his lips, as they pass a shudder through him, and he has broken. His voice falters and breaks now and then. He struggles vainly to gain the mastery over his unruly tongue. Now he falters, and a soft breath comes from him. His overbearing eyes he applies a handkerchief. But as his broad back is towards the silent, straining audience, few behold these evidences of his misery. Right all too often. The man may be a criminal, a murderer, yet he is a human, very human! On the platform, judgment has sat stern, and silent. In his long, red flowing robe, bowaged head, and calm, impressive countenance, the Judge takes down the speaker's deposition. He signs the time for judgment arrived. In that moment of the fatal issue to be decided! Overhead, flutters fitfully three or four remnants of a paper-raft. A few disjointed pieces of painted canvas, wavy ways to and fro. Behind a wooden lattice is projected against a wall. Here and there a bits of stage property lie in unappreciated contrast to the dire proceedings on hand. On either side hang the separate portions of the large velvet drop curtain. Mummy and mortality! What a contrast! "All the world's a stage" And men and women merely players." The man in the dock concludes his statement. He sits he slides into his chair. The last words, fatal words, words charged with so much meaning, words fraught with such grave consequences, have been spoken by him for better or for worse, for well or for evil, for impelled or imperious, those words of his may leave him. There are two men, anxious men there who have eagerly listened to what he had to say, who have passed his story together and have, from their different points of view, from the standpoint of the defender, prosecutor, gathered up the "facts" and the "opinions" of his declaration. Nine other men, anxious of fact with various emotions chasing over their varied consciences, have eagerly drank in the human sequence of the—his he doomed?—man. What will be it? It is almost over. The nine thoughtful-faced men back to their places. The two counsel, long and they have their separate appeals to the jury. He who prosecutes in the name of the law has shown the businessness of the crime committed; the heinous barbarity of the crime. He who defends has nobly striven to show the extenuating circumstances of the case, to prove that human nature as it is, after all, is very bad—He has made an eloquent appeal for the saving of a human life. What must be the issue? And he who sits there in judgment, has also weighed up the pros and cons. He has weighed up his— As he sits his duty, he has gravely and impartially weighed every

"He" every "against" in the scales of judgment. It is now for these nine pale men to say if their fellow man, who meekly awaits the declaration of his fate, is found wanting. "Guilty, my Lord!" An electrical thrill seems to pass round the hall. People crane forward, eagerly striving to gain a glimpse of the prisoner's face. How will he take it? Will there be a "scene." Will the awful pronouncement unman him who thus, in the prime of his manhood, in the zenith of his physical strength, bears his doom pronounced? He is standing up. He is thoroughly grasps the import of the dreadful message, so makes no sign. Motionless, unmoved, he remains during the "strong recommendation to mercy." Firmly he walks down the passage between the two European constables who accompany him, hooded of the glasses cast at him; some pitying, some horrified, some merely indifferent. He passes through the portals into the wan light of the climbing moon. Somewhere within the now brilliantly lit hall a short laugh, a burst of merriment, an evening's merriment a burst of laughter comes. Thus to the music of an anthem of humanity, goes out of our lives—this man with death stalking alongside of him. Cable Summary.
