THE PRINCE ARRIVES IN KENYA.

Quiet Disembarkation at Mombasa.

NO OFFICIAL RECEPTION.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales disembarked from the British India steamer "Modassa" at 9.30 o'clock this morning.

There was no reception of any sort. Even His Excellency the Governor, Sir Edward Grogan, did not attend to meet the Prince and this in itself every other possible direction every effort was made to respect the Prince's wishes for a quiet and entirely unpublic holiday. He came to East Africa to-day as an ordinary visitor would come.

The wharf was not exactly deserted—because Kilindini is always a hive of industry nowadays—but the gathering collected to see the Prince was exceedingly meagre in its dimensions although it sufficed to indicate to the Prince the fact that in Mombasa—the Gateway to East Africa—a warm welcome awaited him as he passed along the piers.

Although the "Modassa" arrived in port early, the Prince remained in his cabin until the arrival of the hour he had selected for disembarkation.

His staff—Colonel Piers Leigh and Captain J. A. Kirk—accompanied him.

Although I understand that the Prince will leave Mombasa by his special train this evening at seven thirty, the greatest interest being displayed here regarding his programme.

There was apparently some doubt as to whether he would go on to Mombasa or to Voi although I understand that he will make Mombasa his first stopping place.

THE VOYAGE.

Speaking to some of the Prince's fellow-passengers who arrived with the "Modassa" I gathered that the voyage was of the most uneventful character. The Prince occupied an ordinary deck cabin and no special arrangements were made for him. He kept very much to himself during the voyage and seemingly acted as much private as possible. But when he came on deck he spoke in his usual friendly fashion with those around him. There was no dancing during the trip from Beira and no festivities of any kind.

When the "Modassa" reached Tanganyika the Prince went ashore and played a round of golf which he apparently enjoyed very much after being so restricted in his movements on board.

The Danger to Everton and Newcastle United.

PROCESS OF THINKING OUT THE CLUBS.

Of the twelve clubs originally forming the Football League, Everton alone are the only team who have maintained continuous membership. Since their admission to the First Division, Newcastle United have remained steadfast but to-day, like Everton, they are undergoing the stress and strain of relegation fears. The first named club stands third from the bottom of the ladder, while the St. James's Park side holds the unenviable distinction of being wooden spoonists. Unless a remarkable transformation is wrought within the course of the next few weeks both these poor records are likely to be stamped in the dust. Perhaps more than anything else the fault is similar in both. Their attack lacks sting. The Goodison Park combination are said to rely too much on their own forward scoring. The goal-keepers are not being given the opportunities for coming in, and their service is of little avail in consequence. Perhaps it is not only their strength, but their United, where lack of a guide and a man to hold the line together would appear to be largely their shortcoming. Newcastle are also in need of a little strengthening behind. By appointing Andrew Cunningham, the old player and Everton's international, to build a new United.
