



Incidentally it is worth observing just at the moment when Closer Union as a problem will soon be before East Africa, that in order that it may achieve the greatest measure of success such a change in the relationships of the three Torritories should be preceded by closer union of the most practical kind within the boundaries of each. Kenya and the neighbouring Dependencies will be faced with the gravest issues within the next few months. They are so important to the future of the Territories that so far as Kenya is concerned their acceptable solution over-rides every other problem now in prospect. 




