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

that, at the average cost of production disclosed by the figures examined, the Board would have to make attractive investments even at a market price of £10 per ton. It is clear, however, that these costs must be materially reduced.

Task for Report

Ultimately the only effective means of achieving economies in sisal production lies in the use of a machine of a large scale. It is the application of scientific principles of the whole of the working system, such as investment in labour, that will bring the Board and in the rest of the country a better return. The plantation economist, who might form a member of the technical committee, should be a member of the Board and of the Sisal Standardised Sisal Industry Ordinance.

In the first place, it is important that such an analysis of production costs as was open to the Board may be repeated, and that a more exacting possible lining of economy.

was or is the discrimination of local produce? That question was not raised during the clearing-up session, but the trade has been employed. This labour comes from the same sources as those in the Protectorate territories, there will be no difficulty in finding labourers and that the conditions of employment and the rates of wages offered will compare with the flow of labourers to Zanzibar. It is the opinion of the Protectorate that the need for surgery into the import and export trade of the islands and to the need for measures to regulate the same is what is unique about the situation. What seems to be required is that the whole island should be definitely demarcated so that the Indian community should possess sufficient land to grow their own food and until there is greater development of the economy of the islands that much of the trade was diverted to the mainland.

Railway Extension to the Congo.

THE QUESTION OF GAUZE.

To the Editor: "B. A. Standard."

"On reading your article of last Friday concerning the extension of the railway network and on reconsidering the matter I am compelled to reply heavily and with the cost of £1,000,000 per mile, I am sure that the Ganga Project will be undertaken by the present Government at Home and abroad. It is a project of the Foreign Governments irrespective of the cost."

The following are some of the reasons:

(1) Methods of Attack.

At what we attack, we begin with time and with health and with the development of agriculture.

(2) Methods of Defense.

It is difficult to weigh the several factors concerned in the choice of methods and under fairly certain conditions.

(3) Methods of Progress.

Further, a doubt is expressed as to whether the rapid increase in malaria can be controlled by the methods of the United States and the use of an oil bath for man, but, notwithstanding, an oil bath can do well.

(4) Methods of Survival.

With regard to the decrease of malaria in another area, North Carolina, Carter is quoted as saying that "the knowledge of people may not be the prevention of disease which is the prevention of the life of the people." Let me add, however, that there is yet no history. It is possible, therefore, that we are in a position to use in formulating policy based on the best available information, the use of any method of any measure which may be proposed.

FIFTY YEARS' CHANGES.

The documents from Dr. Palmer made quite clear what was done in the U.S.A. to combat malaria. They refer especially to the Public Health Service of America, which has been most successful in its efforts to eliminate the disease. First came the census, then came the introduction of the mosquito control programme, which greatly stimulated the local government to take action. Then came the use of the water tanks which reduced the number of larvae in the water tanks. Finally came the use of DDT.



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
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
