No Date Fixed.

GABRIEL FAILS TO REACH DECISION.

(THROUGH REUTERS AGENCY.) London, Sept. 29. Labour's election policy has been outlined in a series of resolutions approved by the Executive for submission to the party at Scarborough next week.

The resolutions include a commitment to 'fresh attempts to found a stable party to the gold standard, placing the party to reverse the decision of the Bank of England adopted by the public conference in 1931.

The Problem of the Locust. The locust situation in East Africa has reached a stage which ordinary conceptions of its gravity are no longer applicable. The Kenya Department of Agriculture has now suggested for the consideration of the farmers in Kenya the temporary abandonment of any other crop which has a decided advantage of being raised in the same area at the same time, will find a suitable market, such an interference in the main crop system of the country could be justified by very grave conditions, and it is necessary to consider the position not only in but as well as within the next few months. It is quite clear that it would be impossible to change the bulk of the bulk cereal crops, which represent a serious threat to the stability of the financial and economic factors they represent in the organization of industry and production. But it is open to the country to consider how far the foundation can or need be strengthened by a proportionally restricted sowing of other crops less susceptible to destruction by locust swarms and at least no more profitable in terms of the amount of produce and without any loss to-day. 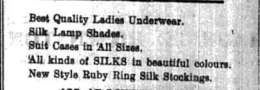

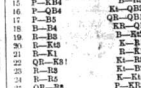

To the Editor, "E. A. Standard." Sir—Although the Gold Standard has been abandoned in England since 1925 the present crisis of the pound sterling has to be traced back to the war and to the way in which the war was conducted and results were settled.

During the war and immediately after, the U.K., together with all the countries of the other fighting nations except the U.S.A. Dollar, had to issue gold value about 20 per cent.

The London market and stock-bourses and also other countries especially among the Conservative and Labour parties, were very concerned and feared that without the support of the U.K. the gold value and the re-establishment of the Gold Standard in England would not be able to maintain itself, which was at the time done in New York.

The British Government was therefore urged to settle the war debt with the U.S.A. in a time when it was going to be paid in full and what most probably was not considered at the time either by Britain or by the U.S.A. with money which was going to improve in value, not in gold because "the amount settled was in gold dollars, but in its economical value" value measured in price of commodities, which were bound to decrease some or other.

The appreciation of the £ to its gold value had the following effects:

- (A) A gift of about 1,760 millions gold £ (taking the depreciation of the £ at 25 per cent.) made to the holders of British securities and a higher number of such public loans at 4 per cent. on the British Budget. It is a huge amount sufficient to keep all the British Government services, two shillings a day for over two hundred million Government borrowing as I have no idea of the amount borrowed by other public bodies as Counties, Municipalities, etc., which, most probably, is nearly as big as the Government's.
- (B) Higher taxation to meet those interests and repayment of capital.
- (C) Higher cost of living.
- (D) Much higher salaries, wages, pensions, etc. and in general a much higher cost of all our own products.
- (E) Higher, etc. to preserve the high salaries, wages and privileges.

Summing up, a very heavy burden has been put on the British people and trade, over one million unemployed and millions of more people who when other industrial countries had not unemployed millions.

The fact that British trade has not been able to compare to

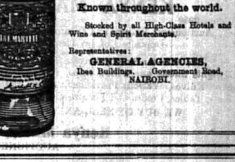
