industry in favor of alcohol and tobacco. Mr. Martineau had been asked what he thought of the meeting and he had not been present at the meeting in City Park. So I suggested that he go up to see me. He agreed to do so. He met a more representative gathering of people than I had ever seen before. Everybody got up and spoke. Mr. Martineau's comment at the meeting was very particular and it was interesting to witness the outcome of the talk. In my opinion, which I think, agree with him, we have the right to demand that a more representative gathering of people should be held at the meeting so that it would not end in a farce.

"I am in favour of running a political party in Nairobi. That is now only a question of getting the money. I think that we will not have the funds in City Park but we will take it with the strength of our organization."

Morton's Opinion.

His opinion, the Mayor also disagreed with Mr. Martineau's action.

"I do not think," he said, "but I support the demands made by Mr. Martineau, that the public should have the opportunity to express their views in a second meeting, since the question has been raised in the public mind. KENYA TROUT.

To the Editor, "The Standard." — I do not think that the trout which you mentioned in your article were mostly spaw fish. But I have had a trout or two reported to me which caught a spaw fish in its mouth.

It would be most interesting to know how an unhooked spaw fish would react to being hooked again, especially after it has been released.

In my opinion the best way to catch trout is to fish from the shore, using a long pole to drive the trout towards the hook.

Kenya trout are very plentiful, especially in Lake Naivasha.

I and other anglers of my acquaintance have never had any sight of trout fry or spaw fish in our many years of fishing.

Kenya trout are to be caught by fly or spin fishing.

Kenya trout are a different class of fish.

This is one reason that they are so difficult to catch.

I hope that you will publish my suggestion. This may occasion some difficulty, but I am sure that the few Makos, mungos, etc., which the natives catch, have nothing to do with the trout, however, they are not mature.

This will happen again, but the trout will not be able to survive, as a result of overfishing.

I hope that you will give me any information about the trout fisheries who know me, as right now I am at a loss.
