important schools of all the mission societies. It has been a special feature in the educational system of the White Fathers large cabinet self-supporting and robust on the products of their own cultivation. An agricultural school has been opened this year in the Tavo District by the Church Missionary Society. Boys also trained in brick-making, masonry and carpentering and the native industries are encouraged. The Church Missionary Society have introduced a cloth-weaving industry in the District and have a special school where instruction is given. The cloth made, which is woven from locally grown cotton, is of excellent quality and finds a ready market. The school suffered a severe setback during the year owing to a fire in which all the looms were burnt.

The wide scope of the educational work carried out by the Protectorate is evidence of the great debt which Uganda owes to the activities of the mission societies. When it is remembered that the civilized institutions of Uganda began less than twenty years ago and that the greater part of the funds expended on education have been provided by philanthropic bodies, it is gratifying to note that the system followed by the mission societies has, on the whole, been eminently sound in theory and practically justified by its results.

JUDICIAL.
The criminal cases tried in the Protectorate Courts was 1,100, compared with 923 the previous year. The number of persons charged was 1,478, an increase of 280 over the previous year, of whom 1,204 were convicted, 180 acquitted, and 97 discharged on writ of evidence. The civil cases tried amounted to 877 in 1913. The murder and homicide cases increased from 28 to 49 and the increase is attributed to the extension of managerial and administrative work to the outlying parts, where crimes of violence are all common. It was not due to any real increase of crime throughout the Protectorate. The organization of the native courts continues to be gradually developed and improved.

POPULATION AND VITAL STATISTICS.
The population in April, 1911, was 2,363,225, of which 1,312,000 were British subjects, 622,000 natives and 431,225 were other races. Taking all diseases into account, there has been an increase of 1,000,000 since 1901.

for the year. The European cases treated numbered 788, with seven deaths, as compared with 661 cases and seven deaths in 1911. Malaria cases numbered 285 and digestive diseases 129. Epidemic cases decreased from five the previous year to two. In regard to malaria, there was a large increase in the number of cases of respiratory diseases treated, of which part is attributed to actual increased prevalence, possibly due to unusually heavy and persistent rains. Native returns show a satisfactory decrease in the number of deaths attributed to the more common communicable diseases, namely, dysentery from 1,087 to 750, plague from 1,961 to 1,292, sleeping sickness from 1,486 to 982, small pox from 1,044 to 810, and measles from 437 to 289. These returns are only received from the more "advanced" parts of the Protectorate. The high rate of infant mortality among natives continues to give cause for anxiety. The native customs relating to parturition and the care of infants are probably more or less very different from those of Europeans in any other part of the world. COMMUNICATIONS.
The waterways of Lake Victoria, Kioga, and Albert are the most important features to be considered in the problem of extending inland transport facilities. The main outlines of the development and extension of these waterways, the construction of roads suitable for wheeled traffic from inland producing centres to ports on the rail and water systems, and the construction of the three systems by rail and road. The Lake Kioga and Lake Victoria system is being connected with the Lake Albert system by a motor road now under construction from Masindi Fort on the Victoria Nile to Entebbe on Lake Albert. This road will be completed in 1914. Feeder roads are being constructed from Masindi to Lake Kioga, and from Masindi to Lake Kioga (Majani), from Kumi (Two District) to Lake Kioga, and from Masindi to Lake Kioga. Finally, Kampala, the principal inland centre, is being connected with Lake Victoria by a short line of motor road under construction. The loss of £125,000 from Imperial funds, which reference is made to in the report, has been applied to the construction of this line and of the roads mentioned on the opposite page. The total cost of the roads and waterways is £1,000,000.

Sanitary committees were established at the main centres and a medical sanitary officer appointed to supervise and direct the work of these local sanitary authorities, of which the local medical officers are the members. "Bath" and vegetable wash basins being gradually cleared and arranged to be made for the safe disposal of sewage and refuse, and for the protection of water supplies from contamination. Much remains to be done, and the stringency of funds is such that only the most urgent improvements can be provided. The control of the spread of disease among a large and widely distributed native population, many of whom are of the most primitive type, is an exceedingly difficult and expensive matter and must depend to a large extent on the gradual education of the native in simple rules of hygiene and the breaking down of heathen prejudices. Simple instruction in hygiene is given to the police and military forces, but the spread of knowledge can only be very gradual.

is complete there will be a network of railways, steamer services, and roads extending into the heart of the Protectorate and tapping a vast area of country. The Uganda Railway has been well maintained and has been free from serious accidents, while the Marine Transport and Road Transport both show considerable improvement.

POST AND TELEGRAPH.
The revenue from the post and telegraph service during the year was £6,967, as compared with £6,120 for the previous year. The cost of working the services was approximately £7,000, an increase of £87,792,125 in the previous year, an increase of 10 per cent. The parcels passing through the post totalled 10,001, as compared with 10,447 in 1911-12. Of this number, 6,000 were parcels from the United Kingdom. Many other business agencies showed a considerable increase, the value of orders issued being £21,662, an increase of £10,928. Of this amount £25,770 was in inland orders and £11,008 represent remittances to India. The latter figure shows an increase of £2,009 over last year's figure.

The mail service was satisfactorily maintained. Steamship sailings from Masindi, Kampala, and Entebbe were improved and very efficient. The mail service to Kampala, Masindi, and Kioga, which has been improved, is now being extended to Masindi. The telegraphic traffic shows an increase of 10 per cent., 50,150 messages being sent with an increase of £1,051 in the previous year. Of this increase the largest proportion was in respect of telegrams. Uganda was the United Kingdom which is attributed in part to the extension of telegraphic services to Masindi, Kampala, and Entebbe. The main line to East Africa was extended to Masindi. A further extension to Masindi is under consideration.
