MEMORIALS INSCRIBED BY THE SECOND ANNIVERSARY OF THE LOSS OF THE "TITANIC"

Two years ago today, April 15, we remember a fatal anniversary. On that day some 2,200 human beings were taken under the waves of toiling waters more like fish than men...

I, for one, am anxious to establish immediately, in the whole world some of the things that are the result of the meeting of Providence which permitted the occurrence of the approach...

A NATIVE KILLED.

Makut wa Mthini was charged at the High Court on Wednesday with having about a month ago caused the death of another native in the Mchuzi district. It was alleged that he hit the other man, one Mbono, on the head some seven miles west of his home, thus breaking his skull in two places. 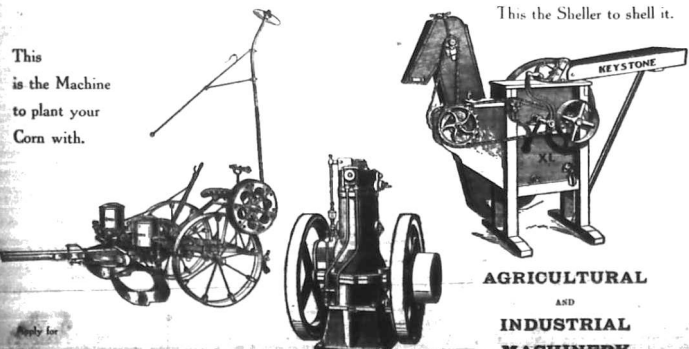

ROLLING STOCK FROM GERMANY.

There has been a deal of talk during the past few days of a large order for locomotives and rolling stock for the Transvaal, it is believed, the Government had placed with a firm in Germany. It was, however, it was desired in many quarters that the order might not be have been given as all the railway workshops in the Union being quite capable of doing the work. Of course this has been a pure guess among the workers, who consider that if this policy was followed it would mean that rather than two locomotives and a truck would have to be taken on, all of which would go to the benefit of the Government, however, it is not to be wondered that the rolling stock question was urged strongly enough that it should eventually be the policy of supplying their own requirements at the present moment, but on the various stages was not sufficient to work with the matter. In view of this it was naturally thought that the order for the ten engines and 10 coaches required would be placed in Great Britain, and something of a shock was therefore caused when it was found that the order had gone to Germany, and it is not to be wondered that a good deal of indignation was felt. The responsible minister, Mr. Burton, was tackled on the subject in the House, and he stated that it was a question of cost that prompted the Government's action. The German tender was considerably lower than the lowest order received from Great Britain, and that was why the Government accepted it. Mr. Burton said that the Government had suspected British firms of combining to keep up the price, and therefore the tender was thrown open to the whole world. On this subject some South African opinion is expressed, but it is not necessary to say that the various prices submitted by British firms compared favorably enough with those from America and the Continent with the exception of the German tender in which they were not acceptable. The Government are now negotiating their own orders in the line of the Cape to Natal, South Africa, but it is stated the official commercial sources are not in a position to purchase of the goods from Germany, and that the Government would not be so apparently good bargains eventually there would be had.

INDIAN COMMISSION'S REPORT.

The Indian Commission has completed its labors with most commendable expedition and its report was laid on the table of the House of Assembly during the week. 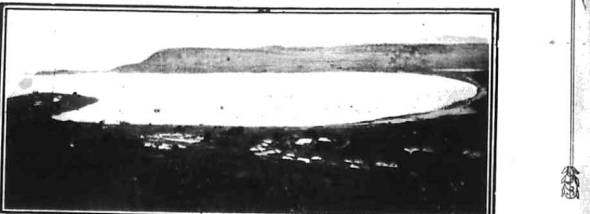

"LAUGHING TIDES."

It reminded me, says Burton, of the lake basin equipped at the construction. FISH LIFE.

Animal life on the open lake is rarely visible, for the surface of its waters is generally too troubled to prove attractive. The openings on the rivers on its banks, however, are more dignified and the estuaries and lockwaters teem with kinds of every description. Lobsters among these are white gulls, pelicans, "rising" water hawks, reptiles with fish and jelly floating, white and grey kingfishers, cranes, plovers, grebe, curlews, falcons, to mention only a few of the varied species treated in this delightful context. DEEP SOUNDINGS.

except in close proximity to the coast line, and by the measurements taken by early explorers. Dr. Livingston's recorded depth of 326 fathoms near Ujiji in 1871, and Victor Minelli at a later date reported 300 fathoms of Mramba, on the west coast. The following soundings made by a German officer in July last opposite the piers named tend to indicate that the variations in depth are considerable—Kigoma, 700 fathoms, without finding bottom; Albertville, 200 fathoms; Tumbwe, 400 fathoms; Vwa, 300 fathoms.

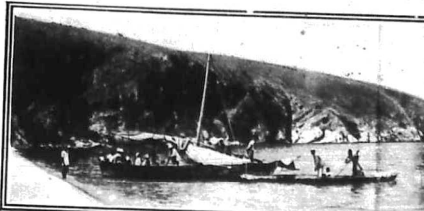

Concluding, he said that the year of which the results were now before them was the Bank's jubilee year.
