HOME.

Big Labour Combine

Delegates from twenty-six trade Unions of General Labourers and Transport Workers, at a meeting in London, decided to amalgamate, subject to a ballot among the men.

Home Parliament

If it is believed the Government will propose Parliament immediately the Finance Bill and the necessary supply have been passed, and after the House has considered the Irish Amending Bill, probably in the middle of August. Then the new session will open early in November.

Speaking in the House of Commons, Mr. Asquith announced that there would be an Autumn session. He hoped the House would rise some time in August. He would ask them to pass the necessary financial business, the Irish Amending Bill, the Indian Budget, the Lords' Reform Bill and, possibly, the Housing Bill. In the next session they would deal with the Revenue and Valuation Bills, and the allocation of grants to local authorities, so that those things would be included in the Budget for the next financial year. He hoped the Amending Bill would be taken next week. The matter required a great deal of consideration.

The Lords rejected the Plural Voting Bill by 119 votes to 49, for the second time under the Parliament Act.

To Help St. Helena

The sale initiated by the League of Empire of St. Helena leaves and emboldened, at Rutherford House, was largely attended, and is expected to realize a goodly sum. Mrs. Cordaux, the wife of the Governor of St. Helena, and her daughter assisted.

The Tibetan Controversy

During consideration of the Foreign Office Vote, in the House of Commons, Sir Edward Grey suggested that China hitherto did not agree to the boundaries proposed. He hoped China would sign; if she did not and resorted instead to an aggressive policy, the consequences must be disastrous to her, and would cause grave trouble to the Indian frontier, which would compel Great Britain to take up the matter seriously with the Government of China itself.

Royal Visit to Scotland

During the week's visit to Scotland, which has just concluded, Their Majesties inspected the ship-building works at Govan on the Clyde and factories in Dundee. Yesterday they visited Dunblane Cathedral, Stirling Castle and Linlithgow Palace. Everywhere they were enthusiastically welcomed, the crowds singing the National Anthem and the Jacobite song, "Will ye no come back again."

Suffragettes

While their Majesties were driving to the cathedral in Edinburgh a Suffragette threw a rubber ball with the usual pretence of friendly greeting. The ball fell into the lap of the Queen, who laughingly brushed it aside.

Several Suffragette outrages occurred at the end of last week. An explosion took place in a mail-bag between Blackpool and Manchester, six other bags being ignited as the train was on the way. The post of the train was badly burned while extinguishing the flames.

Blaby station, Leicestershire, has been burned down.

A woman was arrested in the act of lighting the fuse of a bomb in the church of St. John the Evangelist at Westminster.

At the trial of the Suffragette outages since the beginning of 1913 amounts to £284,000, including pictures, etc., which cannot be replaced.

Two Suffragettes, with dog-whips, attacked Mr. McKinnon Wood as he was leaving his residence. The women were arrested.

Motor Transport

The Imperial Motor Transport Council has been appointed, with a committee of experts, to investigate the possibilities of the employment of alcohol as motor fuel, which will render the Empire independent of foreign fuel supplies, and give a great impetus to agricultural development in new countries, by means of improved transport facilities. It is estimated that the researches will cost £5,000 per annum for five years, and an appeal is made for funds. Lord Crews and Mr. Harcourt were invited, heartily endorsing the scheme, in view of its national and imperial importance.

Borden of Empire

Lord Crews, in reply to an Indian deputation, said the Government in India, as the British tax-payer, who was largely paying the expenses of the Empire, was unable to exempt India in the Colonies Clause of the Finance Bill which provides for the grant of income derived from property abroad.

Naval Readiness

The test mobilisation of the Third Fleet at Portsmouth showed remarkable preparedness on the part of the ships. Not a man was missing.

Uncon-Cast Line

Mr. Owen Phillips speaking at the British East Africa and Uganda dinner, said it was impossible on the present commercial basis, for ships of his firm trading with East Africa to compete with the subsidized German ships without a British subsidy.

West Birmingham Seat

Mr. Austin Chamberlain has been re-elected unopposed for the West Birmingham seat.

To Replace Manoeuvres

The test mobilisation of the Navy, to take the place of the annual manoeuvres, began the week. As a result of the Admiralty's invitation to Reservists to volunteer for training, 423 warships of all classes were to be fully manned.

Duke of Aosta III

It is reported from Naples that the Duke of Aosta is seriously ill.

Obituary

The death is announced, as the result of an operation performed in London, of Lady Hardinge, the wife of the Viceroy of India.

Miscellaneous

The mining men of Commander Stefanos's expedition, reported to have reached Wrangle Island after escaping from the "Karkuk" when she was crushed in the ice, include James Murray (the "Ship's" doctor), his biologist in 1907, Doctor Alester, Forbes and Mackay (also with Shackleton), and the Chief Officer of the "Karkuk", Anderson, of Inverchlochy.

COLONIES

Canada

The Times correspondent at Toronto, says the Canadian Government refuse to defray the expenses of deporting the Hindus on board the "Kamagatama." The Canadian Government, however, are urging, unless undesirable, to deport them at their own expense, and the Government propose to make an example in the present, in order to prevent similar attempts in future.

A message from Quebec states that the Commission of Enquiry into the "Empress of Ireland" disaster has found that the "Storstad" was to be blamed for the catastrophe, owing to her having changed her course. Lord Mersey, who read into the record, added that the "Storstad" officer, Tuftness, was to blame because he altered the ship's course in a fog, and was negligent in keeping the navigation in his own hands and failing to call the captain when the fog

was coming. The disaster was not to be attributed to special characteristics of the "Empress of Ireland" and might have occurred anywhere. Lord Mersey said the allegations against the steering-gear of the "Empress of Ireland" were not well-founded. He was of opinion that Captain Kendall would have been better advised had he given the "Storstad" a wider berth. The Chairman of the Commission continued, "We do not think, however, that my stopping, which was done for greater caution, can be said to have been an unreasonable act, nor do we consider that his failure to give the other vessel a wider berth was a contributory cause of the disaster." The reason the liner sank so rapidly was, in the opinion of the Commission, because she was damaged by the boiler explosion in the two boiler-rooms. It is recommended that, in future, all port-booms, and as many water-tight doors as possible be closed down in the event of boiler explosions, and that the boiler-rooms be fitted with a vessel when she sinks should be provided.

It is reported from Montreal that the Canadian Pacific Co. will immediately start an action against the former owners of the "Storstad" for two million dollars, for the loss of the "Empress of Ireland."

South Africa

A message from Cape Town says that Lord and Lady Gladstone have called on English and South African members of the Cape Provincial Government. Many prominent people assembled to bid them farewell. During the past few weeks, Lord Gladstone has received tokens of affection and appreciation from all parts of the sub-continent, and from all sections of South Africa.

FOREIGN.

France

It is stated in Paris that the Suez Canal Company have decided that from January next the maximum draft of ships passing through the canal shall be thirty feet.

It is announced that M. Messager and M. Bressan have resigned from the directorship of the Paris Opera House, owing to financial losses.

The French Senate is discussing a Bill authorizing grants for the purchase of a Senator pointed out that a report of the Army Committee declared there was insufficient provision for the guns and shortage of two million pairs of boots. It was broken out the soldiers would have to proceed to the front with one pair of thirty-year-old boots. Their artillery was inferior to the Germans' and their forts had not been improved since 1875. The Minister of War, M. Messager, admitted that most of these statements were correct. The admission caused a sensation and uproar. M. Clemenceau said he had not attended such a heart-breaking sitting since 1870.

"On the resumption of the debate in the French Senate, M. Humbert maintained his charges regarding the army shortages. He declared that the Director-General of Artillery, in January, 1914, wrote to the Minister of War to the effect that no program had been made for forty years. He declared that M. Messager admitted that thousands and millions of francs had been wasted. By the end of 1915 they would have 5,000 guns, compared with Germany's 8,570. The stocks of ammunition were adequate, and the supply of projectiles at the end of 1915 would be triple that of 1908. The sums allotted for heavy guns had been greatly increased. Six million francs would be set aside in 1915 to make up the supply of boots for the army.

The Premier decried unnecessary armaments, in view of the preparations in hand to increase army material.

A motion, instructing the Army Committee to investigate the report on the state of war material, was adopted.

A message from Paris states that M. Poincare has left for Russia.

Germany

The Berlin papers give prominence to reports of fresh taxation, in view of the increase of personnel of the navy and the number of armoured cruisers. For English

service. The "Vorwärts" says the milliard war levy of 1913 has resulted in a deficit of one hundred million marks.

The German War Levy amounts to 105 million marks, but this is below many of the optimistic estimates.

A Berlin message states that the armistice in Bosnia, in a duration eight, remained in the air for 24 hours 13 minutes which constitutes a record.

The socialist, Walz, who was sentenced to a year's imprisonment at Strasbourg for saluting the Germans, has fled to France.

A court-martial at Berlin has sentenced a German sergeant, named Pohl, to fifteen years' penal servitude, for espionage in the interests of Russia, also to ten years' deprivation of civil rights and dismissal from the army.

The Russian military attaché has quit Berlin, and it is understood that he will not return, though his connection with this matter has not been established.

The connection of the Russian military attaché, Capt. Basoroff, with the espionage case for which a German sergeant has been sentenced, is accepted without hesitation in Berlin.

Russia

Reuter's correspondent at St. Petersburg says, with regard to the Mohammedan Congress there, attended by over forty European and Asiatic delegates, that Russia suggests the continuation of Mohammedan religious interests in the Russian Empire as being urgently needed.

With reference to the educational problem, it is considered that it will be difficult to effect progress among the Mohammedans without the education of women.

Forest and moor fires have broken out in Russia, and only rain can prevent a national calamity. Troops are employed, fighting the conflagration. Twenty-five houses have been burned and four people have perished.

A fire which broke out in the workmen's quarters of St. Peterburg, on Wednesday evening, was still burning.

United States

It is reported from Quincy, Massachusetts, that the battleship "Nebraska" has been launched. Her burden is 27,000 tons, and she burns oil-fuel.

A message from Chicago states that representatives of 55,000 engineers and foremen of 98 Western railways are conferring with representatives of their employers, demanding an increase of wages and other reforms.

Albania

A despatch from the Hague states that the Epitrotes have captured Koryza, and the Dutch officers are said to have fled to Valona.

A message from Athens says the fighting at the Epitrotes ended by the withdrawal of the Epitrotes toward the Albanians. The town is entirely and the inhabitants are widely clanking their firearms.

A message from Durazzo states that the Prince of Albania has asked Rumania to send troops to restore order in his country. Austria and Italy support the request.

It is reported from Durazzo that the insurgents have captured Berat.

With the capture of Koriza and other neighbouring places by the Epitrotes, who are considered to be Greek officers, the Epitrotes have recovered possession of all the territory which they had previously abandoned, in conformity with the decisions of the Treaty of London. Thus the position of the Albanian State becomes more and more precarious.

China

It is reported from Shanghai that an explosion occurred on the Chinese gunboat, "Turghel," off Kiang Wei, underneath the sleeping quarters of the cadets, of which thirty-five were killed. The cause of the explosion is a mystery.

Austria

There is much talk of formal Austrian representations at Batavia, concerning the activity of the pan-Islamic movement, and the instigation of the members at European

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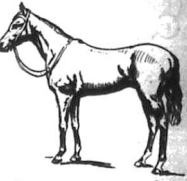

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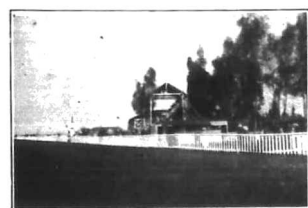

MEDICAL SERVICE

(From a Correspondent.)

The patient most complaining as the badge of his tribe; by his credit it may be written that, usually he does accept it with a remarkable degree of resignation and resignation, yet appreciable degree of sympathy for the cause of the sick and suffering. Being a man of normal intelligence he usually refuses to permit his grievances to pass unattended to and is anxious to see the fruits of constant criticism and complaint for which means only can be attained to a permanent cure of the disease.

There can be no doubt that the past few years have witnessed considerable improvement in the conditions of life in the Protectorate as a whole, it is equally true that under a Government has assisted in the advance it has made, and it is a direct result of lay agitation, such agitation is, in the main, based upon strictly constitutional lines, and although criticism has been constant and frequently lively it has been justified by circumstances, and sometimes by reason of criticism along unconstitutional lines is rarely justifiable so long as official negligence or indifference remains the financial prosperity of a community, that community should content itself with the adoption of the time-honoured method of demonstrating its discontent, but should it once become apparent that there exists in official circles a certain degree of cynical disregard for the remedial rights of the citizen as places the lives of its members in jeopardy, it should be offered for the adoption of sterner methods.

It is my contention, in the course of the present article, that the fact and matter, men with a charge of cold blooded indifference to the welfare of a large and important section of the population, a Government which has already given rise to much suffering and, it may be, to the loss of lives which could all be spared.

Unfortunately my faith cannot be controverted, let the authorities, therefore, hasten to make a change of policy, which may suggest itself as a salutary one, that is, to issue an official order, that in the charge of a sick, suffering, people take such steps as will prevent their suffering from a want of medical attention, a letter arrived in Eldoret, addressed to a gentleman, of considerable local importance, in which it was stated that he was very ill. We are sending him, to Eldoret, please arrange for his comfort.

The message was of a very striking and ready to be of assistance had previously undertaken similar duties together with the wife he had married and tended sick with the result that his wife's health had been endangered. Before taking upon himself the charge of a sick, suffering, he adapted the very natural course of consulting the authorities and was informed that Government was not a mere further information being forthcoming to the effect that the doctor was not called upon to attend to the case of a sick, suffering, but being to minister to the officials and natives. The patient was brought in by certain of his fellow-tribes, receiving such nursing as could be offered by those whose sympathy greatly exceeded their skill—and

I do not suggest that this man's life could have been prolonged by a single moment had he not received of constant and skilled attention, but it is probable that his last moments would have been spent in some of the agony of a fever, and that his attendants would have been spared considerable mental anxiety had such attention been applied to the patient.

This is not an isolated case but it is unnecessary that I should list upon the findings of truth, records of accumulated facts of which must be known to the authorities.

From the point of view of medical facilities on the Uasin Gishu and Trans-Nzoia the position is as follows—The extent of the area is some 10,000 square miles. One medical officer is provided, for the benefit

of officials and natives, at a salary of £500 per annum, with a travelling allowance of £50. A compounder is stationed in Eldoret. The doctor provided with one male. The whole community is entitled to such attention as the doctor may be able to provide after he has completed his official duties. It is necessary to point out that a native who has cut his finger has a claim on the doctor, but not on a sick, suffering, with black-water. In spite of tremendous effort, entailing daily journeys of anything from 30 to 60 miles, the doctor is back in his camp.

I think it right to state that I, for one, have never visited the official doctor, and had I been dependent upon him for my fate this article would never have been published by his profession and compassion for his fellow-man, he faces a meagre salary and has, for his reward, the ever-breaking task and the affection of everyone on the Plateau.

I can well imagine that the first cause for the failure of affairs which would be allowed by the authorities is lack of funds. I have no place upon record that the Government is the poverty of the people, and a salary of £500 per annum to-day, men, condemned and useless. Money has been literally squandered along the whole length of the Uasin Gishu Road which is a travesty on the name of highway. Money has been and probably will be provided in order that officials may learn their business at the public expense. Let them refrain from wasting breath and money upon the fact of Government is quite clear in this matter. The settlers on the Trans-Nzoia are there by official invitation, Government has accepted payment for their holdings. Over the whole area in question the population is composed of settlers paying direct and indirect taxation, men with a claim to the rights of citizenship. These men do not ask that they shall be sponsored, they ask reasonable facilities to work out their own salvation. No private practitioner could hope to conduct a practice on the Uasin Gishu as a financial project. It is the duty of Government, therefore, to subsidize adequate medical facilities, and to make arrangements to pay a reasonable charge for such facilities.

So far as the Government is concerned, a Government should step in and supplement such private hospitals and dispensaries, and to make arrangements to pay a reasonable charge for such facilities. The matter is urgent, and in danger of falling immediate action upon the part of the authorities or next appeal to our readers' sympathy, and that appeal will be supported by such evidence of mal-administration and neglect as may have the effect of disturbing the peace of mind of those August individuals, who to-day play at the game of administration.

SOMALILAND.

PROJECTED EXPEDITION WITH AIR SHIP.

The Times says there appears to be some authority for the statement published in the New York Herald (New edition) that an expedition against the Mad Mahdi is contemplated against the Mad Mahdi. The statement appears in the following telegram from Aden, dated July 12th:—

Two British naval lieutenants, Lieutenant-Commander Fred L. M. Doolittle and Lieutenant Richard B. Davis, are to be in British Somalia, conducting investigations with a view to ascertaining the feasibility of utilizing an airship for the purpose of an expedition to subdue the Mad Mahdi.

Lieutenant-Commander Doolittle is in command of Naval Airship No. 4, the Pervair, and Lieutenant Davis is the staff of the Naval Flying School at the Royal Naval College. It is probable that they have been sent to the East to see whether it is possible to land an airship in Somalia, to see whether it is possible to protect against the Mad Mahdi.

Should such action be decided upon it is legitimate to suppose that the airship to be employed would be the Aviator, which has been built as a ship of 50 tons displacement, capable of carrying 20 tons of passengers, 20 tons of cargo, 20 tons of mail, and 20 tons of equipment. The normal crew consists of two others seven men. The envelope has been recently enlarged so that the figure which follows is only approximate. The ship has an endurance in calm air of at least 15 days, fuel supply of 400 tons, an hour and 40 hours at 50 miles an hour. She can ascend an altitude of 40,000 feet, remain stationary in the air with her engines stopped or drift with the wind in any favourable current. When launched she was capable of rising to a height of about 7,000 feet.

ITALIAN WAR EXPERIMENTS.

The experience of the Italians in Tripoli with their smaller airships is worth recalling. The Italian made altogether eight flights either for reconnaissance or for both purposes. For reconnaissance, and especially for photographic purposes, the smaller airship is extremely useful. When employed directly they produce at first a certain amount of ground effect, but it is too transient to have any real value. The ships used for this purpose were of the type known as the Lancia, and the crew consisted of three officers and six men. In the course of 40 flights taken with the intention of inducing the enemy to reveal their positions, 300 bombs of various kinds, from one pound to 100 pounds, were fired, many of which were extremely dangerous, but the weights carried prevented high flight, and subjected the poor discipline of the enemy was unable to cope with the speed of the ships (44 miles an hour), so that they always got inside safety although more than one of the bombs were dropped by chance bullets. The bomb which was specially mentioned as having been the most particularly accurate. The Italian ships also used acrobatic, but suffered from a shortage of trained observers. Their bomb-dropping experiments from aerobics were, in various instances, not successful, as they were not in the hands of Henry Farmas, flying for three or four hours at 55 miles an hour.

It has been stated in the London Standard that the Italian military authorities are planning to make a large attempt to invade the British Empire. The plan is to land the Italian fleet in the Channel, and then to move on to the coast of England. The Italian fleet is said to consist of 100 ships, and is to be supported by a large number of troops. The Italian authorities are said to be confident of success, and are planning to land in the Channel in the next few days.

Rubber Congress.

INTERESTING PAPERS.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

London, July 2.
The Fourth International Rubber and Allied Industries Congress, opened on June 30, at the Agricultural Hall, when Sir Henry Blake welcomed the delegates in a brief speech which dealt with the progress of the industry since he last addressed the gathering in 1908. Then plantations were being established and so much energy shown owing to the increasing demand for rubber that the industry, but although they could not be expected to come into full bearing till 1913 and the results would not fully be known owing to the increasing demand for rubber, was reason to believe that some of the plantations of this investing excitement had been bound to be made under unsuitable conditions of climate and situation. The fact was, however, that a total return of plantation rubber of 48 thousand tons out of the world's supply of 108,440 tons as against 15,000 in 1908.

The demand had increased and in consideration of these problems they meet, see a limit to the supply while it was possible that the demand might be practically unlimited. Sir Henry pointed out that already in the exhibition there were three systems for street paving, all of which claimed to be a practical economy as compared with the wooden paving. He referred to the appearance of synthetic rubber papers because whatever they might think of it there was reason to be surprised by ignoring it. In his opinion although it was extremely improbable it would do all that claimed they must face the competition if it was so. He was strongly of opinion that the need was for working more cheaply. In any case it would take some years to test its claim as already there was a demand for the paving of streets and the starting of a rubber in the world's holdings which would take all the rubber that could be produced either by art or by nature. The standardisation of rubber called for investigation.

The Congress set to work on extremely technical matters, but one paper—"Kelanat as a Rubber Producer" by Mr. T. H. Fittings Hitchings appeared to me to be of interest. After a long and practical history of Kelanat in the Malay States, the development of the State had been extremely rapid and of incorporation with the Federated Malay States was being considered. The greatly stimulated. From the agricultural point of view Kelanat was unoccupied there was such a luxuriant growth of vegetation that it had been almost entirely cleared. For some years there had been the collection of indigenous rubber by the natives, but owing to the method of tapping the export had fallen off and it was now prohibited. In 1907 came the development of para rubber plantations and of the 20,000 acres planted about three thousand were now bearing and producing an article of the highest standard in the London market. There were 14 companies with 25 different estates which were on virgin soil and which were hoping to secure a cheap and efficient labour supply from Indian and Chinese sources since the natives were lazy. Influences, however, still existed in this respect. The years extending had been added to the land on which Chinese labour might be imported and it was hoped that the work would be most popular with the immigrant Chinese. The settlements were in progress. By the expected extension of railway facilities Kelanat would be placed on the same footing as the other states. The health conditions were fairly good both as regards Europeans and Natives and it was hoped that in the next few years the Government would be able to make arrangements for the health of the former. Good results were getting such excellent results while with regard to the mineral wealth of the State there were splendid prospects. Indeed with the advent of the motor, the mineral wealth would be exploited on a large scale. The position which Kelanat occupied in the rubber world made it one of the most valuable additions to the British Empire.

There was no discussion on this paper the meeting apparently considering that the facts as set forth were sufficiently conclusive without further emphasis. At Wednesday's meeting we had three extremely interesting papers. Mr. R. N. Lyons, the Director of Agriculture of the Federated Malay States, dealt with the rubber production, an aspect of the rubber industry which Cayton claims to be the first. Mr. Lyons put in a special plea for study and instanced the suffering of the natives in the decline of prices as an illustration of the necessity for study. He suggested a committee should be appointed by the Rubber Growers' Association to investigate the recent declines in price and elucidate something of value to producers. Mr. Lyons proceeded to deal with the treatment of the soil, particularly as regards Hevea. He recommended that the methods of Lawes and Gilbert be followed, and admitted that tropical conditions differed

widely from those obtaining in temperate climates. The Hevea, he said, like other trees, lived on the air as much as the soil and he was of opinion that, if full advantage was taken of the air food, soil treatment would not occupy so much attention. He therefore advocated giving trees an ample supply of light and air.

Dealing with the question of standardisation, Mr. Lyons defined standardisation as the preparation of rubber in the factories of plantations according to a system or systems that shall ensure each commercial grade being of standard quality, and instanced the New Zealand sheep breeder as one who respected the question of maintaining a standard, and bred his wethers to a weight set within certain limits. He advocated

a diminution in the crop of seed, a reduced proportion of rubber in the latex extracted, and finally, if persisted in, a failure in the proper renewal of bark.

He laid stress on the necessity for what he described as the optimum rate of tapping, which he described as the system which will yield in the long run—say, in fifty years—the largest yield of rubber without leading to premature debility, and said that theory was all in favour of increased intervals between tapplings.

The last speaker of the day was Mr. H. H. L. Smith, the editor of "Tropical Life," who gave a highly technical paper on the manuring of rubber, with details of interesting experiments.

tapping, an open question. He would, were it not for financial reasons, like to delay tapping for the first time till the trees were 25 inches in girth and three feet from the ground. The longer the trees could be left untapped and untrained, the more robust they would be. It was noteworthy that the spreading of the roots of heveas was very slow and limited till the trees were about four years old, and good roots were important to a tree, since poor roots meant poor bark renewal. It was advisable not to start too high or to have too great distances between the low cuts on young trees when first taken into tapping; if they showed ten inches of bark for each of the low cuts in the first quarter laid out, or would confine the first tapplings to moderately thick bark,

He paid testimony to the work of the Federated Malay States as well as to the progress of investigation but said that the work being carried out did not go far enough. He hoped at a later time to find the departments of agriculture both in the East and the West united with the planters in carrying out a plan of investigation over the whole field of rubber production.

The H. H. L. Smith followed with notes on the physiology of the latex production in Hevea. He said in speaking that there was really less to be said about what they did know than about what they would like to know and emphasized the necessity of co-operation on the part of the planters. He

On July 2 we had a paper on Vulcanisation by Dr. Gustave Bernstein of the Turrion Factories at Clermont Ferrand, who drew from his studies the conclusion that vulcanisation or as he regarded it, the repolymerisation of rubber could be effected by the presence of quantities of sulphur many smaller than that required by the ordinary processes of vulcanisation. Then came a paper by M. H. H. L. Smith on the "Study of Rubber Solutions" vulcanised by Ultra-Violet Rays while Mr. W. F. de Bous-Maxwell discussed "The best and most economical methods of tapping." Mr. Maxwell began by asserting that between a good system and a bad system of tapping there might be a difference of several

taking an average of 200 parings to the inch, this would give a period of 200 days tapping for the first quarter. The second quarter section should be on the opposite side of the tree, and the cuts should be 16 inches apart, and the spreading should be 20 parings to the inch, allow a period of 100 tapping days. For section three the spacing might be 20 inches and the time 400 days. The 4th quarter with cuts spaced 25 inches, would take nearly 14 years, or 41 years in all since the start of the first quarter.

In the second cycle of tapping all the cuts would be so much wider spaced that six years would be allowed for bark renewal. Five years was the shortest period possible. The number of days for tapping varied, but

gave a learned account of the latexiferous system as it occurs in the bark of Hevea, and made some interesting suggestions of little practical importance, though stated in his opinion the function of the substances from which rubber is derived on the coagulation of the latex was the protection of the tree from the attacks of eroded Malay States did not entirely confirm to the conclusions of Mr. Fittings regarding the depletion of the food supplies in the bark as the result of tapping. It could scarcely, however, be denied that tapping leads to a serious loss on the recovery of the tree, including a reduction in the rate of growth,

thousand pounds sterling per year, according to the area of the bearing. A system involving few cuts ought strongly to recommend itself to those responsible for the management of plantations, and the more the proportions of low grade materials could be reduced, the better for the factory. The best all-round system of tapping was to tap the trees daily with two cuts only in the quarter section on one side of the tree, some preferred to open with one cut only about 12 inches from the ground, but he (the lecturer) left the matter of one or two cuts on the first quarter, when starting

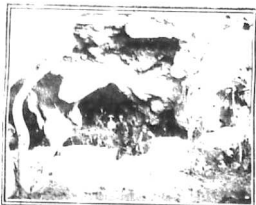
