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## ITALIAN FRONT.

stable Success on Isonzo Front.

## NO THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN.

[THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY.]

London, July 17. A communiqué reports that the Austrians, renewing the Venetole and Briono, which are over 10,000 feet high, repelled an attack on the Italian positions, were repulsed. The Italians, however, occupied the two passes. The Austrians had also made two determined attacks on the Senio, but were repulsed with heavy losses.

There has been little change on the Isonzo front, where the Austrians made small raids at night-time, attempting mainly, in bombarding with big guns, to break the Italian slow advance.

London, July 20. The Italians achieved a notable success on the Isonzo front, on July 18. A series of resolute, sanguinary actions on both field and heavy gun co-operated perfectly with the infantry, ended in the storming of several lines of armoured entrenchments on the Custoza plateau. We captured 2,000 prisoners, six machine-guns, 100 rifles and much ammunition. The battle was renewed yesterday with no great change.

The Italians also developed to the east of the Fiume, in the Pojana region of Estagno, where three lines of bases were captured at the cost of the "butcher."

The English General Headquarters at Milan, on the night of July 19, issued a general order to the effect that the British troops, in the neighbourhood of Pavia, in Cremona, would remain at a standstill.

London, July 21. A general communiqué states that the offensive is being continued on the whole of the Isonzo front. More than 500 hundred more prisoners have been captured on the Custoza plateau. Counter-attacks have been repulsed and fighting continued throughout the night.

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## NEW WAR VOTE.

## Reserves Hastened Up.

## SHOCKING REPORT: GERMANS SHOOT 5,000 PRISONERS.

[THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY.]

London, July 17. A communiqué from Petrograd reports that after support fights the enemy, on Thursday, occupied the right banks of the rivers Windau and Venta and continued to advance towards the east. The Russians on the Narva front, between the Oripa and Pata rivers, retired on Thursday night to a more concentrated position on the right bank of the Narva.

Vigorous German attacks were on the Oripa, on Thursday, and were repulsed with heavy losses. The Russians, on Thursday, attempted to cross the river, but the Random front, the north-west, was repulsed.

This was repulsed. Vigorous fighting is also proceeding between the rivers Venta and Bug, and near the mouth of the Venta, whilst the Russians attacked the large fort of Grudziadz, crowning the Dniester river.

A Russian submarine sank a steamer and a sailing vessel, in the centre of the Bothnia.

London, July 18. A Petrograd communiqué states that fierce fighting has taken place at Oripa. Three battalions of the enemy crossed the river, but the Russians repulsed them annihilating them with the bayonet. Reports from other sectors speak of successes and reverses on both sides.

London, July 19. The fighting is now general over practically the whole of the Russian front, which is a thousand miles long, and stretches from the Baltic to Karskopolis, as the result of a general offence which began on Thursday by von Hindenburg, in the north, and General Mackensen, in the south, with the object of encircling Warsaw.

The Germans made great advances and the capture of thousands of prisoners in both regions, and the Russians admitted slight withdrawals to prepared positions, which they have held despite heavy and very severe blows.

An interesting new feature is the meeting both in Russian and German communiques of great cavalry battles in the Baltic provinces, where Gen. Buban crossed the river Windau, and advanced to the north and south of Mikosz. The principal effort of the enemy is being made in the region of Prussia, where operations were carried out on a wide front.

The Russians also admit that they have been forced to concentrate here on positions nearer the river Narva, which is on the left of the Vistula, and that they are gradually retreating.

The communiques also say that further to the south, their forces have moved from the region of Brest-Litovsk and Tschernowitz.

The communiques also say that 50,000 prisoners were taken during the fighting in this region, but admits strong Russian counter-attacks and the arrival of Russian reserves.

London, July 20. The "Times" New York correspondent reporting that the greatest battle of the war, for the possession of Warsaw, is now raging with

indecisive, but a Berlin communiqué states that the Russians are making important counter-attacks from the Narva front line. Continuing, this communiqué states that the Russians have been hastily reinforced. The Germans have evidently made no progress at Blome, which is the most vital point on this front. While the Germans reinforced their forces, however, the battle is one of the most desperate character. The Germans only claim to have taken 1,000 prisoners on the whole front stretching from Narva to the south. A significant passage in a German communiqué is that which says we have been reinforced on all sides, and "the Russians have begun to push up positions to the west of Grodno." A German communiqué issued yesterday had claimed that the Germans were at Grodno. It is also claimed that General Woyatz is making for Evansberg.

Perhaps the most terrible battle of all is against General Mackensen. In the other vital sector the Germans are attacking in the direction of Brest-Litovsk and the Germans make a slight advance, but it is doubtful whether they are nearer to the railway than hitherto.

The battle continues.

## SITUATION IN COLONIES.

## Speech by Bonar Law.

London, July 21.

In the House of Commons, during the Colonial Office debate, Mr. Bonar Law sketched the military situation in the colonies. He said the position in East Africa was under the victorious position in German South-West and Tanganyika, or the former German colonies.

The position on East Africa was largely one of stalemate. He emphasized the failure of German raids on the Uganda railway.

He said the reasons why we were able more to hold our own was due to the fact that, though colonists had volunteered, they were of a class of volunteers, and not of a well-trained army.


