EAST APRICA TURP CLUB TOPICAL JOKES

(6.) That all existing racing regulations framed by the Stewards of the Nairobi Races be hereby cancelled and that the Stewards take immediate steps to appoint a small Com-mittee to adapt the Racing rules of the Calcutta Turf Club to the con tions of this country, that the rules as framed be printed and circulated to all Members as soon as possible and that a General Meeting be held on March 10th 1903, for the purpose of confirming such Rules and that if no members attend to discuss them they stand confirmed without furth question, and that the next Race Meeting he held under the new rules.

(7.) That the Stewards also be empowered to frame such other rules as they may think necessary for conucting the Club and that such rules be submitted for confirmation at the next General Meeting.

(8.) That if possible a narrow training track be made on the Race Course for the use of Members and kept in order all the year round.

The Honorary Secretary then read a statement showing the financial con-dition of the Club and stated that if all outstandings were realized the subject to final completion and audit of the accounts.

In case the tobacco plants be rather large instead of two, only one should be tied at each end. The string should be tied below the upper leaf, on the butt of the stalk, so as to prevent their falling down. One must be very careful to see that the labourers tying do not put more than four small plants or two large ones in each string.
