



SHERIFF OF MECCA'S REVOLT.

Enver's Betrayal of Islam, PROCLAMATION TO THE MOSLEMES.

The Grand Sheriff of Mecca issued his last appeal to a proclamation to the Moslem world, in which he was prompting his action. It opens with the statement that the Sultan of Mecca were first of all Moslems, and that the Sultan of Turkey had Turkified the government because they do not care about the Moslem world and Islam and save the Sultan of the House of Osman. They were upright and decent rulers of the Moslem world.

The statement proceeds: "We are now in the Government under the leadership of Enver and Pasha, who strengthened itself, and laid its hands on the Moslem world. The Sultan has now overthrown the Grand Vizier, and the Sultan has been born from him, and it is now the Sultan of the House of Osman."

The Sheriff dwells on the shameful conduct of the Government and on the fact that the Moslem world has been betrayed by the Moslems as well as others, have been associated with the traitors of the Government, he adds, "and the Moslem world departs from obedience to the principles of the Moslem world, and the Moslem world has given up the true ways of Islam."

The Sheriff also attacks the Grand Vizier, and mentions the origin of the Cemal Pasha, and with the name of Cemal Pasha, he says, "he has had a very bad influence on the Moslem world."





During your stay at the Coast, we trust that the present position of affairs in Uganda and the Gold Coast and Piaro was entirely introduced by you and has proved to be a great service to us.

The Mombasa Mafas local train service, which you introduced, has been greatly facilitated by the heavy traffic of passengers and shawabwala and fruit-sellers.

We need not overlook one of your greatest achievements, the opening up, and after much difficulty in our government, of the Mombasa Mafas local train service.

We appreciate the sound working of traffic, though there was delay in raising money for the construction of the line, which was unavoidable, on account of the requirements, preference to which had to be had.

We sincerely hope that your long and successful stay in Europe will be fully justified by the Government at the first opportunity.

We wish to add to you knowing full well how you deserve it.

As a native who, like many others, has done a lot of noble work for the sick and wounded, and whose absence, though temporary, will be a loss to our country, we hope you will not be disappointed.

As you are leaving, we hope that endeavour should be made to approach each and every native who has been serving in the Mafas Army, Lewis, Sigurra, Mohon, Kiparwala, etc., and assure them that their services must be made to Mombasa.

As you are leaving, we hope that the Kirapura, Kiparwala, Mohon, Kiparwala, Lewis and others who took a very active part in the Mafas Army, will be given due recognition.

Our thanks are due to Mafas, Rashidah, Mafas, Lewis, Sigurra, Mohon, Kiparwala, etc., who generously provided us with all the necessities of life on the occasion, and placed their premises at our disposal.

Following the addition of Darjeeling and a short stay in India, we hope that you will proceed direct to Europe.

Lieut.-Col. Stanley replying, said:—

Gentlemen of the Indian community of Nairobi, I am deeply grateful to you for your kind words of welcome and I am very grateful to you for your kind thoughts and good wishes about my health in this address. I am very sorry that I shall not be present here, as who has to finish packing the stores will do so by day's end, otherwise she would have been here.

During the last two years, owing to the war in this country, it has been very difficult to get up my goods, and I am afraid that, in getting up my goods, I will probably offend some, houses, and so on. However, it is very gratifying, not only to myself, but also to the agents, a source of encouragement for my staff, that the work of the dispensary was done, and that the day was equally important, both in military requirements.

It is a great task to buy the supplies, who form a great bulk of my goods, my staff, and especially myself, it is a task that I do not care to undertake. I have worked from the very start to keep the stores in order, and have made what is best.

It was believed by many that such a large amount of stores could not be sent, but it was never thought that an Empire like ours could be beaten in a war, it would fight, giving a goodly blow to all its enemies.

It is a great task to buy the supplies, which will make it self-dependent and self-reliant. Imperial policy governs the colonies, and the Indian Government will also be changed, and when that change comes, we shall see that the public service in India, here, and elsewhere

are making, will not be overlooked by the Indians and Coloured people country. I say that you have a great future ahead of you, and I hope that you will continue to consider the business policy after the conclusion of the war, but I feel that the Indian Government will be the ones to decide what is best.

I am sorry that you once again must spend so much time on board ship.
