ISSUE OF PASSPORTS.
New Regulations.

The following instructions with regard to the issue of passports have been received from the Secretary of State:

1. Passports will not be issued to persons naturalized in a dominion or colony who are not British subjects.
2. Passports will not be issued to persons naturalized in the United Kingdom who are citizens of any dominion or colony previous to their naturalization.
3. Passports will not be issued to make British subjects of persons naturalized in the United Kingdom.
4. 

WHY RUMANIA WENT BACK.

London, October 12.

We have reached a moment in the war when the strongest things in us seem to be losing their grip on our sides. There are now moments when, notwithstanding the average British soldier's desire to win, the strength and the ability of the German to hold out, the will to do battle seems to be fading away. This has made the continuation of the Somme operations more difficult than any other country has had to bear.



London, December 1.





ARMY COMMISSIONS.

Colonial Secretary's Dispatch.
The following dispatch addressed to the
Government of the East Africa Protectorate,
from the Secretary of State for the Colonies,
