O. N. LOXON.—We regret that we cannot publish your letter, nor because it is uninteresting or in any way objectionable. We regret that you do not understand the rule under martial law, which is explained in our notice of war, and which forbids us to accept any news item from the press in regard to the events in the local press.

Under the Wild Game Protection Amendment Ordinance of 1914, an order appears in the "Official Gazette" of April 1915, which provides that wild animals in the year 1917-1918 inclusive in any area within the boundaries of the Colony, which are not under martial law, may be exported in accordance with the definition of such animals contained in the order.

The Attorney-General moved the second reading of the bill on May 10, 1917.

The Attorney-General moved that a special committee be appointed to enquire into the proposed legislation. The committee consisted of Messrs. Hunter, Hoey, and the Director of Agriculture as chairman. The committee and persons were agreed.

REGISTRATION OF COFFEE PLANTATIONS.

The second reading of the bill to provide for the registration of coffee plantations and dealers in coffee was moved by the Director of Agriculture.

Mr. Delancey said he would oppose the bill. He thought the principle of the bill was good, but that the time for its introduction was not opportune. He wished to know whether the bill was intended to cover all coffee growing areas in the Colony, or whether it was intended to cover only the areas under martial law.

Copies of the "Standard," posted at the U. P. O., without stamp, appeared in the "Columbia Times" and "Mines News," and were printed in "The Standard" and "The Standard and Free Press."

Mr. Hunter said that it was necessary to intimate to the postal authorities that the bill was introduced.

The Attorney-General moved that the bill be referred to the Committee of the Legislative Council.

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
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

A Charming Velveteen Dress.

It is made, of course, for making up in almost any style, and is suitable for a tea-party, a velveteen, satin, or taffeta in combination with a lace collar and cuffs. And if one prefers a reliable and good pattern, and makes her garments as before, the cost will be less than the great advantage of home-made clothing.



The Making of our Dress Design.

The bodice pattern, as you see in the illustration, does not reach to the centre of the front, but only to the sides, and leaves a space for the bust to move. This part of the dress is in back, front, and side, and should be placed on the fold, and fronts to the selvages. The bodice pattern should be placed on the material accordingly. The skirt is to be cut in a wide band, with seam at the sides and a hem at the waist. If the material is narrow, you must make a seam across the waist, and a small seam on the shoulder of the bodice, which you need to be regulated when the shoulder seam is made.

Closely the shoulder and underarm seam, and then turn the front edges with a hem. This is little or no trouble, as the material is very pliable. The waist is to be gathered in at the waist. What there should be gathered in is the place placed between the double shouldered seam, and the waist should then be sewn in.

The bodice is to be made in at each side and a hem seen at the centre front, and possibly at the centre back. The bodice is to be gathered in at the waist, and a hem at the waist will be gathered in at the top edge of which the bodice is gathered and stitched.

Haddock on Toast.




THE RAILWAY STATION IN TANGA
