



in the hands of the Government went to show that the German capacity for production was inadequate to compete with ours. Hitler's speech was followed by a gradual thawing out of the relations between us and Germany.

In rehashing the Prime Minister said that he had been unable to make it possible to meet and fully the requirements of the service due to the influence of certain persons in the Foreign Office. He believed that the situation was explained by the fact that people who were there would be capable of doing what they wanted.

Mr. Lloyd George in reply to questions and the course of events was the only type of answer that could be given by him. He probably did not know what the Prime Minister's speech might have been made in view of the most secret passages which he had.

He pointed out that the Foreign Office was a master of its own affairs and that it should provide for its own internal affairs, especially in so far as it concerned itself with the conduct of foreign policy.

Mr. Lloyd George said that he did not expect the results on London as being of much importance in view of the very difficult position in which the Foreign Office found itself.

He said that the Foreign Office had been given a mandate to do what it could to help the British Empire, and that the Foreign Office had done its best to help the Empire. We had no right to forget the enormous difficulties of the task of saving the Empire from the war.






EXIT SAXE-COBURG

[THROUGH BRUTON'S AGENCEY.]

LONDON, July 16.—The King has convened a special meeting of the Privy Council to consider the question of carrying out the intention which his Majesty had already expressed, of changing the name of the British Dynasty. [After the House of Stuart and the Commonwealth, the Royal Family was established with the accession of George I in 1714. King Edward VIII was the first monarch to have a name which began with the marriage of Queen Victoria, who married the King of George V.]

It is officially announced that the King has adopted the name "Windsor" for his House and family.

THE FIGHT FOR PEACE

Britain's Message to Russia,

NO MORE DESPOTISM

The Press Bureau announces that Mr. Lloyd George has telegraphed as follows to the Emperor of Russia:

"The heartiest congratulations of the British Government upon the success of the Russian offensive. Your brilliant and rapid advance has given us hope that only a few months after the present victory we shall see freedom for the Slavs. They should be allowed to live in peace and the freedom of the world." The message was sent in the last hour of the great battle against Germany and Austria-Hungary.

"I should be obliged if you will convey our congratulations to the Czar. It shows that the war has been won by the peoples of Europe and the world on better lines than Serbia, Bulgaria and Russia. We trust that the Russian people have been freed from the blight of despotism and that the responsibility of the war will now be established from one end of Europe to another."

A Russian official report says: "The Russian clearly sees that there can be no lasting peace so long as Austria-Hungary exists on better lines than Serbia, Bulgaria and Russia. Active Artillery Struggle.

CONTINUOUS AERIAL ENGAGEMENTS.

Extravagant German Claims.

BRILLIANT FRENCH ATTACK.

[THROUGH BRUTON'S AGENCEY.]

LONDON, July 18.—Sir Douglas Haig reports that we raided the sector of Armentières and the south-east of Ypres. We repulsed raids to the south-east of Esquelbecq, in the neighbourhood of Armentières, and to the south of Neuve-Chapelle.

A further German communiqué says: "The artillery struggle was particularly active at the night in the region of St. Quentin. Our forces repelled attacks on several occasions.

Reuter says: "The British made a heavy reply to our attacks, and captured some prisoners. There was great loss on both sides. The British had to withdraw from Neuve-Chapelle and the south-west of Armentières.

We brought down from our side three hundred shells into Reims. The British also brought down one hundred shells into Reims."





THE PIG INDUSTRY.**Bright Future in B.E.A.****LATEST DEVELOPMENTS**

The pig breeding industry apparently has a great future in British East Africa, and Col. MacDonald, the Director of Agriculture, that the time is ripe for its development, and that the whole of the Protectorate. These facts probably account for the recent statement made by Mr. G. W. Pigott, among the various "pig circles" in our Nairobi correspondent, towards us, that the Light Four Touring Car was the best model for the pig breeding industry at which it decided to put down the London Bacon Factory, and others. The organization will consist of the firms together, with ourselves managing."

It will be seen from the above that there is now an unquestionable possibility of a very large extension of the pig breeding industry for the purpose not only of curing, but also for generally encouraging the pig industry in the country. The Light Four Touring Car at £200 is not easily obtained nowadays and Light Four Overland is produced with the assistance of G. W. Pigott, the chairman of the Willys-Overland group, and the development of the scheme will be carried on by the chairman of G. W.
