The citizens of London had a chance to choose heroes before the other day when the King decorated a number of brave men who have given themselves in the service of their country. It was a stirring sight to see the King standing up to the platform and his Majesty pinning on the breast of the man whom he deemed had the most decorated was the "Minnings". In connection with official records, the bold statement of Captain Minnings, who had 250 decorations won made, and the crowd cheered as the King said, "Well done, Captain Minnings".

It fell to the lot of Major Henry Murray of the Australian Infantry to be the first to receive the King's decoration. He was very ill at Gloucester and he can no longer wear his decorations. He was awarded two Capt. Evans and Capt. Edward Evans who distinguished themselves in the same way.

The second officer took part in the Attacker's last battle, and he was Captain Evans, Capt. and other brave men, their lives well earned.

Special credit goes to the appearance of a woman who shortly before the plating ceremony had been severely wounded. She showed something of the suffering he had undergone.

It was Thomas Hughes of the Cossack Guards, wounded at Gallipoli, last year, who was decorated. In the first line, and later he dashed out in the open field, and when he came home again captured single-handed and though wounded again, brought back four more men, and was the first to be decorated worthy to figure among heroes.

Major General Sir W. E. Cumming received decoration. He was one of a bombing party and finally all were captured. 



LABOUR AND PEACE.

#### MOTOR CAR.

MILITARY SITUATION REVIEWED.

[THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY.]

LONDON, August 20.—Mr. Lloyd George, as an important speech in the House of Commons, touched upon several subjects.

In his place he referred to the food, shipping and financial situation, which had only improved since early in August.

In August last year, there was a shortage of foodstuffs in India, and the country—then was 8,000,000 tons short.

There were also considerable shortages in bread consumption, while the average weekly consumption was exceeded by 1,000,000 tons.

If the harvest was good, it promised to meet the demand, but if it failed, there would be a serious shortage.

The economy was necessary, because the more we consumed, the more we should need from outside.

France and Italy also drew their supplies.

There was no food surplus in India, while 8,000 traders would be available to undertake additional cultivation in the spring.

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


