PUBLIC MIGIVINGS

(UNKNOWN HUNTER'S AGR-V.)

LONDON, Sept. 24

British Government's latest report, that the Chancellor, Count Hertling, in a speech at the opening of the Reichstag, spoke of the Meuse Committee of the Reich.

"You are aware that deep discontent prevails among wide circle of the population due to the terrible want of food, the heavy taxation, sufferings and deprivations, but if discontent arises from the military situation, it far exceeds justifiable limits."

Referring to the failure of the summer offensive he admitted that the situation was grave, but saw no reason for alarm. He said that he agreed that the situation was not so bad during the summer of 1916. Reviewing the situation he said that the German army had suffered a reverse at Verdun, but had recovered and was on the march again, but had suffered a reverse at Cambrai, and was on the march again.

He admitted that the old spirit was still there and attempted to renew the attack. There was no reason to lose confidence which would be mainly due to the morale of the army.
