

JUBALAND CAMPAIGN**Submission of the Auliani****ITALIAN TROOPS CO-OPERATE WITH KING'S AFRICAN RIFLES**

Details of the final submission of the Jubaland campaign by the Auliani have been issued from the Headquarters of the King's African Rifles, Nairobi.

For the last few days there has been a series of articles appearing in the press on January 15, operations in Jubaland have resulted in an armistice of the Auliani, who paid up a large sum of money, and the surrender of most of the leaders implicated in the rebellion.

The surrender of the Auliani took effect on Friday last. It was agreed that all that the rebels imposed on the roads should include the surrender of a large amount of arms.

This sum was collected by February 21, and the Auliani also gave up over 400 pieces of small arms, and a considerable number of rounds of ammunition.

Colonel G. C. H. de la Poer Beresford, the chief leader of the Auliani, managed to escape into Abyssinian territory with 15 of his men, but he was captured by the King's African Rifles at Gakodi Abdi, the man who actually led the uprising on behalf of the hundred and fifty thousand who were killed or wounded in the course of the operations, and De la Poer Beresford was also personally implicated in the attack on the Ambo station.

The Auliani in the north of Jubaland are apparently disarmed, and it is not expected that they will be allowed to remain from them for a long time to come. They are now making arrangements to settle in the south, where they will be under the command of the King's African Rifles, and the King's African Rifles will be sent to the Ambo station to prevent the Auliani from crossing.

JAP INTERVENTION.

Situation Reviewed
MR BALFOUR EXPLAINS ALLIES' ATTITUDE.
(TRADE SECRET'S ANSWER.)

LONDON, March 18.—In the House of Commons Mr. Balfour spoke on the Russo-Japanese situation. He said that the Japanese had been given a resounding victory, but that there was no evidence that the Japanese had been successful in their efforts to liberate Korea from Chinese control. He then proceeded to discuss the Imperial wireless station at Vladivostok, and the effect that this would have on the relations between the United States and Japan.

He then stated that Germany's new admissions in previous days indicated that Germany had been compelled to disengage itself by a mad dash to Siberia.

Mr. Balfour added that the Japanese were in a position to force the United States and the Allies to take a stand on the question of the neutral countries in political and commercial affairs.

There are also indications that schemes are being used to destroy neutral shipping, and to weaken neutral companies, with clear intent to start the war.

The story of intervention in Holland and Scandinavia, which the German press is carrying on, is obviously intended to give weight to the statements made by the Allies equally with the United States and the Allies.
