 In consequence of the termination of membership for various reasons, of several Councilors, an election will be held on Friday 4th March.

**Qualifications.**  
 To qualify as a voter a person...  
 (1) must be of pure European descent;  
 (2) must be 21 years of age or over;  
 (3) must be able to read, write and speak English fluently (except if and in so far as disabled by physical infirmity);  
 (4) must be either—  
 (a) an owner of real property in the extended town area (as the same is shown on a map which will be laid out at the Municipal Offices) of at least £100 value; or  
 (b) being a person ordinarily resident or personally engaged in business in the said area for 12 months out of the 24 months preceding the date of his application to the Registrar;  
 and being either (1) occupier of premises in the said area of a net annual value of the said area of £50 or over; or  
 (2) in receipt of board and lodging in the said area of the value of £75 or more per month.

**Disqualification.**  
 A married woman living with her husband in the said area will be admitted to register though not possessed of any of the qualifications specified in Clause 4, if she satisfies the other conditions herein set forth.  
 Disqualification as in Section 9, Clauses 3-7 of the Legislative Council Ordinances, Briefly a person is disqualified—  
 1. Who is of unsound mind;  
 2. Who is a subject of any of the powers recently at War with Great Britain;  
 3. Who has undergone 12 months imprisonment, any part of which was in the last 2 years;  
 4. Who has received relief from public funds within the last 12 months (other than war bonus);  
 5. Who is an undischarged bankrupt; or  
 6. Who is suffering from any disqualifications provided for the time being by any enactment.  
 Application will be dealt with by the Special Committee appointed by the Municipal Council, and their decision shall be final and not subject to review or appeal.

 I hereby to be entered on the Nairobi Municipal Voters' Roll 1921 and I solemnly declare as follows:  
 I am of pure European descent and over 21 years of age.  
 I am qualified under Section 4(1) of clause (4) above.

### Further Amendments in Committee

#### THIS MORNING JAN 21

In the Legislative Council on Thursday the House went into Committee to consider the clauses of the Rent (War Restriction) Ordinance, left over from the previous day.

The Attorney General said he had been asked certain facts about the English Acts. One point was whether the Home Act was extended to persons in the employment of a landlord. He found that was so. In the Home Act the terms were substantially the same as in their Bill.

As to the question as to whether Clause 8, dealing with penalties, applied to an agent standing as a landlord, it certainly, as it stood, was not, but whether it could be applied to the agent was a question which he pleaded complete ignorance of his agent's intimation. He thought it would be desirable to amend up the Ordinance.

**Landlord's Agents.** He therefore thought that after the word "landlord" in the present Ordinance, the words "or person acting on his behalf as a landlord" should be added. He also proposed to amend Ordinance No. 12 of 1925, so that the landlord knew what his agent was doing and did not interfere by preventing what was going on, but would also come under the penalties provided by that section.

The point raised by the member for Mombasa, who had handed him a matter from an English paper, which said a tenant could not be turned out unless the Court was satisfied that accommodation was available for him, was not covered by the English Act. He thought the idea had arisen through the House having general powers in regard to the Order, and could refer an Order where they considered it unreasonable. In practice the English Courts had refused orders of eviction until the landlord had provided reasonable accommodation for the tenant elsewhere, but it was not laid down in the Act.

He proposed that after the word "and" should be inserted, and the proposed clause included any person acting on behalf of a landlord. This was carried unanimously.

Mr. Rodwell said he raised the point referred to at the request of several members of the Indian community in Mombasa.

**Statement by Mr. Moyagh.** Mr. Moyagh again spoke for the deletion of the words "or in the employ of some tenant" in Clause 12. The position at the present, in so far as any rule, seemed to be followed. The Government had only increased its staff and were recovering possible houses that were to be let. There were only a few houses for letting, it did not pay to build houses for letting in Nairobi, partly on account of the heavy price of land. He knew of an instance where the Director of Public Works was paying Rs. 135 a house which was getting Rs. 15 before he took over.

Several people had had notice from a wealthy Indian in the town, and had to get out. The Indian did not seek legal advice as his demand, and with a certain amount of social feeling existing, had gone to great lengths to get people out of their houses.

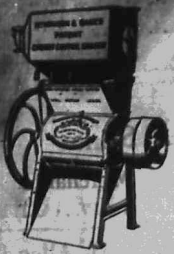
