

MONDAY'S CABLES.

NEAR EAST.

Allies Agree to Evacuate Constantinople.

TURKS LARGELY CONTROL STRATE.

GREEK SPHERE OF INFLUENCE.

London, March 10.—The Greek delegation accepted the British proposal to subject to the Sultan the evacuation of Constantinople.

The Greek delegation proceeds to Ankara, Turkey, to meet with the Anglos to discuss the situation, to consult over the future government, and to sign as soon as possible.

Meanwhile the Supreme Court will sit in Ankara, and will be at the disposal of British air force with a view to effecting a settlement.

ALLIES' UNITED FRONT.

Lloyd George Hopes Germany Will be Reasonable.

London, March 10.—In the House of Commons, Mr. Lloyd George, in trying to criticise, remained upon the inaccuracy of the Opposition's statement. He said that it was his duty to keep his party, and himself, in a manner compatible with our determination to secure justice.

Germany to be placed under blockade, he said, would yield substantial practical advantages.

Priester: Germany did not do its best to force Germany to despair. In the present situation we have been successful, though not by any means, to a large extent, to internationalise.

The proposals also called the attention of British members of Parliament in favour of a Christian Empire and not necessarily a Greek, while the houses of Nation will be divided among them.

The Vilayet of Smyrna will be divided into Turkish, Arab, and Kurdish areas, and given to the wishes of the population, with a local administration, recruited from the inhabitants.

If the two parties do not succeed in this, then the Powers will take into consideration that they will either split up or arbitration.

PACIFIC OIL BASES
Prospecting for Petroleum in Pago Pago.

NOT A PRIVATE INTEREST

[Despatch Bureau's Address, London, March 11.]
In the Pacific there was some discussion, on the Colonial Office supplementary Estimates, of an application by the Anglo-Pacific Oil Co. under an agreement between the British Government and the Samoan Government, for the prospecting for petroleum deposits in Pago Pago, Samoa, and this agreement, Britain's Government's liability is limited to £20,000.

The Hon. W. G. Ormsby Gore, Lord Robert Cecil, and others objected to the vote on the basis that the company would benefit from the new arrangement, and also on the ground that this agreement had never been submitted to Parliament.

Col. Amery, Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, replied, that the Anglo-Pacific Oil Co. was to be paid £20,000 for services rendered, plus expenses at cost price, not for any loss or gain suffered by the British Government or by the Samoan Government, which would develop.

It was emphasized by Col. Amery that the proposal, if carried out, would be financially remunerative, and the oil supplies, if produced before the war, would be available to the Allies.

He added that the Admiralty regarded the possession of oil resources in the Pacific as very important.

Col. Ormsby-Gore (B. of Navy) said that the Admiralty had voted £10,000 for experiments on the matter should be produced before the Home Committee.

This motion was agreed to by 168 votes to 63.

Commander Badge, R.N. (W.U. Member), said that the Government should bring the question before the Imperial Conference in May, in order that it might be thoroughly threshed out.

The vote was agreed to.

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APPEAL FOR CO-OPERATION

"E. A. STANDARD" OPENS CAMPAIGN.

Views of all interests in Colony

Invited

NECESSITY FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION

The following appeared in yesterday's "E. A. Standard":—
The financial position of the Kenya Colony has daily become graver, and unless some active steps are taken to determine what along sound lines, events must inevitably lead to a financial crash, a state which can only be viewed with the gravest possible concern.

The following appeared in yesterday's "E. A. Standard":—
The first step of rearmament were made when the period of

disengagement of present warring was seen to be more serious than we at first anticipated, but the more serious question, which has already been raised by the majority of observers without any general agreement, is the inquiry as to the following:—cost of production

There does not appear to be much difficulty confronting the farming and pastoral industries in the matter of cost of production without any general action, but in the interest of our Colony's future, the cost of production must be lowered, and the question of reducing the cost of production is one which must be considered by the kenyanites, so they have to face, costs out of proportion to what they should be, and to get a view to easing this burden that we have decided to open our columns to a full discussion on the subject, so that the cost can be cut down.

With this object in view, we have circularised the elected representatives of the Legislature Council and several other well-known members as follows:

THE APPEAL.

The grave dispute that has been raging over the currency question, has induced a sharp difference of opinion among settlers in Kenya Colony, and the disputants may be roughly divided into farmers and townsmen. The former are to say that there are not farmers who are "of opinion" that the piastre is the best coin for their money.

The main reason for each opposing view may be summed up as in the former's demand for a basic cost of production, and in the latter's strenuous desire to "offer no diminution of capital," the question of compensation being entirely ruled out of consideration. The pledge is not to be broken, therefore, in the section of the disputants who are against the Shilling, and the others who are in favour of it. The Shilling was freed the next day after the Rupes was freed, the new value was established at its present value, that is, the current exchange rate of £1.00 to 20/-.

The disputants must be asked to pay in their new coinage, £1.00, when the real truth of what is happening, and what will happen, to the country, is known to all. The fact remains that the exchange rate of the Shilling would drop to zero if the Rupes was freed.

The producers must also be asked to pay in their new coinage, £1.00, when the value of their produce is assessed in the basic cost of production.

It cannot be denied that the producer is the backbone of the Colony, and we do not believe that all who produce in this Colony, may not be dependent for their welfare on the prosperity of the producers, whether of colour. Therefore, if the producer can make a profit, sufficient to make his undertaking a success in the country as a whole must look to a state of bankruptcy just as soon as the capital of the producer is exhausted.

The report from every meeting of farmers held during the last two months have emphasised the vital necessity of combating the likelihood of any widespread failure among farmers. The attempts to far made have been directed to the discussion of lessening the cost of labour, and that of the other factors of production, associations etc. The question of lessening the cost of production is as important to us, however, to bring many other aspects almost equally as important to obtaining reasonably economical labour supply.

Whatever remedies are adopted sooner, we are convinced that it is only by a consideration of all aspects of this question that the generally determined co-operation of the whole community, that any action can be undertaken, that is calculated to prove successful.

We must urge the necessary co-operation from the "Producers" in the wheat areas, and get that locally accepted to wit, the farming community, and we feel assured that it is only by a general co-operation of those whose interests are concerned that any real and lasting benefit will be derived.

We therefore, approach you as an experienced settle, cognisant of local conditions, to co-operate with us in attempting to reduce satisfactorily the cost of one of the most vital questions of the day. We look to your experience and knowledge of the many intricacies involved in this question to add as thoughts that not end off you, the freedom of our columns and the assistance of our support.

A copy of this letter has been sent to His Excellency the Governor with a request that Departmental Heads may be allowed to express their views on this question from the experience gained in their respective offices, and with the end in view that there may be full co-operation in any measure that may be adopted, and that has been addressed to certain other well-known settlers, inviting their co-operation.

REQUEST TO THE GOVERNOR.

We approach His Excellency the Governor, with a view to securing the sympathy, experience and co-operation of the Government, in the following letter which was despatched yesterday Friday Secretary.

Dear Sir.—We have the honour to request that you will please to immediately circulate before His Excellency the Governor, with the enclosed circular before His Excellency the Governor, with the hope that this may open up to the best practical solution.

We have selected certain well-known sections, mainly with a view to starting this campaign on an established foundation, but we would welcome the sympathy, co-operation and expression of opinions from any who feel qualified to assist and guide the country to some solution or addition of the very intricate and vital question of Kenya Colony's future welfare.

It is also urged that the one basic coin of the colony be the shilling. It is the chief currency which is used in all countries where we are, and the cost of small value articles is the same in Kenya Colony as it is elsewhere, and the coins are few in value. This argument can, however, be rejected, and is then probably more cogent.

Another argument of the Shilling is that two Shillings are more than one Florin, which is quite well, therefore, besides the two Shillings without which they would pay one Florin, without giving more. This is ridiculous; the man who is to pay two Shillings when he could pay one Florin, is bound to pay two Shillings when one would cover him. We know that the coin system is the best, we go to a currency system in India, and the cost of a Pound is £1.00.

The other main objection is that the cost of the coinage is too high. The value of the piastre is £1.00, and the cost of £2.20, which is £2.20 for the coinage, and £0.20 for the metal. 
