GERMANIA'S SIEGE.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—British leaders are urging the Anglo-German negotiations at Rabat to be speeded up. Lord Robert Cecil, the Foreign Secretary, has written to the German Ambassador, Count von der Schulenburg, to say that the British Government has no objection to the partition of Germany, and that there is no proposal to break off the negotiations.

It is also urged that the negotiations should be speeded up to prevent the Note, as given in the Daily Mail, from being published again.
