IRISH TURMOIL

FREE STATE TROOPS VICTORIOUS THROUGHOUT

Large Captures of Republicans

NO WINDOWS WHOLE IN SACKVILLE STREET

(THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY.)

White Flag or Red.

London, July 1.
It is stated that the hotel assault in Dublin yesterday left 50 killed and 100 wounded, including soldiers and drivers, since the commencement of hostilities.

Nearly 200 irregulars have been captured, which are estimated to be a third of the irregular forces in Dublin. It is reported that reinforcements are arriving from the Province.

Irregulars blocked the streets with commandeered vehicles, isolating an area three-quarters of a mile in the centre of the City. The day was comparatively quiet.

The telegraphic and telephone connection of Dublin renders news of the province unreliable.

Liam Lynch, the rebel Chief of Staff, has issued Army Orders from Dublin, stating that a plan of action is being carried out to secure complete control of West and South Ireland for the republic.

Stations Free.

London, July 2.
Free State forces suddenly appeared in motor-ways at railway stations between Rosslare and Donorey and sounded up irregulars who had been holding up trains and searing goods.

Traders have now been informed that the line is open and the normal supply of goods may be resumed. Numerous irregulars in the Carrick district in consequence of the Free State troops' operations do not dare to go to Rosslare, where there is a large garrison, where the rebels have captured Duncannon Camp, the barracks of the Donegal irregulars after a long night in which many were killed and only two prisoners taken, indicating whence directions as the town was recently occupied by them.

A Long Siege.

Irregulars in East Donegal have held out in Inish Island, Longford, while they are preparing positions preparatory to withstand a siege.

The irregulars have gained possession of Lisnaskeagh, Donegal, and sporadic fighting is taking place. Destruction of buildings and bridges, and robbing of supplies and stores are reported throughout the Donegal forces have effected

the battle of Dublin yesterday. The National troops captured a number of rebel strongholds. There are now nearly 400 irregulars who have been driven out.

One of the most important positions is the castle of Moran's fort where the irregulars were encamped.

Three eighteenth-century shells were found at the head of the street which had rolled across the street and burst opposite where they had been lying and exploded.

ITEMS FROM FRANCE

Paris, July 3.
Mr. Thompson, Minister of Public Works, has considered the construction of a new bridge across the river Seine costing 10 million francs. The bridge will provide labour and materials and the revenue from the works will be surrendered for the reconstruction of devastated areas.

The Senate has ratified the French-Spanish alliance.

The Order of Merit for the Merchant Marine decree will be necessary to amend the right now to make French shipping more competitive.

BUREAU LONDON NEGOTIATIONS ON SESSION.

EGYPT INVOLVED.

(THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY.)

London, July 4.
Signor Schanzer, Italian Foreign Minister, had a lengthy interview with Lord Balfour last evening with Mr. Churchill present.

It is believed Jubaland was one of the matters discussed.

It is stated that Signor Schanzer has succeeded in obtaining the separation of the two questions Juba and the status of Italians in Egypt.

The Times says there are prospects of a satisfactory arrangement resulting in the cessation of a part of hostilities.

Commenting on Signor Schanzer's mission to London the "Times" reveals Lord Milner's gloom regarding Jubaland.

London, July 4.
The report of the Bank of British West Africa for the year ended March 31 shows largely reduced earnings £225,000 has been appropriated from reserve for provision for bad and doubtful debts.

Cairo, July 3.
The Association of Egyptian Doctors are despatching three of their representatives to Seychelles to examine the health of Zabul Pasha.

WAR CRIMINALS

FIRST OF A NEW BATCH GETS OFF.

Leipzig, July 3.
The Supreme Court has acquitted Herr Michelsbach, the Berlin doctor who was accused of ill-treating French prisoners in German camps in French villages during the war, although the prosecutor demanded a sentence of a year's imprisonment.

Michelsbach's case is the first of a fresh batch of war crime trials, held at the instance of the French and Belgian Governments.

RUSSIA'S TERMS

CREDITS, NO WAR DEBTS AND NO RESTORATION.

HAGUE PROPOSALS.

(THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY.)

The Hague, July 4.
The Soviet delegation to the Conference of plenipotentiaries to settle a meeting acknowledged Russia's pre-war debts and declare they will pay them but they must have credits if they do not get credits they will not pay a penny.

The fact that Russia is a rich country constitutes the chief guarantee.

Russia is not prepared to restore private property to its former owners but will grant concessions on private property.

She will not admit liability for war debts.

RAILWAY REPORT

NINE MONTHS' WORKING IN 1921 REVIEWED.

INCREASED MILEAGE COSTS.

The report of the General Manager of the Uganda Railway for the nine months from April to December 1921, is, as Mr. Cooper remarks, not so full as it might have been, due mainly to the difficulty of making comparisons with the previous years' working under the various Departments. In the various tables published, the increases and decreases are only shown, where percentages and averages are given, as, says Mr. Cooper, in add-ing third to his figures.

For the nine months working the net tonnage increased by 10 per cent., while the ton-miles increased by 12 per cent. The increase in traffic during the previous years was not so great as in the previous years of crop periods.

Notwithstanding the world-wide trade depression which existed during the period reviewed, the railway shows a net profit of £15,000 after paying all train charges and the loss on the working of the Busoga railway.

The following table of expenditure and revenue is given:

The above shows a saving in expenditure of approximately 11 per cent., brought about by reduction of staff and other economies while revenue, it will be seen, failed to come up to the est mate by £20,223.

Coaching receipts, goods traffic, steamer traffic and the surcharge were all longer than they were expected to be.

A pleasing feature of the report is that beyond small quantities of hemp and flour imported, Indian foodstuffs fed a staff of 10,871 Indians and 44,859 Africans.

Regarding coal it is stated that large quantities are still on hand but that an increased consumption is now taking place chiefly over areas where grass fires are likely to take place.

Water supplies at various small stations have given trouble, at Magadi Junction and Sultan Hamud supplies entirely failed, the Simba has been closed down owing to its unsuitability for boilers, and at the time the report was written Mito Andet was without water.

SERIOUS INCREASES.

The outstanding feature of the report is undoubtedly the enormous increase in the cost of both engine and train mileage.

The former has risen from 90 of a rupee in 1913-1914 to Rs. 2.20 and the latter from Rs. 1.13 to Rs. 2.75.

These increases are attributed to the rise in the scale of pay in the staff which formerly took the place of the War bonus.

The construction of two saloon coaches for the Governor, the report states, is partly responsible for delay in repairs to coaching and goods stock.

"The period under review," say the General Manager, "was an unsatisfactory one as regards import of traffic." The trade depression reached its most acute stage during this time and resulted in wholesale cancellation of orders by merchants."

The main products that show an increase over the corresponding period for 1920 are unfortunately all the produce of Uganda.

Tea increased from 150,000 to 290,000 cwt., coffee from 7,000 to 8,015 tons, cotton seed increased by 2,440 tons and Ground Nut by 2,440 tons.

Mugadi Soda.

Soda Ash which in 1920 was 200 tons, rose in 1921 to no less than 3,000 tons, and Mr. Cooper remarks that the actual loss in the manufacture of this commodity amounted to 10,000 tons Florin 4,884.

The Gaborone department was worked at a loss of Florin 697, and the Kilindini pier at a loss of 2,000.

The present financial statement from the Chamber of Commerce and Industrial Association in Uganda, which is held up at Mwanza, lend interest to the following remarks by the General Manager regarding the lake steamer: "Although the flag may be larger than the requirements demand at the present time, it is hoped that in the near future most of the vessels will have to be put into commission."

COST OF LIVING

To the Editor "E A Standard." Sir—I have read with interest the letter of your correspondent "Hard Times" as well as your leading article.

"Hard Times" certainly scores on the Butcher's Bill which as far as he is concerned is non est; may I inform that he is a vegetarian household?

I should add that my butcher's bill includes fish and also that my last bill of "Milk, cheese and sausages" shs. 80/- is made up of milk shs. 20/-, cheese shs. 22/- water shs. 16/- and wool shs. 20/- These last two items also apparently do not figure in "Hard Times" table perhaps the bills for these have been mislaid along with the butcher's bill.

What perturbed me most however was the figure of shs. 50/- for groceries (for comparison "Hard Times" expenditure). Whence should be added to this that making his shs. 110/- as against my shs. 180/- I should like to know the details of this shs. 50/- as I exceed this figure without allowing for paraffin etc. I hope this item of shs. 18/- is just over a tin a month has not been overlooked soap, pouches, condiments, tinned fish etc.

I think "Hard Times" statement presumably in support of his figures that a married couple can live at a Boarding House for shs. 480/- a rather misleading. To this figure we would have to add his shs. 60/- for whose personal boy say shs. 30/- and washing say shs. 20/- making a total of shs. 590/- in other words out of a salary paid Civil Servants on the lowest grade there would remain the princely sum of shs. 80/- a month for clothing two persons etc who goes to provide my consumption of such salary is not a living wage and leads me to believe that Major Grogan must have the scriptural injunction in mind in referring to "further cut us". From him that hath not shall be taken away even that which he hath.

With regard to House Rent from personal enquiries both "Hard Times" and myself are very fortunate, as the average is very considerably in excess of shs. 140/- a month.

In conclusion I must thank you Mr. Editor, for kindly opening your columns to this correspondence. I shall be much surprised if the average household budget falls short of shs. 800/- a month.

(c) Offer advice on local conditions within the scope of the Committee's policy.

The Committee will only advise such applicants as they consider likely to become suitable Colonists to settle in Kenya and recommends all applicants to bring with them an introduction either from its accredited agents or from some other responsible person. Arrangements are now being made for the appointment of local representatives in the United Kingdom and in India—the addresses of whom will be published shortly.

The Committee's object will be to obviate the delay and expense which the newcomer usually finds incidental to the acquisition of adequate information. Though the Committee can give no guarantee expressed or implied, as to the accuracy of the information supplied by it or its representatives, yet every possible care will be taken to see that the services will be of the greatest assistance to the best of the Committee's knowledge.



brought about by these "mischievous games." But our sense of dignity, reason and English freedom is met by Mr. Justice Pickering's finding "that the holding of lotteries is opposed to public policy in this Colony," and that "in common with the long-established policy of English law"—a parenthesis for which we are grateful—"the object of the transaction relied upon by the plaintiff must . . . be regarded as unlawful." We take this to mean, at the least, that no Courts in this Colony can assist in the recovery of a prize or winnings under a lottery. This, we believe, clearly adds to the risks of a game of chance, and the knowledge that the law will not assist one in the recovery of winnings from lotteries and their like is fully in accord with the adventure with which one enters these events. A sense of reserve protection in the Law would qualify the thrill of the experience, whatever practical advantage it might afford to a loser from accident or foul play. We are not quite sure of the extent, if any, to which the making of the Law taken by His Honour our sanctions or permits study methods in the carrying out of "games" which are themselves frowned on though not assailed by the Law. But that lotteries and so forth are not a royal road to unlimited robbery of other kinds is evidenced by the fate of the originator of "Victory Bonds," and much more so by this reduction may be not without a salutary effect on those who might be tempted to strain too far to the evident indifference of the law to plaintiffs in cases connected with lotteries. We claim for this Judgment that it is one of the most important in public interest, as it is certainly one of the most lucid and appropriately phrased, of recent Supreme Court documents, and we are sure that while some souls who are timid where legality is concerned will feel as a result of it a permission to adventure a few shillings on a greater chance, and while others may deplore even a negative



ENGLAND VS. COLONIALS

SMALL CROWD WATCHES GOOD FOOTBALL.

A GOAL-LESS DRAW.

For a representative match, the crowd that assembled on Centre Court on Saturday was a remarkably small one. The match in question was the first in the series for the Maxwell Bally Cup for International teams between England and Colonials, and ended after an excellent exhibition of football in a draw of no score.

Mann particularly being a sinner in this respect from a distance outside of Field, which he clean missed when only a couple of yards out.

Still the Colonials came on and a lively few minutes ensued round the English goal. Wood having a considerable amount of work to do. Following a well placed corner the opener seemed imminent, but Mann was high, after a grand tussle.

The ball then visited both ends in rapid succession, and Mann repeatedly called upon to save his side. Colonials again looked likely, but Nunn was high and in any case off-side.

After further play in which every inch of the way was contested, an excellent goal was brought to a close with no score having been registered.
