SOME FACTS IN REGARD TO  
KENYA.

## LITTLE KNOWN OBSERVATIONS

(Through Reuters' Agency.)  
London, July 10.  
The recent heavy deluges of rain  
in Mombasa totaling over 41  
inches in a month were three  
times the average rainfall recorded  
for that month. Rainfall records taken in past years along the  
East African coast show a large  
annual rainfall commencing at approxi-  
mately Lindi, while at each  
successive station in a northerly  
direction the figure steadily  
decreases until at Kisumu there is  
about an appreciable extent of  
rainfall in the course of a year.

Movement of water in the  
Coastal waters gradually appears to  
come from the North-Eastern direction  
and after passing westward flanking the Khamiyo coast area,  
the first heavy rainfall takes place  
in the Mombasa district to the North  
East of Nairobi, Kenya. Further

## Moving Towards Tranquillity

## THE LABOUR AND IRISH TROUBLES

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

LONDON, June 18.—And he is making no concessions because he has not the available funds to do so. He has commented, however, at last to remodel the entertainment tax, although it seems to me that the suggested rate instead of a scale will only benefit the cheaper houses and not the better ones. Thus the West End theatre managers are very hostile to a flat rate. The Chancellor has already announced that he can take nothing off beer, and thereby undoubtedly there is much disappointment, but I am sure the less concerned that when there is any further reduction of any sort, it must be made in this direction. A good deal depends on whether people are this year liable to pay more in income tax and excess profits duty. One doubts it. I think one way of the Chancellor's anticipations for 1923 may have to be remodelled.

Undoubtedly the general burden of taxation is felt very heavily, and this is shown in the antagonism of the working classes to the heavy war duty. The working classes are inclined to do so, and the membership of the various unions all over the country has gone to pieces. Some of the unions have lost thousands of members, and I do not think there is a single one which can show up increases.

All this tends in the direction of industrial tranquillity. High taxation, of course, benefits our international economic position, and the pound sterling is steadily re-appraising its pre-war value in the United States while I would not be surprised if two years from now it is not "blessed" with a small government or with a prospective mill stone of half a million loan interest starting in a couple of years.

If any body gets a free farm, I am not at all sure that in the majority of cases it is not a white elephant, and that cannot be sold, what no bank agrees to finance, and which cannot be resold, cannot be considered as minor gains.

Having travelled about this country for a good many years, and leaving out farms on well known fly roads and in the bottom of craters, I can certainly say that a lot of the remaining farms are not worth the 10 cents an acre, rent which I think has to be paid for them and a great many more are quite valuable except for game and perhaps nomadic tribes at certain times.

I am afraid that the Editorial of people getting something for nothing which the Government is giving as a "handout" unless some other people besides themselves would not only suggest, but state, that to the same sort of game or ideas on the part of the Government in the past is mainly due the present state and prospects of the country. Looking back as the writer can over nearly 19 years what a really dreadful result!

From the last census returns there are somewhere about 1,000 Europeans given as the primary producers of the country, farmers, planters, etc., and including, I suppose, the Soldier-Governors, about the number that would be run quite successfully by a Parish Council at Home.

Unless the Government and the country can get it into their heads that unoccupied land whether Government or private is not an asset, but a curse there is no hope of this country going ahead and the sooner it is recognised that the actual and evaded value of land all the world over is not that it will produce wheat, sugar, cattle, etc., but whether they can be grown and sold by the owner or occupier and that he can make a living by it at least, if he can't it's value is nil.

Portuguese Guinea is a notable example of finding out for the benefit of its people how much money has been paid by the producing community.

Leaving out coffee plantations the value of land in the past would appear to have been purely speculative or imaginary and would appear to have been arrived at something in this way.

## SETTLING THE OFFICIALS.

To the Editor, "E. S. M. Ltd."

Sir,—Perhaps you may be able to find room for a few comments on the proposed settlement scheme for ex-officials as outlined in your column. I wonder what the majority of those retired and requiring think about it.

The proposals of the Bowring Committee and those contained in Mr. Martin's letter appear to differ materially. In the first it would seem to be the idea to get them to take land in lieu of good shillings, and to apparently without getting the benefit of the system of instalments spread over a number of years.

The ex-official may well wonder if the country is really so anxious for his presence in it or if it is trying to do him down with something as bad as the "Times" and the "Daily News," the general home situation is distinctly improving.

It cannot be said there is any notable revival in trade, although we seem to be getting some of the orders which Germany, owing to the vast volume of her business, cannot herself handle in reasonable time.

After being out for some fourteen weeks, the members of the Amalgamated Engineering Union have, unfortunately, decided to return by a vote of 75,000 to 35,000. They have, undoubtedly only temporarily, because they are nearly financially bankrupt, got back to work, and are available to obtain any further cut-of-work pay. The Government restored them unemployment pay, and hence both the Union and the men themselves were on the rocks. The dispute has been fought with a surprising absence of bitterness and really, as a matter of fact, the settlement is a compromise one, since while the employers win on the question of introducing overtime, they have to give the men ten days' notice of their intention to do so, and the whole issue can be raised again at any time. I do not, however, imagine that they will come forward with any degree of readiness for such a move. The employers have got back, and now only the boiler-makers are out. They rejected the employers' proposals for a large majority, but assumed as everybody else has returned to work and the men hastened back with extraordinary energy—they are not likely to maintain for much longer their rather uncompromising attitude.

Trade.

On the other hand, the prospects of legislation aimed at our trade by other countries are not reassuring. America is, as everyone knows, trying to get a Ship Subsidy Bill through Congress while the Canadian Parliament has passed a legislation, under which all foreign ships will be excluded from the coast-wise trade in Chile after the beginning of August. This will hit the Pacific Steam Navigation Company rather hard, though it will also prejudicially affect the United States.

If there is an extension of this policy, we may have to consider, sooner or later, our own position, though the merits of Free Trade, which are always laying such great stress, in success as we claim, it does not appear to be winning many converts among the other nations.

Germany is undoubtedly doing well at the present time, far better than we are, and there is no doubt, despite all contrary reports, that she is in a position to pay her obligations under the Paris Treaty.

Trade was never so brisk, and there seems to be very good reason to believe that the low rate of exchange suits the Germans as well as they intend to keep it low. They have, however, decided to pay the monthly instalment for the reparations due on June 15, but the International bankers have refused to make any loans to Germany as a result of France's attitude.

OFFICIAL ATTITUDE.

As up-country correspondent writes:  
His Excellency the Governor accompanied by Miss Northey passed through Nyanyi on Tuesday, on his return to the Capital from a tour which embraced Lumbwa, Kirisio, Sotik, Kisii, Kendu Bay, Kisumu and Kapasabet.

He spent three hours at Bungu where the Victoria Nyanya Sugar Company under the energetic and capable direction of Mr. H. Mayers is rapidly reaching the time when it will be in a position to supply the sugar requirements of Kenya and Uganda.

Appreciation of recent press comments, the discreet appearance of the coach in which the gubernatorial party travelled was in marked contrast to the luxurious accommodation considered necessary to the dignity of the Honourable the General Manager.

A large section of Nyanya Farmers complain very bitterly about the extremely unsatisfactory attitude of the Kisumu Sugar Company who is the only person with the field force of the Hottentots who have no means disposed to settle down quietly after the drubbing Abraham Morris' followers received. He says that all along the Fish River below Klein Aias and in the Richtenfeld there are armed bands of Hottentots who are determined not to submit to the Government. Far from being dead, Nicola Christian is very much alive, and has been working for Jacobus Christian that if he receives any more of his stupid messages about submitting to the Administration he will blow his brains out at the first opportunity, and has added that if the Government wants him they can come and pull him out of the mountains.

Following this there was the other day some scrapping, in which two Hottentots were wounded. The whole thing is a miserable business arising out of grievances which, it is strongly contended in the Union should be open to amicable negotiation. The situation is very serious and the information available is scanty.

**Tribal Troubles in Natal.**  
In Natal large police reinforcements have been sent to the Umzimkulu district, where tribal disturbances are threatening to develop. No apprehension is felt for white settlers, towards whom both sides of the disputants are well disposed. The quarrel is purely a tribal one and follows on a rumour which happened about a month ago, when about thirty natives were killed. It is understood that the quarrel is about tribal boundaries and those concerned wish to resort to the time-honoured native method of settling disputes. It is reported that sticks have been cast aside in favour of assegais and shields, that the women and children have been sent for refuge into the hills, while large numbers of cattle have already been driven off, and that about 4000 natives are spoiling for a fight. This districts was involved in the 1906 rebellion. The tribes concerned are of the Zulu's whose territory is across the Tugela River, which flows through this part of the country. The police patrols are vigilant and are using as much tact as the circumstances will allow with the rival factions.

#### MAIZE

To the Editor, "R.A. Standard."

Sir.—As the future prosperity of the greater part of Kenya—apart from coffee districts—depends chiefly on the speedy organisation of a state maize export trade it would interest the public generally to learn what steps are being taken by the Government to lay the foundations of the Colony's development without further delay.

This is for the most pressing problem of the Colony's welfare, and must be solved by the Government, the State Bank of Commerce, and the Chambers of Commerce, in concert, and not left to the efforts of half a dozen Nakuru settlers.

A low railway flat rate can be fixed for maize whether it pays the railway or not, as once the export trade is established, the increased revenue will more than pay for the railway loss, go down, and so on, and Government grading can be established at Kilindini from the loan funds, guarantees given from the district associations of certain quantities by certain dates; and low shipping freights negotiated, to begin with, the various shipping lines as exportable quantities accumulated at Kilindini.

This difficult problem should not be beyond the best class administrative and organisational capacity of our authorities; a glance at the statistics shown by our Heads of Departments in this very bumper Colony is quite sufficient to reassure the dubious that that capacity must be of a very exceptional order.

Game at Entebbe.

It is reported that Entebbe has late received quite a number of uninvited visitors in the shape of leopards, hyenas, and black man-bear. The frequency of their visits, it is stated caused quite a stir in some of the official quarters.

An Old Offender Punished.

A native with eight previous convictions was charged at the Police Court yesterday with the theft of a blanket and a pair of shorts from another native living at Pangani. He had only recently completed a term of three years, and had still to report to the police for another three years. A sentence of six months' R.I. was imposed, and the term of reporting to the police was increased to five years.

A Simple Thief Caught.

A young native, with two previous convictions, was charged in the Magistrate's Court yesterday with the theft of a brand new Raleigh cycle, which, according to the evidence, had been stolen from the porch of the National Bank of South Africa buildings. Only the frame and certain odd parts were produced in Court, the remainder still being missing. A native, now in custody, but a shambu at the time, gave evidence as to finding the accused trying to hide the frame in the grass and destroying him. The accused stoutly denied his guilt and stated that the odd parts, including the tyres, belonged to his own cycle, which was also produced. He was found guilty and sentenced to 12 months' R.I., which the magistrate remitted would have been greater but for the fact that he was only 16 years of age. The accused's own cycle will now be the subject of investigation as the police have reason to believe that it corresponds with one that was stolen two years ago—it was also a Raleigh.

There is a lack of innovation in a monthly Auction Sale of second hand cars, the first section taking place in July in due course next week.

A day or two before the sale, a competent mechanic will be on duty to give prospective bidders opportunity to test and inspect the cars, and further any prospective buyer has only to go to the Service Coy. the day before the sale and he can get by arrangement, extended terms of payment for any purchases which may make.

Money is scarce in Nairobi, so deferred payments will be of very great help to many possible buyers.

There are many people who are in urgent necessity of some means of indoor locomotion, but who have not the actual money in the bank, as these auction sales besides ensuring that the car or motor cycle is purchased at the lowest market rate will also cause the least financial inconvenience to purchasers.

New Alcohol Mixture as Motor Fuel.

An alcohol mixture can be used successfully as a motor fuel and at lower cost than petrol, according to tests recently completed by the Sociedad Nacional de Agricultura of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

The experiments were made with two Fiat cars weighing 3,100 kilos each, a distance of 48.1 kilometers, and in comparison with a light American car weighing 3,000 kilos.

The first car received 20 litres of a mixture containing 20 parts of alcohol (95 degrees), 22 parts of ether, 2.5 parts of kerosene, 0.5 part of pyridine.

The second car received the same amount of a mixture composed of 22 parts of alcohol (95 degrees), 10 parts of ether, 5 parts of kerosene, and 2 parts of pyridine.

The first car made an easy start and so ran, the second had difficulty in starting, and the motor ran smoothly only at the end of the trip. The consumption of the first car was 96 cubic centimetres of alcohol per kilometric ton, while the second, 129 cubic centimetres. The American car consumed 126 cubic centimetres of petrol per kilometric ton for the same distance.

farm implements. Put some rubber cement upon the handles, and then wind on the strip of rubber, being careful to keep them straight and tidy. There is a little trick to turn the last end under the last "two or three rounds," but after one end has been bound the others are done easily. These bands do not blister the hands, and the rubber wrapping will be found preferable to adhesive tape.

Pieces of an old tube may be used for patching with a vulcaniser, if the motorist does his own vulcanising. They have been found quite satisfactory. The purchased rubber is better, but in an emergency the pieces of tube may be used. Care must be taken, however, so that after the tube has been cut the edges will not catch the hand. Have the surface clean on both sides. Wash with a cloth dipped in petrol, and then wrap round thoroughly.

If all else fails, save the valve. Remove the valve stem, then clean the stem, and bind it with a piece of wire. This article is taken from an old tube which has been vulcanised and then fastened by the vulcaniser and heat, and the tube will be as good as ever it was.

The valve will be vulcanised next week.


